Jesus entered and passed through Jericho. Now behold, there was a man named Zacchaeus who was a chief tax collector, and he was rich. And he sought to see who Jesus was, but could not because of the crowd, for he was short of stature. So he ran ahead and climbed up into a sycamore tree to see him, for he was going to pass that way.

Luke 19:5-6 When Jesus reached the spot, he looked up and said to him, "Zaccheaus, come down immediately. I must stay at your house today."

So he came down at once and welcomed him gladly.

Luke 19:7-10 All the people said this and began to mutter, "He has gone to be the guest of a sinner."

But Zaccheaus stood up and said to the Lord, "Look Lord!! Here and now, I give half of my possessions to the poor and if I have cheated anybody out of anything, I will pay them back four times the amount." Jesus said to him, "Today salvation has come to this house, because this man, too is a son of Abraham. For the Son of Man came to seek and to save the lost."

Luke 18:18-25
