## **Callahan Chainsaw Artist Living His Dream**



Recently I had the privilege to spend some time with Callahan resident Brandon Yantis. Brandon was raised in Callahan but shortly after finishing school he moved away, as many do. Trying to find his niche, he first tried out tattooing. To do tattoos you have to be a good artist with a creative mind. As a tattoo artist, Brandon thrived. He is so talented and so creative in what he does, however he was self-taught. He tattooed for 18 years and decided to move on.

He later learned the trade of welding, self-taught. He enjoyed what he did and excelled within his trade. Welding was again something he could do for work but on the side continued to try different things while welding. "I had some tough times growing up. There were a lot of complications in my life that still remain bottled up," said Brandon. "Welding is a tough job and you have to be precise in what you are doing. It helps me to relax to work on my own."

One day while hanging out at his sister's home in Callahan, he noticed a log and thought 'I bet I could carve something on this.' He picked up a chainsaw and carved a cross in the end of the stump in a short amount of time. The satisfaction he felt by being able to carve a cross so fast got his mind working. It was then that he decided to try out being a chainsaw artist. He has numerous pictures from when he started





and what he is doing now. What an improvement he has shown. Brandon had a booth at the Railroad Day Festival this past April. He did several pieces at the festival. The one that grabbed everyone's eye was the carving he did for Joel Pace Piano. He carved musical notes on a piece of wood and gave it to Joel. He was thrilled and the finished piece was beautiful.

Currently, he is working at a private home where the homeowner is renovating his home. The home is in Jacksonville and sits on an inlet off the river. He is carving a lighthouse. Not just a lighthouse but with an octopus sliding up the tree. A deck will be built around the tree with the top of the lighthouse as the light. Brandon will also make the light (welding) for the top. "This is one of the biggest projects I've done

and I'm really excited about it," added Brandon. "So far I'm very pleased with how it looks. I want my carvings to look different than anyone's."

Brandon has only been doing the chainsaw carvings for a year. When looking through a book, he realized he doesn't even have the correct tools to do what he does...he just has a chainsaw. He has recently added carving bars to his tools. I can't wait to see what he will do with the right tools! He was looking at the national magazine Woodcarving Illustrated when he noticed they (magazine) were asking for artists to send some of their photos of their work. Just to see what happened, Brandon sent in two pictures: one of his prize wolf; and the other a dolphin. One of Brandon's carvings (dolphin) appeared in the Fall 2021 issue of the magazine. He was shocked but thrilled.



### In Response

Dear Editor,

I do not care for your misinformation on medicines concerning COVID. You claimed Hydroxychloroquine, Ivermectin and Ciclesonide to be effective, however: The National Institutes of Health clinical trial evaluating the safety and effectiveness of hydroxychloroquine for the treatment of adults with coronavirus disease, (COVID-19), has formally concluded that the drug provides no clinical benefit to hospitalized patients. Ivermectin is most commonly given to livestock as an anti-parasitic, but people are now buying the product for themselves in an effort to stay protected from COVID. Using Ivermectin for COVID is not recommended by the FDA and isn't proven to be effective. Ciclesonide study results were not positive, although there was a trend toward earlier cough cessation in the ciclesonide group. Further studies may want to look at whether this treatment may prevent or lessen post-acute COVID-19 syndrome however healthcare professionals say there is currently insufficient evidence that inhaled corticosteroids (Ciclesonide) are beneficial for people with COVID-19.

HOWEVER...when you mentioned our freedom being taken away, I agree. No government body should be able to dictate how we live our lives. If I want to drive 120 mph through a school zone, who is the county or state or federal government to tell me no, it's my right to do so. Why do they put speed limits up? ## In the Kitchen...

#### Friday's Supper Casserole

4 large potatoes, sliced cheddar cheese, sliced

salt and pepper to taste

1 lb. ground chuck

1 medium onion, chopped 1 - 10 oz. can cream of mushroom soup

Boil potatoes in lightly salted water until tender. Drain and set aside. In a skillet, brown ground meat and chopped onion. Sprinkle liberally with salt and black pepper while browing. Drain and set aside. In a 2-quart casserole dish, layer ingredients as follows: potatoes, meat/onion mixture, cream of mushroom soup (undiluted) and sliced cheese. Repeat layers until all ingredients are used. Use extra cheese on top layer. Cover and bake at 350° for 30 minutes.



4. Party Pay is the way to go! If you have four people in your group (party) then it is \$25 each person, per month. 
## Labor Day Was God's Idea

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


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### Westside Journal Visits Washington State!

With local healthcare systems at capacity, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the Florida Department of Health continue to recommend all residents take action to avoid exposure and continue responsible infection control measures (i.e. stay home when sick, cover coughs and sneezes, wash hands well and often, keep hands away from the face, avoid crowded spaces, clean/disinfect touched surfaces, avoid close contact with nonhousehold members) regardless of vaccination status.





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




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## **Flashes Tame Wolfpack in Home Opener**

Fresh off their win, the Hilliard Flashes returned home for the first time this season as they welcomed the Wolfson Wolfpack to Flashes Field on a muggy, breezy, overcast evening under the lights.

The Flashes opened the game on defense. The Wolfpack drove the ball down the field, but the Flashes rose tall and forced a turnover on downs. The Flashes set up shop with prime field position courtesy of their defense and took full advantage of it using the legs of workhorse DJ Coston. With the assist of a tremendous push from the offensive line, the seas parted and Coston sprung free and kicked on the afterburners for a 49-yard touchdown run. With the extra point good, the Flashes sprung out to an early 7-0 lead. After that score, there wasn't much headway on offense for both teams as the Flashes left the first quarter with a 7-0 lead.

When a bowling ball rolls downhill, it generates momentum and it cannot be stopped. That was the case for the Flashes in the second quarter. It started on offense when Coston found daylight up the middle and scored from 16 yards out. With the extra point good, the Flashes built the score up a little to 14-0. But wait, there's more! DJ's brother, Dylan Coston contributed to the effort as he recovered a muffed kick on the ensuing kickoff setting the Flashes up at the Wolfpack 38 yard line. On the very next play, Lyle Bennett joined in on the scoring fun as he busted through a hole on the left side of the o-line and showed off his wheels for a 38-yard touchdown run. With the extra point short, the Flashes extended the lead to 20-0. The



defense got in on the fun when Chris Northern read the quarterback's eyes and intercepted a pass, causing the first turnover on the night. The Flashes then parlayed the turnover into another touchdown thanks to Walker Avera as he busted through the Wolfpack defense for an 11-yard touchdown run. After a failed 2-point conversion, the Flashes strengthened the lead to 26-0. The defense continued the good vibration with another interception, this time in triple coverage as the Flashes went into halftime with a comfortable 26-0 lead.

Looking to continue scoring, the Flashes opened the second half with the football. Same song, second verse! The Flashes offense repeated their success. It started off on the legs of DJ Coston, this time with a 9-yard score. With the extra point missed, the lead grew to 32-0. On the next defensive drive, the Flashes created another turnover with an interception courtesy of Damon Kibler. The Flashes then used the turnover to find the end zone again, this time it only took 2 plays to do it. Braydon Holley scored from 1-yard out. A missed extra point led the Flashes to grow the lead 38-0, but they wouldn't be done scoring just yet. After the defense forced another turnover on downs, the Flashes offense kept their foot on the gas and used what got them to where they were all night: the run game, done courtesy of Avera, this time with a 36-yard touchdown. The Flashes ended the third quarter in full cruise control leading 44-0.

While they may have been beaten down, the Wolfpack did not give up and kept fighting until the final whistle. It took them to the fourth quarter to get the Wolfpack on the board and they used the ground game to do it with a 1-yard touchdown run. With a failed 2-point conversion, the Wolfpack started to cut the deficit down slowly and continued to build momentum. The Wolfpack took advantage of a botched kickoff by the Flashes and generated a scoring drive using a combination of both the run and pass and it led to them having a 9-yard touchdown. With a successful 2-point conversion, the Wolfpack continued



to widdle the deficit down. Despite scoring 16 unanswered points, it was not enough for the Wolfpack to stop the offensive onslaught by the Flashes and the Flashes gave the hometown crowd something to cheer about with a 44-16 domination over the Wolfpack.

Offensively, the Flashes dominated from start to finish, generating 382 yards of total offense with 334 of them coming on the ground. Leading the charge was DJ Coston with 12 carries for 169 yards and 3 touchdowns; Walker Avera had 4 carries for 65 yards and 2 touchdowns; Lyle Bennett had 3 carries for 45 yards and a touchdown; Braydon Holley had 5 carries for 34 yards and a touchdown; and Brogan Johns had 3 carries for 20 yards. Bennett went 3/8 for 48 yards. On the receiving end were Coston with a catch for 18 yards; Dylan Coston and Bradyn Matto each having a catch for 15 yards.

Defensively, the Flashes forced 4 turnovers which led to 25 points; 2 turnover on downs; and 4 sacks. Avera led the charge with 5 tackles and a sack; Angelo Benjamin had 4 tackles; Gerald Clamp had 3 tackles, a sack, and a forced fumble; Kibler had 3 tackles and an interception; Colton Conner and Travis Sapp had 3 tackles; Dylan Coston had 2 tackles and a fumble recovery; Holley and Klayton Bright had 2 tackles; and Northern had a tackle, a pass breakup, and 2 interceptions.

This Friday, the Flashes look to continue the positive momentum as they travel to face the Stanton Blue Devils with a 6:30 p.m. kickoff! Come out and support your hometown team. Go Flashes!



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
