Agricultural Fair. She also provides workshops, advice, leadership and guidance for many.





Judges Complete Computer **Forensics** Course



Judge Steve Fahlgren and 21 other judges from around the country recently attended a federally sponsored, week long Computer Forensics for Judges Course at the National Computer Forensics Institute (NCFI) in Hoover, Alabama. The NCFI is a partnership between the United States Secret Service, Department of Homeland Security, State of Alabama, and The National Judicial College. The course uses a combination of lectures and practical exercises to familiarize judges with computer, network, and mobile device technology and the emerging legal concepts related to the admissibility and use of digital evidence in judicial proceedings.

Digital evidence is more and more the norm. In Riley v. California, 573 U.S. 373 (2014), the Supreme Court ruled that law enforcement must generally have a warrant to search the contents of a cell phone even if the cell phone is

seized incident to an arrest because "cell phones, as a category, implicate privacy concerns far beyond those implicated by the search of a cigarette pack, a wallet, or a purse." Phones and computers have much larger storage capacity than ever. For example, many authorities believe that the printed text in the Library of Congress could be stored with 20 terabytes of computer data. In recent times, there has been an explosion of digital data including pictures, movies and documents. Phones are sometimes considered a person's "castle in the cloud." Currently, an iPhone 11 Pro 512GB could hold approximately 1/40th of the digitized text of all of the printed books in the Library of Congress.

Wow, the hurricane saga continues. There have been a few close calls and lots of concern in the Atlantic. Thank goodness we've been very fortunate by dodging the worst part of these storms. I say it all the time, a ten degree shift in a storm's path and we'd have a completely different outcome. With that said, if the forecast holds true, it looks like we will be receiving more wind this weekend. The heaviest portion is expected along the coast. This could be a good thing in a sense right? Why or why not? Well these easterly flows keep our tides pushed in. That in return makes our tide swell and the bottom line is it creates much tougher tide to fish. Predator fish like moving water and an easterly wind on an outgoing tide is no good. On the incoming, the wind usually pushes the water in extremely fast. With all that said, a nor'easter really is a good thing. It solidifies the fact that we are in a true fall pattern and that's what triggers our fish to eat.

Typically, flounder move in during the first big push, but to have several nor'easters back to back, boy that should definitely fire them off. Our inshore species will stack up all over Northeast Florida from now on through November. I can honestly say that I am ready.

So where are the fish? Well as of right now, most of them have continued to be stacked up at the beach and our Jetties. Why? That's where the majority of the bait has been. Nearly every species of predatory fish are out there gorging on mullet as they begin their annual migration south. Trout, red fish, tarpon and a variety of sharks are in the mix to clean up. Clean water is the key and the incoming tide still seems to be the best tide to fish. Obviously the best bait at the moment is going to be live finger mullet. Man oh man, there are schools everywhere, so make sure you have your cast net handy.

Flounder are getting bigger and there have been some studs caught in Mayport as well! They are still spread out but the bite and numbers are picking up. Look for them to only get better throughout next month. Keep your eyes and ears out. When that bite in the St. John's River picks up, you'll want to be on it. When they make their run in the river, they will be eating anything in their path.

Lastly, look out for the sheepshead as well now! They are really firing off. Hope you all have a great weekend. Be safe out there and I hope to see you on the water!

Implosion

On Wednesday evenings, I have been preaching through the Minor Prophets. I know that this may not sound all that thrilling, but these neglected books are full of powerful truth for our current time. In the book of Malachi, we see that God's people have returned from exile and they have been back in their land for almost 150 years at the time of Malachi's ministry. You would think that this would have been a great time of spiritual vitality, but this was an unprecedented time of spiritual decay. The nation was not

prospering it was decaying.

The reason that this is so incredibly alarming is because we find ourselves in a time that is very similar to 5th century BC Israel. History has a funny way of repeating itself. Edward Gibbon wrote a masterful work on the fall of the Roman Empire. Throughout his six volume set on why the Roman Empire fell, he lists five major reasons. Gibbon was not a Christian, he was a secularist and he partially blames Christianity for the fall of the empire. Two of his reasons for the fall of the Roman Empire really grabbed my attention. For our purposes, Gibbon blamed the implosion of the empire on the weakening of the family and the widespread practice of divorce throughout the empire. Again, Gibbon was not a Christian, but he understood how a weakened family will produce a weak state.

The second relevant factor was the decay of religion. Gibbon is a little difficult to follow on this, but his conclusion is sound. From Gibbon's vantage point, he blamed Christianity's worldview for making its adherents bad citizens of Rome. Christian's were not patriotic because they had their ultimate hope in another world. While Gibbon did not appreciate this, our hope should be in another kingdom. So this understanding of ultimate allegiances is a sign of faithfulness to the Gospel. However, his observation concerning religion is very helpful for us to consider.

Before the time of Constantine, the Roman Empire persecuted Christians. In the 300's the Roman Emperor Constantine made Christianity the official religion of the state. When the church suffered, it was strong; when the church was privileged it became weak and started to implode from within. Instead of trusting in the gospel, the church began to trust in political favor. This lead to a hollowing out of true Christianity and Christianity became more ritualistic and ceremonial and a lot less powerful. Gibbon's conclusion is that Rome did not fall because of invaders from outside of the empire, Rome imploded from within. As Americans and more importantly, as Christians, may we see the absolute necessity of the power of the Gospel. Decay is happening all around us. Only the Gospel can stop the decay. Rome wasn't built in a day and Rome did not die in a day. It was a slow death marked by decay from the inside.

The Hilliard Town Council met Thursday night for their final meeting of September. Two public hearings were held prior to the actual meeting concerning amending Chapter 62 Zoning and Land Development Regulations, however there was no public comment for either ordinance.

The first order of business concerned the possible large project on US 1 being discussed with Mr. Bobby Franklin, contractor of the project.

The council held a workshop with Mr. Franklin where the council requested Mr. Franklin to have a traffic NAS study done concerning the project. The council will wait until the study is done to discuss further plans about the project with Mr. Franklin.

Per Town Clerk Lisa Purvis, Planning & Zoning Board the met September 10 and approved unanimously Ordinance 2019-07 and Ordinance 2019-08.

Second and final reading was held on Ordinance 2019-07 which concerned amending Chapter 62 Zoning and Land Development Regulations of the Hilliard Town Code; amending Section 62-287 Mobile Home District RMH. "We are adding Recreational Vehicles to this section, correct?" asked Council President John Beasley.

"Yes. That is the only change," added Purvis.

The council approved the ordinance.

Second and final reading was held on Ordinance 2019-08 which concerned amending Chapter 62 Zoning and Land Development Regulations of the Hilliard Town Code; amending Section 62-355 Mobile Homes and Temporary Offices. "Exceptions will be reviewed twice a year for new homes, correct?" asked Beasley. "That is correct,"

answered Purvis.

"There are six (6) homes that are exempt from the new amendment, correct?" asked Councilman Lee Pickett. "This change does not affect those six residents. If we did not change this it would have," answered Town Attorney Christian Waugh.

The council approved the ordinance.

Town Clerk Lisa Purvis advised the council that bids went out for Grant Administrators and we only received one proposal. The proposal came

from Fred Fox & Associates, which is our current Grant Administrator. These proposals were sent to our local papers plus Jacksonville. Their fee is before you: \$52,000 for grant writing and \$5,000 for

applications. I am requesting to approve and sign the contract. The council approved Fred Fox & Associates.

Purvis also advised the council that bids went out for Engineering Services for the Community Development Block Grant FFY 2018. Again, we only had one proposal from Mittauer & Associates, Inc. Their cost is also before you: \$105,700. I am requesting to approve and sign the contract. The council approved Mittauer & Associates, Inc. for Engineering Services.

Assistant Public Works Director Greg Grooms requested approval to repair storm drains on W. Sixth Street off of a state contract using Enivrowaste Services Group, Inc. "The project will replace the basin, 1 storm drain, lining, repairing the manhole and filling around it," said Grooms. "The cost will be \$14,129."

The council approved the repair. The next meeting of the council will

be Thursday, October 3 at 7 p.m.


Once these ladies have decided to move


Also want to make sure we give a shout out to William Carroll who made a 40-yard field goal for the Warriors and also went 4 of 4 on extra points. Overall,
