Season 3

Heart Lines centres around the lives of two youths involved in a heart transplant; one the heart donor, the other the heart recipient. The play explores the undefined, almost spiritual connectivity between heart recipient and donor.

Director's Notes

A few years back I was sent a review of the first production of *Chalkface* by the State Theatre Company South Australia/Sydney Theatre Company in 2022, saying they thought it might interest me.

I am the granddaughter of two teachers and two headmasters, the daughter of two teachers, the niece of two teachers, the sister/sister-in-law of two EAs and the sister/wife of two theatre managers in private schools. Education is in my blood and has made up most of my life; as a school student myself for 12 years, a university students for 5 and then a teacher for the past 30 odd years.

It did interest me. It made me laugh and it made me think.

Whilst *Chalkface* is a comedy and populated with large stereotypical characters who do and say some very silly things, it also has depth. It has a message. Teaching is a hard profession, and it is getting harder. Testing, paperwork, data and bureaucracy often eclipse the very essence of our job; teaching. Statistics show that teachers are leaving the profession in droves, burnt out and disillusioned. But those who are still in a classroom are there because for them is it a vocation. A love.

Playwright Angela Betzien has described *Chalkface* as a "love letter to teachers", and that is what I hope the audience take away from the show. Teaching is hard, and it is underappreciated, especially by governments and the bureaucrats, but those who dedicate their lives to it are superheroes!

Chalkface also interested me as it is new, and has not been performed in community theatre before, it is Australian, which I like and four of the six characters are female, with the two lead roles being strong parts for women. Plus there were a few "challenges" in the staging and props departments and that is always fun!

Betzien uses humour to get her message across making the rehearsal process a wonderful laugh for us all. I thank my talented cast for their commitment, effort and especially humour over the past three months.

I hope you enjoy us taking you to the Chalkface!

Vanessa has been directing in Perth community theatre since 2006. Producing three plays at Old Mill Theatre; *The Venetian Twins* (2008), *Away* (2010) and *Amadeus* (2011) and fifteen at Melville Theatre; *Pride and Prejudice* (2007), *Three Tall Women* (2008), *Emma* (which she also dramatised, 2012), *Rabbit Hole* (2013), *Twelve Angry Men* (2014), *Love, Loss and What I Wore* (2015), *One Man, Two Guvnors* (2016), *Stop Kiss* (2017), *Mr Bailey's Minder* (2018), *Sense and Sensibility* (2019), *Old Love* (2020), *William Shakespeare's Long Lost First Play* (abridged) (2021), *Things I Know to Be True* (2022), *Quiz* (2023), *Sweet Road* (2024) and now *Chalkface*.

At the annual Independent Theatre Association Robert Finley Awards Vanessa has been nominated for Best Director eight times and feels honoured to have had four of her MTC productions named Best Play; Rabbit Hole, Twelve Angry Men, Mr Bailey's Minder and Things I Know To Be True.

Whilst directing is her passion, Vanessa also enjoys stage managing, operating in the bio box, props and set dressing and volunteering in the bar and box office.

The people she meets, the friends she has made and the stories she has helped to bring to life are what keeps her involved in a hobby she began at the age of eight as a gosling wiggling her bottom at the audience in *Mother Goose* at Theatre 8 in Geraldton.

Ghosts (Melville Theatre Company); Tanya in Mamma Mia and Marion in The Boy from Oz (Koorliny Arts Centre). In 2019, Natalie won ITA Dramafest Best Actress for her role as Rose in Kinetics (MPAC). In 2016, she co-directed Disney's The Little Mermaid for Koorliny Arts Centre, a production that won four ITA Robert Finley Awards, including Best Musical and Best Director.

Cameron Leese



Cameron initially trained at Swinburne University, Melbourne prior to relocating to London in 2010, where he undertook further training at the Sylvia Young Theatre School and worked within the UK Film and television industry. Since his stage debut in 2013 Cameron has performed for many of Perth's theatre groups.

In 2019 KADS awarded Cameron the Dorothy McCarthy Award for the Most Outstanding performance, for his lead role in *The Return* (aka *The Last Train to Freo*). In 2020 Cameron performed in GRADS', *The Merry Wives of Wind-*

sor and sashayed across the stage as the camp & vivacious Emory in GRADS' production of the iconic *The Boys in the Band*. Cameron was awarded as the Best Supporting Actor by The Old Mill in 2024 for his performance as Howie in *Rabbit Hole*.
