

Dear all, greetings.

Decisions are strange things. Some find it easier to make big than small decisions. Some agonize for weeks over a tiny decision-what color dress to wear to a party, whilst spending hardly any time on what house they wish to buy. Some simply walk in and want it immediately. There is some considerable debate over why we take less time and more important decisions – possibly because we would be overwhelmed with all the pros and cons and so go with our gut or 1st instinct on major decisions.

Decision-making isn't always entirely rational! We are influenced by our emotions, desires, the views of our friends and peers, advertising, and other social influences. Social media, influencers, sports and media personalities, all impact our decision-making, whether we admit it or not.

And when decisions are made, there are often 2nd thoughts. Was it the wise thing to do? Could we have done better? Did we need to make the decision in the first place? Were we too rash? Too hasty?

2nd thoughts – would've, should've, could've.....we learn to live with our decisions, and often the 2nd thoughts return to torment us. Which brings us to the most significant decision ever made....

Genesis 2.7 reads as follows: “Then the LORD God formed man from the dust of the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life; and the man became a living being.” This is the narrative of our creation. As per Col.1.16 and John 1.3 - it is Jesus Christ Himself who is creating man in this narrative from Eden.

Perhaps nothing on planet earth is as incredible as the human body. The more things go wrong with it as we age, the more we marvel at its intricacies. Truly, we are “fearfully and wonderfully made!”

And when Adam's body was made, and was lying there, inert and lifeless, in the middle of this verse, Jesus bent down to breathe in the “breath of life.” That was perhaps the final moment of no return, prior to breathing life into Adam....the biggest decision ever made. A final pause....a final commitment from Jesus.

The thoughts of Jesus at that moment?

What would you have done?
