Flashes Win Kickoff Classic

A picture perfect Friday evening with the Florida humidity remaining as prevalent as ever. The smell of a freshly cut 100-yard field filling the evening air, whistles blowing, both stands filled to the gills with excited fans and hopeful parents, and the bands playing their fight songs. What do all these things have



in common? They all set the stage for the return of high school football. Coming off their best season in recent memory, the Hilliard Flashes return to the field under the glow of the Friday night lights as they traveled to renew their rivalry with the Fernandina Beach Pirates in the annual Kickoff Classic.

In the first quarter, it was a struggle in the trenches. Offensive momentum was consistently stalled by penalties that also included a Flashes turnover when the Pirates recovered a fumble.

The tide began to turn in the second quarter and the Flashes defense became the catalyst for the momentum shift thanks to a fumble recovery by Walker Avera after a low snap out of shotgun. The Flashes did use the turnover to generate points off of it when D.J. Coston found daylight off the right side



to find pay dirt from 7-yards out. After the extra point was pushed wide to the left, the Flashes got out to an early 6-0 lead. The Pirates looked to answer with a drive of their own and they took to the skies to make that happen. But the Flashes' bend but don't break defense held true as they kept the Pirates out of the end zone and went into halftime with the 6-0 lead.

It was more of the same in the second half; both teams were able to push the ball down the field, but the defenses stood tall and left the third quarter scoreless. In the fourth quarter, the Flashes were able to create momentum. Special teams blocked the Pirates punt setting the offense up inside the Pirates 28-yard line. Two plays later, the Flashes found the end zone again using the legs of Coston and the assist from the push up the middle springing Coston from 24-yards out into the end zone. After a failed 2-point try, the Flashes added a little more distance to the margin extending the lead to 12-0. The Flashes defense rose tall with a crucial 4th down stop, and as the clock struck triple zeros. The Flashes struck down the Pirates and silenced their home crowd winning a low-scoring, penalty-filled Kickoff Classic 12-0.

Skewed report on the School Board meeting

Dear Editor,

I both attended and spoke at the School Board meeting on Tuesday, August 17. All of the press' reports on this meeting were skewed toward the minority of those who attended and who spoke and who supported mandatory mask requirements. As someone who, as an interim Superintendent, assisted several School Boards in navigating the treacherous waters of challenging issues that were contentious, I am well aware of best practices in such a situation. Dr. Burns identified 5 local physicians who were her subject experts providing input prior to the Board decision regarding masks. The best practice would have been to read their joint statement and recommendation or their individual ones or having those physicians present do so prior to the public comment portion. Instead, they were interspersed among the public comment which was disingenuous, at best, and, more likely, an effort to control the public comment portion and "offset" the excellent presentations by individuals who supported the individual parent's right to choose. None of the physicians who spoke were epidemiologists or pediatric epidemiologist, therefore not subject experts.

During my three minutes, I presented an opinion piece from the Wall Street Journal on August 8, entitled The Case Against Masks For Children written by the Chief of Pediatric Epidemiology Services at Tufts Children's Hospital. He and his coauthor are the highly qualified specialists we should be listening to. Here are some excerpts: Do masks reduce Covid transmission in children? Believe it or not, we could find only a single retrospective study on the question, and its results were inconclusive. Yet two weeks ago the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention sternly decreed that 56 million U.S. children and adolescents, vaccinated or not, should cover their faces regardless of the prevalence of infection in their community. Authorities in many places took the cue to impose mandates in schools and elsewhere, on the theory that masks can't do any harm.

That isn't true. Some children are fine wearing a mask, but others struggle. Masks can cause severe acne and other skin problems. The discomfort of a mask distracts some children from learning. By increasing airway resistance during exhalation, masks can lead to increased levels of carbon dioxide in the blood. And masks can be vectors for pathogens if they become moist or are used for too long. In March, Ireland's Department of Health announced that it won't require masks in schools because they "may exacerbate anxiety or breathing difficulties for some students."

The adverse developmental effects of

requiring masks for a few weeks are probably minor. We can't say that with any confidence when the practice stretches on for months or years. Children have been known to transmit Covid, but far less often than adults do. A North Carolina study conducted before vaccines were available found not a single case of student-to-teacher transmission when 90,000 students were in school.

The CDC's mask decrees are perversely permissive as well as needlessly strict. Cloth masks aren't nearly as effective as N95 respirators, but the CDC directives ignore the distinction.

Any child who wants to wear a mask should be free to do so. But forcing them to make personal, health and developmental sacrifices for the sake of adults who refuse to get immunized is abusive. Before we order the masking of 56 million Americans who are too young to vote and don't have a lobby, let's see data showing the benefits and weigh them against the long-term harm.

Thank you, Mr. President! Wherever you are this week!



Hilliard Town News

The Hilliard Town Council met Thursday night for their final meeting of August. Jennifer Mezera addressed the council concerning the Boonedocks Junction property being for sale. "The owners and myself felt like it was a good opportunity to give the Town of Hilliard first option of buying this historical property," said Mezera. "I will give each of you a description of the property and would like to talk about it at your next meeting if possible. I think it would be a great value for the town."

The first order of business was the second and final reading of Ordinance 2021-06 which concerned Amending Chapter 62 Zoning and Land Development Regulations Code, Section 62-359 Accessory Uses and Structures. The council approved the ordinance.

Sean Lahav, representing the Northeast Florida Regional Council addressed the council concerning the Northeast Florida COVID-19 Economic Recovery Plan. "I am the Resiliency Coordinator for the NE FL Regional Council. We cover 25 counties," said Lahav. "Through the recovery plan, Hilliard will receive \$1.6 million. The money must be spent on Infrastructure; Small Business; and or Equity. Infrastructure would include Broadband; water/sewer needs, etc. Small Business – can be viewed with Jacksonville Chamber Best Practices. Equity would include Mental Health Needs; Affordable Housing, etc. The town would receive the money by 2024 and must be used by 2026."

"That's one thing we do not have enough of in Hilliard, affordable housing," said Councilman Kenny Sims. "Is that something we could further look in to?"

"Most definitely. Especially, if the town has some property that would be available for the housing," added Lahav.

The next four items concerned work at the Hilliard Airpark that is paid for by the FAA and the FDOT. The Resolutions include: 2021-18; 2021-19; 2021-20; and 2021-21. Hilliard Airpark Engineer Bill Prange with AECOM was on hand to give details of each resolution and the costs.

Resolution 2021-17 also partially included Hilliard Airpark business. The resolution is to accept a Florida Department of Transportation offer of a Public Transportation Grant Agreement. This agreement will allow an Environmental Assessment for the north and south property acquisitions at the Hilliard Airpark. Prange explained this as, "The Federal Aviation must have any properties that they are acquiring to be searched in an area for any type of archeological findings prior to acquiring the property."

"Will the owners of the properties be notified of this prior to," asked Councilwoman Callie Bishop.

"Yes, the owners will be notified before anything occurs," answered Prange.

The council approved the resolution. "We (the Town) were notified by our grant writer, Fred Fox, concerning the Rebuild Florida CDBG Mitigation General Infrastructure Program," said Town Clerk Lisa Purvis. "I am asking authorization to complete the forms, have the mayor sign and return them. The town has a chance of \$6.5 million, which would rehab all the sewer lines from Bay Road to 7th Street."

The council approved the request.

The next meeting will be Thursday, September 2 at 7 p.m.

Back to School with Classes, Covid and Calculations

On Tuesday, August 10, things got back to "normal" for many families throughout Nassau County. The buses rolled out, the school bells rang, breakfast was served, and students returned to class. For some of our students, this was the first time back to school in a long time, and for others, after a brief summer break. We are happy to report that the first days of school were a success! As we begin the 2021-2022 school year, we want to take the time to CELEBRATE the unprecedented 2020-2021 year! Nassau County's students continued to learn despite learning options, quarantines, and COVID, as evidenced by the Florida Standards Assessment Data.

The results are in! Here are our district-level results (percent of students scoring level 3 and higher) and our district's ranking in the state:

ENGLISH-LANGUAGE ARTS:
Grade 3: 68% - #2 in the state; Grade 4: 72% - #2 in the state; Grade 5: 78% - #1 in the state; Grade 6: 62% - #2 in the state; Grade 7: 61% - #2 in the state; Grade 8: 63% - #3 in the state; Grade 9: 59% - #5 in the state; and Grade 10: 58% - #8 in the state.

MATHEMATICS: Grade 3: 79% - #1 in the state; Grade 4: 85% - #1 in the state; Grade 5: 88% - #1 in the state; Grade 6: 74% - #1 in the state; Grade 7: 74% - #2 in the state; Grade 8: 48% - #8 in the state.

SCIENCE: Grade 5: 76% - #1 in the state; Grade 8: 65% - #3 in the state.

Grade 3-10 **ENGLISH-LANGUAGE ARTS:** 65% - #2 in the state. Grade 3-8 **MATHEMATICS:** 78% - #1 in the state.

As we enter week 3 of this school year, we are once again dealing with the impact of COVID on our communities and families. The school district has implemented cleaning and fogging protocols, encouraged regular hand sanitizing, and is in the process of replacing the plexiglass in school cafeterias. In addition, on Tuesday, August 17, the board approved a mask requirement for students: "In order to keep ALL students safe and to prevent the spread of COVID-19 in our schools and classrooms, we are temporarily requiring all students to wear face masks while indoors. If this requirement is an issue for you and your child because of health concerns or individual freedoms, you may complete the "opt-out" form and return it to your child's school."

Forms can be found on the district website at: www.nassau.k12.fl.us and are also available at the front office of each school. Forms should be completed and returned by Friday, August 27.






