EATON TOWNSHIP AND TUNKHANNOCK BOROUGH WIN GRANT TO UPGRADE BRIDGE LIGHTING

Eaton Township and Tunkhannock Borough were recently notified that their joint grant application to upgrade the lighting on the Susquehanna River Bridge has been awarded. This grant will allow for replacing the current poles and lighting fixtures on the bridge with energy efficient LED fixtures and historical period poles that will better



match the lighting that is in place along Hunter Highway and the Borough. More details from the grant agency are expected soon. Supervisor Randy Ehrenzeller worked diligently on behalf of Eaton Township and Tunkhannock Borough to secure this grant.

SECURITY CAMERAS TO BE INSTALLED AT TOWNSHIP



Security cameras will soon be installed around Township buildings as part of our effort to increase security and safety for our facilities and of those utilizing the area, such as the recycling operations. The camera system will monitor all

activities in and around buildings and grounds on a 24-hour basis. We thank Supervisor Paul Rowker, for his efforts to get this system installed.

PARKS AND RECREATION REMAIN A HIGH PRIORITY FOR THE TOWNSHIP

The Board of Supervisors continues to look at options and opportunities to develop recreation areas throughout the Township. Several open areas which the Township owns are being studied. Currently, the North Eaton site which was under consideration for development has been put on hold. Studies of other sites will continue and input from residents is welcome as we proceed.

MORE TOWNSHIP ROADS UPGRADED



Several successful projects were completed this summer to upgrade roads in our Township. The entire length of Jenks Roads

was resurfaced using a technique called micro-surfacing, which will extend the life of this road for many years. New oil/chip

treatments were completed on McMullian Hill and Church Road to conclude road upgrades for this season.

NEED FOR LOCAL POLICE COVERAGE UNDER STUDY

The Board of Supervisors has begun a study of options for obtaining local police coverage for the Township. This study is for information gathering purposes only and no decision has been made as to whether we would proceed to obtain local police coverage. Investigation of local police coverage is being driven by several factors including the recent tragic incident at Weis Markets where local police from Tunkhannock Borough and Tunkhannock Township were the first to respond to the incident, as well as the fact that some Eaton Township ordinances, including speed limits, cannot be enforced by Pennsylvania State Police. Therefore, we must look at options to provide enhanced protection for our residents and businesses.

We have begun to discuss this topic with local municipalities and law enforcement agencies in order to get information on how local police coverage would be implemented, what costs would be associated with such coverage, and what contractual agreements would be required. The results of this study will be reviewed by the Board at a future public meeting and any decision regarding obtaining local police coverage would be made after this public meeting.

RECYCLING PROGRAM BEING MISUSED

The Township recycling program, which is very popular and used extensively, has seen a tremen-



dous increase in garbage being put in the recycling container. The garbage, in addition to prohibited items such as televisions, furniture, and chemicals, is being discovered by our employees each week. Misuse of this program is costing the Township and taxpayers' money since we are penalized by our contractor when such items are in the recycling bin. In addition, our employees are often forced to climb into the bin to remove prohibited items.

We are asking all residents who utilize our recycling program to please deposit ONLY items that are permitted. The list on the back page of this newsletter shows which items are acceptable and which are prohibited.

Also, please remember to clean out containers of food or other materials.

If we cannot reduce the incidences of garbage and other prohibited items from getting into the recycling container, it may force us to consider restricting the hours when the program is open to receive materials. We obviously don't want to take this step, but we must ensure the long term viability of the program by reducing unwanted items.

Please help us continue this successful recycling effort by only putting acceptable items in the container.

The recycling service is for Eaton Township residents only. Please do not do deposit recyclables for friends, family, etc. who do not live in Eaton Township. There is a County recycling center for their use.



Recycling Points to Remember:

- Use clear or blue recycling bags—NOT black garbage bags.
- Do not leave non-recyclables such as garbage, appliances, paint etc.
- All containers must be completely empty and washed out with lids removed.
- No Styrofoam products or food products. (Egg cartons ok)
- Please report any misuse of this service by calling the township.

In order to keep the recycling program going, the wagon will be monitored closely.
