Mr. Breakstone was the com-mander of American Legion post 47 and in 1954 was elected state commander of the Legion. Ever since he stepped down Breakstone remained active in Legion activities by attending annual conventions and writing

Criticized Foreign Aid
Within the last year, he issued statements criticizing foreign aid programs and Supreme court decisions on pornography.

He was in favor of keeping the United States militarily strong but surprised many in the Legion last year when he urged that the draft laws be overhauled.

During his tenure as state commander, Mr. Breakstone was a controversial figure. Toward the end of his term some delegates to the state convenion in Springfield walked out when Mr. Breakstone invited Gov. G. Mennen Williams of Michigan, a liberal, to address the convention.

Also during his tenure, the Legion quarreled publicly with the Girl Scouts of America over the Girl Scouts of America over the omission of patriotic mater-ial from the Girl Scout hand-book. Mr. Breakstone later sup-ported the Girl Scouts and con-tended that the omissions in the handbook had been cor-rected.

Mr. Breakstone, who had of-fices at 79 W. Monroe st., prac-ticed law in Chicago for 50

years.
