#### **SHS Annual General Meeting**



The Heritage Society's Annual Meeting was held on May 19, 2024. In recognition of the RCAF's 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary we were honoured to have as our guest speaker Lt. Col. Terry Wong. Born in Thornbury, Ontario.

Terry joined the Canadian Armed Forces in 1989 as a pilot. He worked in Moose Jaw as a jet instructor before taking a break from the Forces to complete a master's degree in engineering. Rejoining the RCAF as a reservist with 400 Tactical Helicopter Squadron, he completed his training on the CH-146 Griffon Helicopter. He then worked as the operations officer at the Tactical Aviation Unit in Kandahar, Afghanistan. He was later deployed as the Deputy Director of Combat Operations in Qatar, working with 16 nations in counter terrorism. He is now Deputy Wing Commander at 16 Wing, Base Borden. In 2019 Terry was awarded the Meritorious Service Award for his work with Sick Kids Hospital. We were proud to have Lt. Col Wong speak at our meeting as he talked about the RCAF 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary and his personal experiences.

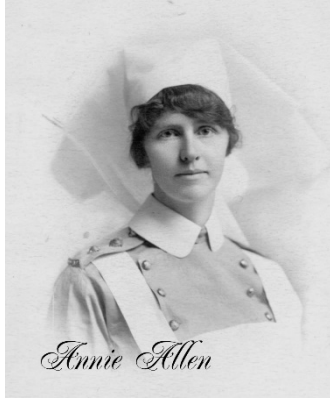
### Stories Of Stayner Families By Katherine Allen

Samuel Eldon Allen served in WW1 and his sister Mary Anne "Annie" Allen served as a nursing sister in England during WW1. Uncle Sam and Aunt Annie are siblings to my grandfather Robert John Allen. Altogether there were nine children born to their parents who were Wm Allen (1839-1894) and Mary Anne Gray (1850-1940). Their parents were very active in the community and East Nottawasaga Presbyterian Church. Later on their mother was moved into town and was active at Jubilee Presbyterian Church in Stayner, and lived with her daughter Sarah (Allen) Patterson.

## Mary Anne “Annie” Allen

When I was a child, I enjoyed listening to stories told by my grandmother (Carrie Watson Allen) and my father (Kenneth Allen), especially when they often spoke of Aunt Annie, although some family members prefer to call her “Anne”. In my mind, I thought of her as a very brave woman to go to the Yukon when travel was not as easy as it is today.

Mary Anne Allen was born March 29, 1881, in Dunedin, Nottawasaga Twp. where the family first lived before moving to the 4<sup>th</sup> line (Fairgrounds Rd) in 1885.



As a nurse, Annie was one of four nurses chosen from Collingwood's General & Marine Hospital to travel to Dawson City, Yukon during the gold rush days from about 1910-1914. While she was there, smallpox had been brought in over the trail. Annie was in charge of the camp set up outside of Dawson to look after the patients.

Dawson was where Annie met her future husband Colin Hart (1888-1968) who had come out from Scotland as a young bank clerk/manager. According to one relative, they told wonderful stories of their time in Dawson. One story is of a lady known as Lee who had become respectable along with some of the characters.

Colin and Annie left the Yukon in 1916 to enlist, and both went overseas. Colin went to France with the Yukon Infantry Company, and Annie went overseas to England through Toronto General Hospital.

Colin and Anne left the Yukon in 1916 to enlist and both went overseas. Colin went to France with the Yukon Infantry Company. Anne was appointed to commissioned rank in December 1916. She left for England in April 1917, where

she served with the Canadian Overseas Expeditionary Force as a Nursing Sister with the Canadian Army Medical Core. She served in Canada and England with the CAMC: CAMC Depot, Westenhanger; Ontario Military Hospital, Orpington; Duchess of Connaught's Canadian Red Cross Hospital, Taplow; Granville Canadian Special Hospital, Buxton; and No.4 Canadian General Hospital, Busingstoke. Anne returned to Canada July 1919 for reason of general demobilization.

Upon their return to Canada Anne & Colin were married. Colin had a long and distinguished career with the Bank of Montreal, living in several places across Canada eventually retiring in Winnipeg. Over those years Aunt Annie was active in volunteer and church work, producing beautiful gardens from one end of the country to the other.

Aunt Annie died in the Spring of 1952, Uncle Colin in 1968, both in Victoria, BC.

## Samuel Eldon Allen

Samuel was born on May 9<sup>th</sup>, 1887, Nottawasaga Twp., Ontario, the youngest son to William Allen (1839 - 1894) and Mary Anne Gray (1850-1940). He grew up on the 4<sup>th</sup> Line (Fairgrounds Road) with eight siblings.



Sam Allen served in WW1 and resided in Calgary and Edmonton

before moving to Saskatoon in 1930. His occupation was an accountant.

According to the Attestation Paper, Uncle Sam was with the 13<sup>th</sup> Royal Regiment, Hamilton Ontario for one and half years before moving to Edmonton. He enlisted with the Canadian Expeditionary Force with the 60<sup>th</sup> Overseas Battery in March 1916 to 1919. He arrived in England on the SS Cameronia in September 1916 and was at Witley Camp, Surrey until August



1917. He left for France in August 1917 to May 1919. Under the 60<sup>th</sup> Battery, he was assigned first to the 15<sup>th</sup> O/S Brigade C.F.A. and later transferred to the 14<sup>th</sup> brigade.

Upon his return to Canada, he settled in Calgary, Alberta. In 1923, he married Florence Onions in Edmonton. They had one daughter, Jean Florence Allen born in 1925 in Calgary. Uncle Sam died in April 1974, aged, 85, in a Veterans Home in Saskatoon. He is buried in Soldier's Field in Woodlawn Cemetery, Saskatoon, Saskatchewan. He was a member of the Royal Canadian Legion Branch 63.

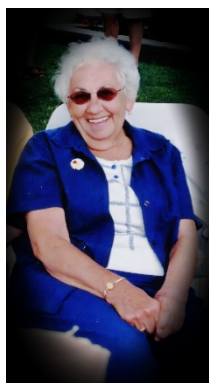


## In Memoriam -FERNE ALLEN
