John Sweitzer, another immigrant from Germany, was born on July 17, 1844, in Baden, Germany. His father died when he was 4 years old, and his mother cared for John (the youngest) and his four siblings. When he was 20 years old (1864), he and his brother Frank came to America. They initially came to Cincinnati, Ohio, and lived there for a short while before coming to Cobden and settling here.

After a short stint with the limekilns in Anna, John went to work for James Bell, a major fruit grower in Cobden at the

time. John enjoyed farm work and learned all he could from Mr. Bell for sixteen years.

In 1882, John purchased his own 90 acres of fertile land near Cobden (currently the Spalt homestead and surrounding acres). His long and faithful employment with Mr. Bell had trained him well in the intricacies of fruit and vegetable growing and he was able to prosper on his own. He added to his original purchase and eventually owned 178 acres of valuable fruit land, as well as a residence and farm buildings.

By the early 1900s, he was shipping large quantities of apples, peaches, pears, rhubarb and asparagus. He also raised several acres of sweet potatoes, shipping over 1,000 a season. He produced considerable quantities of hay and wheat for his cattle, hogs and horses.

Rev. Charles Frankovich 1942-1952



The loyal parishioners willingly helped to remove the debris and raise money to build a beautiful seven-room modern brick rectory at the cost of \$14,000.

He married Mamie Caising in 1870, who died in 1874, leaving him three sons to raise: Edward, Harry and Fred. His second marriage in 1879 was to Annie Bigler, whose father had migrated from Switzerland. John and Annie had eight children, all who were raised in Cobden and graduated from Cobden High School: Joseph (from who Karl Sweitzer descended), Annie, John, Mary, Josie, Charles, Frances and Emma.

The John Sweitzer family name is on the window featuring Mother Mary as a child with her mother, St. Ann. The Sweitzer family has long held a particular devotion to the Blessed Mother, so it is no surprise John sponsored a window featuring her. We suspect, though we do not know for certain, that his beloved wife's name being Ann (Annie), this contributed to his decision to sponsor this window with Mother Mary AND St. Ann.
