THE 1ST RULE TO IEP FIGHT CLUB

WE TALK ABOUT IEP FIGHT CLUB!

COMMON PARENTAL MISTAKES	WHAT IT LOOKS
EMOTIONALLY CHARGED ADVOCACY	Letting emotions override logic and reason can hinder productive discussions with school staff
NOT KNOWING YOUR RIGHTS	Failure to read rights booklet can hinder effective advocacy
NOT COMMUNICATING EFFECTIVELY	Poor communication can lead to misunderstandings
NOT UNDERSTANDING THE SCHOOL'S PERSPECTIVE	Not taking the time to understand the school's limitations can hinder productive collaboration
FAILING TO BE INFORMED	Not fully understanding child's specific needs can lead to less effective advocacy
LACKING DOCUMENTATION	Not having adequate documentation to support requested services/accommodations can weaken your case
BEING INFLEXIBLE	Not being open to compromise can lead to stalled discussions
ISOLATION	Not seeking support and advice from other parents, support groups, or advocacy organizations can be isolating and limit resources
NOT SEEKING PROFESSIONAL HELP	In complex cases, not seeking advice from SPED attorney or advocate can result in missed opportunities to secure services




