Fish Talk

Where Are The Fish?

So what's the word on the water after all this rain? For starters, our redfish have continued to be very consistent on the incoming tides. The use of cut baits such as mullet and crab are producing very well. Try to find cleaner water and focus on oyster shells where they are most likely to hold. Right now, you can find reds throughout Amelia Island. Large schools have been stacked up at the St. Mary's inlet. Mullet schools are thick and redfish are right underneath them.

Next, flounder...what a great year so far! They are still being caught from St. Mary's to Talbot Island. The absolute best results are coming on the falling tides. Finger mullet and live mud minnows are the preferred bait but if you like throwing plastics, try Gulp plastics on a jig head, just make sure to adjust weight with tidal flow. If you need a few, talk to Lewis at Callie Kay's General Store & Outfitter. Again, many times artificial bait will out fish live bait. Focus on docks but do not overlook the small feeder creek run outs along the grass lines. Jacksonville continues to have a decent bite and that will only improve from now through October.

Moving on to sheepshead! Let me tell you, they are working the inshore rocks and oyster beds right now. The incoming tide has been best when the water cleans so keep that in mind. I look for the sheepshead bite to only get better in the next few months. You can also sight fish them during our flood tides.

If you are looking for big gamefish, tarpon and sharks are everywhere! Find the shrimp boats and find the fish. You can also find them at either of our Jetties in huge numbers. You can bet that they won't be far from schooling mullet. Stay on the mullet and you'll be all over the fish!

With that said, I hope you all have a great week. As always, I look forward to seeing you on the water!





While making arrangements for the move we debated just where to locate in Southeast Georgia or Northwest Florida, while we got adjusted with the relocation. We found an area where the potential for peace, quiet and security promised to be great for the long term, even though the location was rural and with minimal amenities. As we adjusted and our family grew, we found a permanent home with lots of room for our young family. It was affordable with security and that small town feel. Folks knew each other and greeted everyone with a smile and a genuine caring for one another. Our children grew up and experienced an education where teachers cared, not only for their jobs but for their charges as they developed in front of their

Our street had three houses on it, and at the time it was unpaved. The finance company even told us that the only reason they approved our application for the mortgage was due to the other two existing homes on the road. Over time the street became paved and the city expanded the sewers to the neighborhood. Slowly, over the years, more houses were built but the original lot sizes remained the same as the single-family houses continued to be in the median range, providing a very stable and comfortable community. It was a location that was very secure and restful after a long day at work.

The generation of families from that time have all grown up and moved on, as we watched the immediate neighborhood continue to hold its charm and security. Now, in the last decade or so, lots have been developed and sold with more very nice homes occupying them. Young families have taken an interest in the area, as the schools continue to be the caring, top-notch facilities, which we depended upon those many years ago. Neighbors know one another, and the security and professionalism of local law enforcement is still very reassuring. The existing homes are still cared for, as new houses fit the rural environment and the comfort zone around them

Where once we sat in the front yard to watch our own kids play and grow we now do so watching, and being entertained, by new generations of families as their children enjoy the security and fun of being able to play outside without worry of the urban atmosphere that is perilous today in many communities. Our town still only has the one traffic light, and the people still smile at each other and engage in conversation that is reminiscent of the small town I grew up in nearly 75 years ago.

Now the area is showing some more growth, as other families recognize the potential for the good life. The old generations are still guiding the location as the new generations are assuming the roles of care-takers. More and more people are in search of what we've had over the decades and, with the increased concerns in other locations, it is no wonder our area is being sought out for a stable place to grow and raise a family. Paradise? No! But the location and environment that many wish they could find? You bet! We're still very happy that we found the west side of Nassau County, those many years ago.

Naturally Nassau: Vacations End, But Memories Remain

Our 2021 Montana vacation has ended, but we made lots of memories. Some of them are funny, some are sweet and some are downright strange. All will be cherished, though. I wrote journal entries each day of our trip so I'd remember the sites we saw and the people we met. I'm glad I did. Otherwise, I would probably forget parts of our trip. Since many of you told us you enjoyed hearing about our vacation, I thought I'd share a few of our funnier memories with you.

Hiking Boots: I bought a nice pair of hiking boots years ago when I lived in South Carolina. The boots protected my feet on trails in Tennessee, South Carolina and North Carolina. After moving back to Florida and marrying Stan, the boots traveled with us to Colorado, Utah, Montana and Wyoming. We decided to hike the Bunsen Peak Trail our first day in Yellowstone. Horse Walk: Hayden and I decided to horseback ride in both Yellowstone and Glacier. The rides were beautiful and gave us a different perspective of both national parks. Laughing, he proceeded to make fun of my after-along-horseback-ride walk. Thankfully, he did not get a picture of my bowlegged gait!
