Russians Held Her Prisoner, Teacher Cries

New York, Aug. 12.—(AP)—Mrs. Oksana Stepanovna Kosenkina today rejected the suggestion of a Soviet vice-consul that she be moved to another hospital, saying "You kept me prisoner, you would not let me go."

The suggestion was made by vice-consul Zot I. Chepurnykh who visited the police-guarded hospital room of the Russian teacher, seriously injured yesterday when she jumped three stories from the Soviet consulate building.

Detective William Dyzko, a Russia-speaking officer who was in the hospital room during the vice-consul's visit, said Mrs. Kosenkina said, "no" when Chepurnykh advanced his suggestion.

The detective said that after the vice-consul and a secretary arrived at the hospital and asked for permission to arrange for a visit from the consul general, he and Inspector Michael E. J. Lendon escorted Chepurnykh and the secretary into the room.

"The injured woman's eyes were open," Dyzko said. (The vice-consul earlier had said her eyes were closed.)

"Do you know this man?" the detective said he asked Mrs. Kosenkina in Russian.

"Yes," he quoted her as answering. "Who is he?" the detective said he asked. The woman identified the vice consul.

The vice-consul, the detective added, then told her in Russian that Soviet Consul General Yakov Lomakin wanted to see her. Mrs. Kosenkina replied, "I do not want to talk to anyone. I do

A 24-year-old Miami Beach girl was near death in St. Francis hospital today and the man who shot her ended his own life seconds later, climaxing a love triangle which had lasted for eight months.

Miss Lynne Becker, of 250 20th st., Miami Beach, was shot in the head by Edward Samuel Breakstone, 45, roommate of Miss Becker's fiancé, witnesses said. Officials at St. Francis hospital said Miss Becker is not expected to live.

Two witnesses who saw the shooting were Mrs. Dora Samuels, manager of the apartment house, and Miss Dorothy Patricia, another tenant who was making a telephone call in Mrs. Samuels' apartment at the time of the shooting.

Mrs. Samuels said that Miss Becker entered the Samuels' apartment, apparently to see Mrs. Patricia, and that a few moments later Breakstone also walked in.

Breakstone, according to police, was doorman at the Five O'Clock club. His home address was listed as 912 Tiffany st., Bronx. Mrs. Samuels' told Deputy

shooting, Edwin Mar Warner, 25, Breakstone's roommate in the apartment, walked into the police station and told detectives that he was Miss Becker's fiancé and that they planned to wed shortly.

He said that Breakstone was wildly in love with Miss Becker and that, although she consistently gave him no encouragement, he "went out of his way to do little things for her."

He said that he was friendly with Breakstone and took him to a Miami psychiatrist six weeks ago in an effort to help him get over his infatuation. He said he had believed "everything would straighten itself out" when he and Miss Becker were married.

A note slipped into a bankbook was found in Breakstone's room. It said: "Dear Mom: Excuse me for what I did. I always love you, Samuel."

PAA To Boost Payroll Here Six Million Dollars A Year

A \$6,000,000 increase in the annual Miami payroll of Pan American World Airways was announced today.

The PAA's \$20,000,000 payroll is already the largest in the city, and the increase is expected to make it the largest industrial payroll in the state.

The \$6,000,000 increase will result from a record-breaking expansion of 17 per cent when 1,500 employees are added to the 4,000 already on the Miami roster. Recruiting of the 1,500 additional workers already has been started. PAA officials announced, and should be completed by the end of October.

The expansion has been made

giant Boeing Clippers, one of the 3,500 horsepower engines already is being used at the Miami shops for training purposes.

All types of Clipper engines are going through the seven-acre engine overhaul building on a mass production basis. Officials said the shops could handle 300 of the huge engines a month.

When remodeling and rehabilitation are completed at a cost of \$2,500,000, the Miami overhaul base also will house PAA's ground and flight training
