Nassau County has 74,467 registered voters. Of those registered voters, only 22,872 (30.71%) cast their votes on August 23, 2022. Locally, voters elected two new County Commissioners and two new Port Authority Commissioners. In the County Commission race for District 4 (Hilliard, Bryceville), Alyson McCullough won with 10,067 votes with George Spicer coming in second with 6,028 votes, both beating incumbent Thomas Ford. County Commission District 2 (Fernandina),

A.M. "Hupp" Huppmann won easily with 62.59% of the votes totaling 13,612 to beat incumbent Aaron Bell. Two School Board seats, District 3 and District 1 will go to the General Election in November for a run-off due to FL Statutes for a universal nonpartisan election, one candidate must win at least 51% of the vote.

As we move to the General Election in November, let's all exercise our right to vote and be informed about who and what we're voting for.

The Hilliard Town Council met Thursday night for their final regular meeting of August. The first part of the meeting included public comment.

"My concern is the potholes in the streets," said Kevin Webb. "They just keep getting bigger."

"We fixed the one at Pine and Oxford Street and also the one at 6th and Oxford. We'll keep a watch on it as the rainy season comes," said Public Works Director Ritchie Rowe.


"I'm okay with apartments coming on Oxford Street. My concern is what about safety. We don't have enough Fire-Rescue for everyone now," said Alzada Harrell. "Everyone wants to build but no one thinks about safety. We have people on top of people. Also, I want everyone to know that drug dealers aren't the only people that live on Oxford Street!"

"On addressing the Fire Rescue situation, we (council) have no say so, as the Fire Rescue is managed by the county," said Councilman Jared Wollitz. "I would suggest you call your County Commissioner and tell him your thoughts. I'm calling them constantly about a new fire station in this district."

The first agenda item concerned the approval of Resolution 2022-10. The resolution concerns construction of a New Box Hangar at the Hilliard Airpark. The entire project will be paid by the FDOT at a cost of \$340,000.

The next agenda item was the approval of an updated contract for the town Building Official/Inspection Service for Bryan Higginbotham. "Mr. Higginbotham has reworked his normal schedule and will still be able to service the town in a timely fashion on Wednesdays and Fridays," said Purvis.

The council approved the updated contract with the new days of service.

The following item was a recommendation from the Planning & Zoning Board to appoint LeeAnn Wollitz to the board for the remainder of Dallis Hunter's term, which ends in December 2023.

The council approved the recommendation.

The council approved the Capital Budgeted ADAPCO Mosquito Larvicide Sprayer purchase of \$5,480. "This will allow us to spray low wet areas, ditches, storm drains, etc. for mosquito larvae and use our fogger at night," said technician Charles Chavarria.

The final agenda item was authorization for a Swim Meet. "Gabe is unable to be here tonight however he asked me to request authorization to host a Swim Meet at the town pool with Hilliard High School, West Nassau High School and Bishop Kenny High School," asked Beasley. "We're not sure when it will be but we wanted to make sure it was approved."

The council approved the request.

In closing comments, Town Clerk Lisa Purvis announced that there would not be a Hilliard election as no one was opposed. Congratulations to future Mayor John Beasley and future Councilmen Joe Michaels and Dallis Hunter.

The next meeting of the council will be Thursday, September 1 at 7 p.m.





As a pastor, I do a lot of funerals. Funerals are very sobering reminders of my future. Unless Jesus returns, somebody is going to do my funeral one day. I am like most people; I want to push the idea of death as far back into my consciousness as I can. I don't want to think about death or dying. I want to act like I am going to live forever. This is not healthy. I am not trying to be morbid, but there is something healthy about thinking about death. Thinking about death will have good and

profound benefits on living your life in the present.

Oftentimes I ask at funerals, what you going to be doing 20 billion years from now? As a Christian, I know that death is inevitable. I also know that death is not the end of the story. After death and the intermediate state, eternity is going to ensue. Everybody that has ever existed is going to be bodily resurrected. For the believer, the eternal state will be one of reward and joy. For the unbeliever, the eternity will be a nightmare of epic proportions. Since this is true, the truth of death and eternity should change the way we live in the present.

In II Corinthians 5:9-10, Paul shows us how death, the intermediate state, and eternity should impact our behavior in the present. With the reality of death and eternity, we cannot go on living with business as usual. Death and eternity change our ambitions. In 5:9, Paul says that whether we are at home or away, we make it our aim to be pleasing to him. Right now, while I am in this body, I am not with Jesus. Death and eternity will allow me to be with Jesus. In this body, in this realm of existence, I am only in a temporary dwelling. I look forward to the resurrection and to eternity. So much so, that the reality of the future, changes me in the present. Since I will be with Jesus one day, I want to please him in the present. My highest ambition is not to make a name for myself or make a lot of money for myself. My highest ambition is to please Christ.

Not only do I aspire to please Christ, I am accountable to Christ. Paul is addressing believers in verse 10. Paul wants to impress upon us the reality that we would like to forget, we will all appear at the judgment seat of Christ. We are going to be repaid for what we did in our bodies, whether it was good or bad. What if we do everything that we do in our bodies right now? Our bodies will be resurrected so that we can be repaid for what we did in our bodies. I know that there is no condemnation for those that are in Christ (Rom. 8:1). This grand truth does not mean that we are not accountable for what we do in our bodies in the present. I desperately want to hear Jesus' words: *"Well done thy good and faithful servant. You have been faithful over a few things, I will make you master over many. Enter into the joy of the Lord."* Matthew 25:21. 

Luau Held at Westside Senior Center



After forcing a threeand-out on the ensuing drive, the Flashes offense went right back to work and began the scoring festivities with a Walker Avera 6-yard touchdown run, recovering from the lost fumble on the prior drive. With the extra point good, the Flashes struck first, going up 7-0. Same song, second verse for the Flashes as Lyle Bennett connected with Bradyn Matto over the middle for a 41yard score. After the extra point was good, the Flashes closed out the first quarter with a healthy 14-0 lead.

Defensively, the Flashes held their own, forcing 2 turnovers and holding the Pirates' offense to 7 points. Damon Kibler led the charge with 5 tackles; Colton Conner had 3 tackles; Tucker Pickett had 2 tackles and a sack; Brogan Johns, Klayton Bright and Jacob Hoover each had 2 tackles.
