The Callahan Journey Food Store had a soft opening last Wednesday, August 26. I say soft opening because there was still some outside landscaping happening along with making sure that any glitches were all worked out. Journey Food Store is a family owned and operated business, owned by Max and Stephanie Davis of Macclenny.

They own another store which is located in Glen St. Mary. "What started as a run to Hilliard for some hay, turned out to be



an opportunity," said Max. "I passed the property and thought this would be a good place for another store. We did some checking into the property and purchased it, then began the process."

The property is located caddy cornered across from Cedar River Seafood and right beside the Country Financial Credit Union. The store, offering Mobil gas, houses 6 diesel pumps in the rear of the building and 12

pumps in the front of the store. They offer regular and premium non-ethanol, farm diesel and regular diesel. The store is a very handy convenience store along with a truck stop for tractor-trailers to fuel up or catch a nap. When finished and striped, there will be 24 parking spaces in the rear for semis. Truckers will be able to freshen up with

a shower, enjoy a hot meal and rest if necessary. There's even an outside eating area with fans. Entry and exiting from the store are very convenient. Coming from US 1 north, entry can be made by turning right on Old Dixie Highway and entering from the rear of the property or you can turn right directly off of US 1. Entering from US 1 south, drivers must turn left onto Old Dixie Highway and enter from the rear. To exit, heading

back into Callahan, you exit in the front drive; heading north you must exit onto Old Dixie Highway and turn left to continue traveling.

Little Caesars Pizza is located in the store and they also have a drive-thru. Orders can be made in the drive-thru or come in the store to order your favorite selection! They have your normal convenience store items along with JOYO ice cream and frozen yogurt, available in regular cones, waffle cones or cups along with about 15 toppings.



They also offer Icees and specialty coffees with all kinds of creamers. Their deli serves cookies and cinnamon rolls and eventually will offer salads, sub sandwiches, taco salads, etc. They are currently offering pulled pork sandwiches.

The store is decorated with an array of wildlife, far beyond anyone's reach. It's a beautiful display and fits right in with the many hunters we have in our area. "During the initial set-up we had all hands on deck!" continued Max. "My wife and mother were in the deli and training in Little Caesars. My father was also here helping in any way he could and of course, I've been here tying up loose ends everywhere! It's truly a family business! We are so excited to be in Callahan and we look forward to being a huge part of this community for



years to come."

Journey Food Store Callahan is open 24 hours a day 7 days a week and they are still looking for employees. If you are interested, just visit the store and pick up an application.

Successful Hazardous Waste Collection Event

Nassau County residents showed strong support for the rescheduled spring Household Hazardous Waste Collection (HHWC) event on Saturday, August 15. In addition to collection of hazardous waste, residents also supported Barnabas Food Pantry during the event with the donation of 1,068 pounds (1/2 ton) of non-perishable food items.

Historically, averages of 350 residents participate in each Nassau County HHWC event. This year's event was an exception. During the same 4-hour period, 538 residents participated in the event making this the largest Nassau County event on





record. The event was scheduled as a contactless collection; residents were asked to stay in their vehicles and allow volunteers and staff to remove approved items from their vehicles. For the first time in event history, two residency verification stations were set up so two rows of vehicles could be processed simultaneously. Volunteers and staff worked through the sweltering heat at an average speed of 45 seconds per vehicle!

Twelve Keep Nassau Beautiful (KNB) Board Members and community volunteers, and approximately fifteen temporary staff were outfitted with

masks and gloves to unload resident vehicles and sort approved items for proper disposal or recycling. The 12 volunteers donated more than 60 hours of time on the day of the event.

It may be more than 30 days before full reporting on the weight and type of items collected, until then it is estimated electronics and latex paint will once again be in the top 3 items collected. "Year after year one of the most popular items for disposal during the HHWC event is latex paint. Many residents aren't aware they can dispose of latex paint throughout the year by following a few easy steps," said Lynda Bell, Executive Director for KNB. The steps include the purchase of any brand of cat litter. Add the cat litter to the latex paint can. Leave the lid off and give the

mixture time to dry out and solidify. Once the mixture has solidified the latex paint is not considered a hazardous waste. The can and solidified mixture may be disposed of during regular trash collection which may allow tax dollars to be used for disposal of other household hazardous waste items.

Becky Diden, Nassau County Solid Waste Recycle Coordinator, reminds residents the Nassau County Solid Waste Department Tire Amnesty Day is scheduled for September 12. "While Nassau County residents may dispose of up to 4 tires per household per year, Tire Amnesty Day provides an additional opportunity to properly dispose of up to 15 tires per household with no fee for disposal," said Diden. KNB and Nassau County Solid Waste Department appreciate Nassau County residents and community volunteers, Nassau County Road Department, Environmental Alachua County Protection Department, U.S. Ecology, Sensible Recycling, Barnabas Food Pantry, and Nassau County Sherriff's Department for their participation in the collection and responsible disposal of household hazardous waste. 

What Divides Us? What Unites Us?

This month, in our church on Sunday mornings, we have begun a study of the book of 1 Corinthians. We refer to the church in Corinth, at that time, as being a "Hot Mess." Paul addresses several problems in the church including sex, food, gatherings, the resurrection and of course, division.

Paul spends the first 4 chapters talking about the division found in this church. He lays out how they are divided by who their leader is: "I appeal to you, brothers, by the name of our Lord

Jesus Christ, that all of you agree, and that there be no divisions among you, but that you be united in the same mind and the same judgment. For it has been reported to me by Chloe's people that there is quarreling among you, my brothers. What I mean is that each one of you says, "I follow Paul," or "I follow Apollos," or "I follow Cephas," or "I follow Christ." Is Christ divided? Was Paul crucified for you? Or were you baptized in the name of Paul?" (1 Corinthians 1:10-13 ESV). The people of the church in Corinth found their status in who their leader was.

It reminds me of my Facebook newsfeed today. I have some very liberal and very conservative friends. Every day different ones make their case with a meme or article showing how great their political leader is and how bad the other is. Then others come along and agree and still others come along and argue. After a few comments, things begin to get ugly.

Today, we have picked our leader and we stand strong for them. We are proud of our party and our leader. But should it cause division? Paul asks us this question in the passage above: "Is Christ divided?" He also urges us: "that all of you agree." Another translation says, "speak the same thing." In fact, the exact definition of the Greek word, "speak" (Strong's 3004), is "to profess one and the same thing."

As Christians, how do we do speak the same thing. Aren't the candidates and the principles and the ideas we all support mutually exclusive? What do we say and do

when our newsfeed is full of political ads, new stories about how each candidate is a liar, protestors and rioters and everyone's opinion on who is right and who is wrong. I found one Christian who has discovered a great response. His name is Sam Bethea and every day he can be found in the streets of Charlotte, NC, holding his written message: "Jesus Saves." Concerning the protests, he said, "With the protesters, you



know, I welcome them. For me, it's a bigger platform than what I normally have being everyday Uptown. So, I'm out here with the same simple message. Good news, Jesus Saves and Jesus loves you."

When our nation is a "Hot Mess," we, as Christians, can speak the same thing. We can proclaim the Gospel to anyone who will listen. Our message to speak the same thing is simply: "Jesus Saves."

Q: I was thinking of putting a birdbath in my garden. What should I know in order for it to work best?

A: Adding a water feature or birdbath to a garden is an excellent idea. You'll find it will attract a wider variety of bird species than



bird feeders. Birds need a clean source of drinking water as well as a place to bathe and preen, clean their feathers. There are several considerations with bird baths such as composition, shape, location and maintenance. The shape and depth in construction material are important considerations and choosing your birdbath. Some birdbaths are simple plastic dishes while others are more ornate made of concrete, plaster or granite. Some baths also have electric or photocell driven recirculating water pumps which add movement and sound to your garden.

Birdbaths can be made from any shallow slope sided container. It's preferable that the container has a textured or rough surface to provide traction for bird feet and allows for other small animals like lizards to escape if they fall in. Water depth should only be an inch or so at the deepest and it's also helpful if the bath is sloped slightly so it has a shallow water portion, gradually deepening into a slightly deeper water level. This accommodates birds of a variety of sizes.

Locating the best placement of the birdbath is also important. Placing the birdbath closer to shrubs and plants provides a quick avenue of cover for birds and also provides shade for the water feature. Shade will also help cool the water and slows the growth of algae and bacteria.

A good maintenance program is also important. Change the water daily or no less than every 48 hours to keep the bath clean. This is particularly important in our hot summer months.

Birdbaths can also become a hatchery for mosquitoes. Refreshing the water on a daily basis or every 48 hours you will remove any mosquito larvae present. You can also buy mosquito larvicide

Q: Can I grow hostas in Nassau County?

A: Hostas are popular plants in various regions of the country because of their broad leaves and ability to fill large spaces in landscaping. However, they can present specific challenges for growing in northeast Florida. They have winter requirements for a certain number of cold days during dormancy, acidic soil preferences and sensitivity to sunlight and salt spray. There are some varieties that do well locally, such as the African hosta (Drimiopsis maculate).

A lovely alternate to a hosta is the peacock ginger (Kaempferia pulchra). This lovely little plant has variegated and dappled leaves, small and delicate



purple flowers, and enjoys shade. It's an excellent ground cover and blooms throughout

growing season. They are recommended for hardiness zones 8 through 11, so they're suitable throughout Nassau County.

Peacock gingers are deciduous, which means they will lose their leaves in the fall and winter but will briefly sprout in late winter/early spring. They are best planted in full shade to dappled sunlight and grow best in rich, well-drained soil. Be sure the soil does not dry out. They also do very well in flower pots and are a lovely accent for landscape patios or shady decks.

Q: My neighbor has some of these plants in her yard. I was thinking about planting some in mine. Someone else said that they are invasive. Can you tell me what they are?

A: Thank you for your question and the photograph you provided. The plant in the photograph, common name elephant ear, Xanthosoma sagittifolum, is a non-native invasive plant species under the prohibited plant list In Florida. Elephant ear have big umbrella elephant ear shaped leaves which are very showy

and dramatic. They have been introduced around Nassau County. This plant grows in a wide range of soil types and moisture levels, sandy soil to wet swampy areas. It can reach 9 feet tall and quickly overwhelming native and Florida friendly plants. The end result is a significant

negative loss of native habitat and any animal communities associated with the native species.

Controlling elephant ear presents certain challenges. Physically removing the roots is one option but one has to be very careful as the leaves contain oxalic acid which can be irritating to exposed skin. Chemical control of elephant ears is somewhat limited. Repeated applications of glyphosates

may be effective if coupled with mechanical removal first. Be sure to follow manufacturers recommendations whenever applying a herbicide.

Another plant that is very close in appearance to elephant ear is the wild taro, Colocasia esculenta. It, too, is invasive but is generally found in wet soil areas. Like elephant ear, taro spreads rapidly and displaces more

> desirable native plants. It can also clog waterways impeding navigation and contribute to increased potential flooding by restricting runoff. These plants grow to over 4 feet tall and spread rapidly. Control is best done by physically removing plants and their root systems.

There are a number of native or Florida-friendly plants to consider that are better alternatives than elephant ears for our area. These plants are not invasive and can provide beautiful foliage and blossoms.

Plants to consider as alternatives to elephant ear are philodendron, many species of gingers, Fatsia, crinum and fire spike. Japanese Holly ferns, Farfugium, and lady palm are also good options.


