

While strolling the internet I came across a News4Jax article titled, "Community in Crisis: Proclamation issued, vigil held in Nassau County for Transgender Day of Remembrance." The General Letters

In today's article, we will overview the fourth group of New Testament writings. So far, we have covered the Gospels, Acts, and Paul's Letters. The fourth group of writings in the New Testament are called the General Letters or the Catholic Letters. In understanding the grouping of these letters, Catholic is not referring to the Roman Catholic Church. The word Catholic means universal and these general letters are given to the universal church. The general letters begin with Hebrews and conclude the book of Jude.

The name is a catchall phrase that refers to all of the New Testament letters that were not written by Paul. Like the letters of Paul, these letters are not in chronological order, they are loosely arranged in order of length. Hebrews is the only letter in the New Testament that is anonymous. James and Jude were written by Jesus' brothers and the letters of Peter and John were written by the two of Jesus' apostles. Let's now turn to our overview of the content of these letters.

- Hebrews: Hebrews is an anonymous letter that is considered a brief word of exhortation (13:22) that exhorts the early Christians to stay faithful to Christ. The message of the book of Hebrews is the supremacy of Christ over Judaism and all things. Hebrews reveals the superiority Christ's person (1-4:13), the superiority of Christ's priesthood (4:14-7), the superiority of Christ's covenant (8-10), and the superiority of the life of faith (11-13).
- James: The book of James is earliest book in the New Testament and was written by Jesus' biological brother. There is not really discernable outline of the book. James is similar to the Old Testament book of Proverbs and has many connections with Jesus' Sermon on the Mount. The overall message of the book of James is the authentic of faith. The most famous passage in the book is faith without works is dead (2:14-26).
- The Letters of 1 and 2 Peter: The books of Peter were written by the Apostle Peter and his purpose for writing was to encourage all Christians to stay faithful to Christ in suffering. The two letters are companions. First Peter prepares the church to stay faithful against opposition from outside of the church. In 1 Peter, we are reminded that we are exiles and aliens in this world (1:1-2). Then Peter gives two responses to the suffering that exiles are to expect in a fallen world. We are to understand our lives in light of the Gospel (1:3-2:12) and we are to maintain vibrant witness to the culture (2:11-4:19). In Second Peter, the church is prepared for dealing with adversity on the inside of the church. Peter reminds his audience that we have everything we need in the Gospel (1:1-21), the church has real enemies (2-3:10), and we have real hope (3:11-18).
- The Letters of John: The three books of John were written by John the Apostle. First John was written to expose false teaching and to assure Christians that they have eternal life (1 John 5:13). Throughout First John, three cycles of tests are



given to assure believers of the reality of eternal life. The tests involve the head (what we know), the heart (what we love), and the hands test (what we do). The book begins with a prologue (1:1-4), the first cycle of tests cover (1:5-2:27), the second cycle spans (2:28-3:10), and the third cycle covers (4:7-5:21). Second John speaks of the relationship between truth and love and Third John speaks joy killers and joy producers in the church.

• Jude: The book Jude was written by Jesus' brother and prepares the church to deal with false teachers and false teaching. Jude shares many similarities with the book of 2 Peter. Jude passionately urges us to contend for the faith once and for all delivered to the saints (3-4).







2050 Vision Plan Meeting Held

I was very surprised to be one of only a handful of people to attend the November 19, 2025 Vision Plan Committee meeting. This is a very important plan that will shape the course for the county, its residents, and surrounding areas. I was shocked that before the consultants even presented to the Planning and Zoning Committee, who is acting as an Advisory Council, that the county made a recommendation of Scenario 3: The Big Picture, which is the largest and most densely developed plan of the three options.

We have around 90,000 people living in Nassau County and have had less than 10% provide input on what we want for the future of Nassau County. Those that have replied identified priority areas as 1) Preserving Natural Resources, 2) Managing Growth, 3) Outdoor Spaces, 4) Safety, and 5) Arts/ Culture. The predominant concern in the surveys is consistently growth and yet, the staff recommendation is the EXACT OPPOSITE of what the public's stated desire, while they are wanting to maximize growth.

Are hired staff dictating the county's future or the people in it? Growth at the "biggest" level will mean less natural and open spaces, risks for natural resources, and statistically speaking more people and lower income housing brings crime, not safety. During public comment, I reminded them that we cannot put toothpaste back in a tube and urged discretion. One member replied that he trusted county staff had done their homework. May I remind you of the many lawsuits currently against our county and local developers by homeowners fighting tooth and nail for protection? Has the county always done right by you?

Staff were quick to point out that the Vision Plan is just a jumping off point and infrastructure and more specific plans come later. But the truth is this is the catalyst for those things. I have been told frequently when pushing back on zoning or land use, "it is in

the Comp Plan so that is how it has to be." Some have boldly acknowledged the 2030 Comp Plan is not particularly well written, but we have continued to adhere to it as the gospel. This Plan is an opportunity to get it right at the front end and not have to try to work around and fix things at the back. True, it's a jumping off point, but a critical one, and the fact that the Planning Department tried to downplay is concerning.

Once wheels are put into motion progress tends to go bigger not smaller. No developer has ever come and said, "I'd like to do fewer houses here," or "Let's downgrade this zoning." Instead, on the island we have a pulp mill who now wants an ethanol plant. In Callahan we had a small campground, water park, and high-end restaurant that will now become a 150-unit RV park with no amenities for the community. Crawford Diamond promised warehousing and light industrial, they now want heavy industrial and trains. Growth by its very definition goes larger, not smaller. This is the vision that future residents, commissioners, and staff will reflect on and say, "That's what the people wanted," but is it? Scenario 3 is most assuredly not what the people want because while it is big, it puts us at risk of bigger. We could settle for Scenario 2, and then selectively go bigger where growth allows. We can allow them to select the biggest and then expect smaller; that is not how this works.

How do staff justify recommending what the people do not want? Why have we paid consultants and analysts only to ignore the data? I have urged Planning and Zoning members as well as Commissioners to think long and hard before they cast a vote on our future.




NCCOA and RYAM Raise Funds to Support Local Senior Programs

"For 85 years, RYAM has been committed to supporting the people and organizations that make our community





Today, electric utility employees, including those with OREMC, work in a much safer environment due to advances in equipment and safety techniques along with stricter safety regulations and oversight, all of which




leads to a significant reduction in accidents and time away from work for many employees.

Zooming In Photography 4-H Club News

On October 26, our Nassau County 4-H Zooming in Photography Club traveled to the Okefenokee Swamp for our first photo shoot of the year and were treated to a beautiful experience. The Okefenokee gets its name from the Native American term 'Land of the Trembling Earth' because of the swamp's vast peat deposits, that seem stable, but shift when walked upon.

We learned the importance of lighting in photos such as front, side, back and diffused lighting. Though it seems self-explanatory and fairly simple, lighting is a crucial part in photography. these various lighting techniques.

techniques. We took a 90-minute boat ride down the channels of the largest Blackwater swamp in the world and we learned about the vast flora and fauna of the region. We saw various swamp

inhabitants: birds, alligators, turtles and numerous trees and plants that call the swamp home.

I used my mom's phone to take lots of pictures. I know how to zoom in with it but that's it. I haven't been on a boat ride before and loved everything I saw," said G. Berry.


"I learned that in photography, back lighting is when light comes from behind the subject, resulting in a dark, shadowy subject. Also, if you don't have a tripod, breathing slowly



and steadily when taking a photo will help it not turn out blurry," said A. Jolley. "Finally, if there is a lack of forest fires in the swamp, the peat forests would overtake the area and the animals that like the swamp will leave."

"When we rode the boat, I took lots of photos of alligators," said K. Strickland.
