

BACKGRQUND TO THE PLAY

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Germaine Greer 'held hostage'



Police said the academic was held hostage in her home

Academic and feminist icon Germaine Greer is recovering after being allegedly attacked and imprisoned by a teenage female student at her isolated country house.

Police were called to Ms Greer's home in Great Chesterford, near Saffron Walden, Essex, after she was assaulted and held captive for up to an hour on the evening of Bank Holiday Monday.

A police spokesman said the 61-year-old writer had not been seriously injured during the incident but was "badly shaken".

It is understood the alarm was raised after three friends, who had been invited for dinner, attended the £500,000 Georgian house and heard shouting.

An Essex police spokesman said officers were called to Ms Greer's home at about 2200BST on Monday following reports of an intruder.

A 19-year-old woman was arrested and charged with unlawful imprisonment and assault occasioning actual bodily harm.

She is due to appear before magistrates in Harlow on 4 May.

'Keep out'

In a column written for this Saturday's Weekend section of the Daily Telegraph after the alleged attack, Ms Greer talks of her feelings towards strangers.

She wrote: "I have no signs saying 'Private Property' or 'Keep Out' or 'Trespassers will be prosecuted', but the mad glint in my eyes is meant to speak volumes.

"I am as territorial as a robin, who will drill his beak into the skull of any interloper robin who wanders on to his patch."

Australian born Dr Greer is currently professor of comparative literature at Warwick university, but became a household name after writing the groundbreaking feminist text *The Female Eunuch*, which was published in 1970.

It has sold more than one million copies and been published in 13 languages.

Last year, the sequel - *The Whole Woman* was published - its introduction pronouncing, "The time has come to get angry again".

I hope that Melville's outgoing president thinks that I did do a "good job of it"!

Rosalba Jeffreys as Margot Mason

Rosalba trained at NIDA and worked briefly as an actress, on both the stage - *The Rehearsal*, and TV - *No 96*, *Lane End*, before becoming a 'wife and a mother'. Most of her working life has been spent in the teaching of The Performing Arts. Rosalba has directed many productions for schools with forays into directing for Perth Theatre Company, The Blue Room and Lyons Productions, *Cox Four*, *Covert*, *The Messenger and The Simple Truth*. This return to the boards in *The Female of the Species* has been an immensely terrifying experience, due, unavoidably, in part, to a very short rehearsal period, but also an enjoyable challenge.

The role of Margot resonates with Rosalba, having grown up in the 'burn the bra' era and gone through many of Margot's tumultuous mind sets. She is, unfortunately, still confused about the state of feminism today: sometimes feeling that we're in a time of, as Margo puts, 'stagnation'. 'Is that Feminism, Post Feminism, or Post Post Feminism?' Or an even newer feminist state that is still to be given a title? Rosalba feels we still have a way to go before 'reaching our full potential'.

Madelaine's pronouns are she/her and she was born in Whadjuk Noongar Boodjar. She is an established performer represented by Loxton Management and dabbles in a range of creative pursuits including directing, writing and teaching. 
Tarek fell in love with the role of Bryan as it allowed him to play someone who's dumb whilst being quite intelligent himself.
