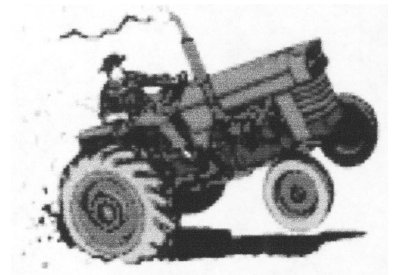

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GENERAL RULES

EXHIBIT ARRIVAL AND RELEASE

All inside Agricultural and Home Economics exhibits are to arrive at the Fairgrounds on Monday, July 14th 2025, 6-9 pm. Outside Antique Tractors taken on Sunday, 3-6 pm, also Monday, 6-9 pm.

ALL INSIDE EXHIBITS will be released on Sat., July 19, 2025, 10 am - 12 noon. All inside exhibits must be picked up.

1. All exhibitors agree to be bound by the rules and regulations of Sewickley Township Community Fair.
2. The fair management reserves the right to amend or add to these rules and regulations as its judgment may determine.
3. Reasonable care will be taken to protect all exhibits on display from all injury and damage, but the fair is not, in any way, to be held responsible for accidents, loss or damage by water, fire, theft, or otherwise whatever may be the cause or extent of the damage or loss.
4. Entries will be made according to classification.
5. Premiums as listed, may be given for meritorious exhibits.

IN CASES WHERE THERE IS ONLY ONE EXHIBITOR, JUDGES MAY GIVE AN AWARD SUCH AS THEY DEEM EXHIBIT IS WORTHY TO RECEIVE.

Same rule applies where there are fewer entries in any class than the number of premiums offered. The judges may, at their discretion, award a prize or prizes of such grade as the exhibitor deserves.

The fair reserves the right to determine how many entries they will accept from any exhibitor in the same class.

The decision of the judges shall be final in all cases, except where mistakes, fraud, misrepresentation or collusion, not discovered at the time of award, is proved. In such cases, the Superintendent," Manager or Secretary of the fair or show, or such referee as he may appoint, may make the decision with his approval. The case may be appealed to the Fair Management from whose decision there can be no appeal.

6. It shall be the responsibility of the exhibitor to make known the proper name of the article he is entering. Any item entered improperly, will be disqualified to receive a prize but the judges will mark the correct name on the entry tag for the benefit of the owner so the same mistake in entering need not be made the second time.
7. All entries must be grown, produced or made since the last fair by the person whose name appears on the tag as the exhibitor.
8. Superintendents of a Department reserve the right of refusing to accept any entry. Furthermore, the Superintendents reserve their right to bar from competition animals, vegetables, flowers, poultry, products and manufactured articles of decidedly inferior quality and those not possessing sufficient merit to warrant recognition.

9. The Fair Management may, at any time, order their removal of any exhibit in bad condition and any article unfit to show may be excluded. No exhibit may be removed at any time before the close of the fair except by consent of the management.
10. Where award ribbons are stolen or destroyed, the exhibitor may receive a duplicate at the close of the fair or show, which shall be supplied by the fair free of charge.
11. During the judging, buildings are to be closed to everyone except for officials, judges and necessary attendants. No exhibitor or his agent shall communicate with the judge during the time of determining the awards, except to answer questions proposed by the judges. Any exhibitor interfering with the judges while making awards shall forfeit any premium to which he would otherwise be entitled.
12. If earned premiums exceed total budget the Fair Association reserves the right to pro-rate the difference between the winners.
13. **Premiums will be forfeited unless the correct address is given. All premium checks must be cashed within 60 days of check date. No checks will be reissued.**
14. All exhibits will be limited to one entry per person, per class.
15. Any exhibitor not abiding by the above rules, may be asked to remove their exhibits and forfeit any premiums awarded.
16. Only exhibits listed in premium book will be accepted for judging.
17. If exhibits are mislabeled they will be disqualified.
18. Drivers only, on farm tractors, unless riders are in enclosed cab.

LIABILITY: Personal and Property Damage

All persons who enter upon the Fairgrounds and use the facilities on said grounds for purpose of exhibiting, displaying, competing or in any manner participating in the Fair do so at their own risk. The Sewickley Township Community Fair will not be liable for any personal injury or property damage suffered by any person visiting the Fair irrespective of how such injury or damage occurs.

The Sewickley Township Community Fair will not intentionally show or permit to be shown, any dangerous attractions on the grounds. However, the showing of certain attractions require that spectators be reasonable watchful of the conduct of children and though the Sewickley Township Community Fair will take every precaution, it will not be responsible for any personal injury or property damage suffered by reason of any attraction shown or exhibited during the fair.

No pets are permitted on fair grounds except for assistance animals for the disabled.

HEALTH RULES FOR HORSES

1. No equine showing clinical signs of contagious or infectious disease will be admitted to any show or other fair event.
2. All horses and other equidae must be Equine Infectious Anemia test negative within the twelve months prior to the show or fair opening. (Official Coggins test by USDA approved laboratory) Health Certificate must accurately identify the animal and must include the Coggins test date and results

**** Horse and other equidae assembled for exhibition, competition, or sale should be immunized to prevent contagious respiratory disease not less than fifteen days before the show. Exhibitors are advised to consult their veterinarians regarding proper conditioning and vaccination of their animals at least thirty days prior to the event.**

ADDITIONAL HORSE SHOW RULES

1. All riders under 18 years of age MUST wear helmet.
2. The Fair reserves the right to refuse any or all entries.
3. 60 Second limit for exhibitions or a \$5 fee will apply.
4. 2 Minute gate call for all classes, be ready or you will be scratched.
5. Rollovers will be permitted from Class 2 into Classes 3 and 4, but must be declared before the start of the show.
6. Any knocked obstacles or off pattern will result in a No Time.

Fair is not responsible for lost, damaged or stolen property, or injury to horses, exhibitors or spectators.

1. An exhibitor may make entries in only one of the following classes.
A - Farmers B - Carton

Class

1. One dozen brown eggs - large
 2. One dozen white eggs - large
- Size** - The eggs of exhibit - A perfect score will be given to the dozen of eggs weighing between 24 and 27 ounces. If weight is within one ounce over 27 ounces or below 24 ounces, cut 8 points. If more than one ounce either above or below, cut 16 points.
- Uniformity of Color** - All eggs in the entry should be the same shade of color. If white, all eggs should be chalk white, and free from any or tinted coloring. If brown, all eggs should be uniformly the same shade of the color. A cut of 1/4 to 1/2 point per egg may be made accordingly to the actual shade of each egg, but no more than 1/2 point per egg for lack of uniformity of shade with the other eggs in the entry.

Uniformity of Shape - Each egg to conform as nearly as possible in shape. Extra points to be deducted. Cut 1/4 to 1/2 point for each egg that is shape or ridged.

Shell Texture - The shell should be strong and uniform thickness. Cut 1/4 to 1/2 point per egg for shells that are rough, ridged, or wrinkled. No points for shells that are cracked, but one point for each egg that is cracked or cracked.

Condition - The eggs should be clean, natural, and sound. Cut 1/2 to 1 point for each egg that is stained egg or egg with shiny or glassy surface.

- Disqualifications** - Any of the following defects will disqualify the entry.
- a. Total weight of more than 27 ounces per dozen.
 - b. Eggs showing signs of incubation or germ development.
 - c. Inedible.

Farmers -

1. Open to egg producers having less than 3,000 laying birds.

Class

1. One dozen brown eggs
2. One dozen white eggs

NOTE: Guinea, chicken, duck, turkey, and bantam eggs - same premiums per dozen.

Large egg are those eggs weighing between 24 and 27 ounces per dozen. Will be judged on size, uniformity of color and shape, shell texture and condition of egg.

DEPARTMENT 10

4-H AND VOCATIONAL

Premiums: Paid as listed in each department.

This department has been set up for all 4-H and Vocational.

Eligibility: 4-H Club members must have passed their eighth birthday but not have passed their nineteenth birthday by January 1 of the current year.

All sections and classes in Department 10 are the same as any department listed in this book except Department 22. Please refer to that department for the sections and classes. All entries must be prefixed with Department 10.

DEPARTMENT 13

VEGETABLES - OPEN CLASS

Rules and Regulations Governing Vegetables

1. In selecting vegetables for exhibition, choose such specimens that would bring the highest market price. Do not select the largest; select medium size specimens. If at all possible, do not mix varieties.
2. The following factors are generally used by an expert vegetable judge:
 - a. Trueness to variety type. If at all possible, pick the specimens from one variety.
 - b. Uniformity in shape, size and color.
 - c. Be sure to pick out a perfect specimen, then select the others as similar to it as possible. Never mix specimens of different maturity.

- d. Protect from dirt, disease, infection and mechanical damage. Select specimens that are perfect and show no blemishes of any kind.
- e. Condition and maturity. Be sure that exhibits are of high quality.
3. Read premium material, carefully following all rules and regulations. If an entry calls for 5 specimens, be sure to exhibit that number; do not enter 4 or 6. In any instance, your exhibits will be disqualified if the correct number of specimens are not entered.
4. Each exhibitor is responsible for entering his vegetables in the proper class. Flat yellow onions entered in the globe yellow onion class will be disqualified.
5. Exhibit your vegetables on white styrofoam or heavy paper plates except where specifically told otherwise.

PRODUCTS must be made or produced by exhibitor except in Commercial designated classes. Premiums will not be paid for Commercial exhibits.

General Contest Operations

1. Any competitor or assistant attempting to sway the decision of any official by talking to the official or sled operator is subject to disqualification.
2. Competitors are not allowed to walk out onto the track for any reason while track equipment is preparing the track. If a competitor wishes to check track conditions, he/she may only do so at track officials discretion.
3. No crew member, helper, or anyone else is allowed behind, in front of, or within 5 feet of the front of the sled or chain area while a vehicle is backing up to sled, hooking, or unhooking from the sled other than the hook-unhook personnel or track officials.
4. When a vehicle is under a green flag, no one is allowed on the track except for track officials.
5. Pulls will be operated with 2 flagman per track. Starting flagman shall be responsible for readiness of track, pulling vehicle, and competitor. Second flagman shall be responsible for balance of course. The same flagman shall work for an entire class to ensure consistent and equal treatment of all competitors in that class.

General Contest Procedures

1. All pulls must start with a tight chain.
2. An attempt is defined as moving the sled a measurable distance. (one inch or further)
3. Every competitor has the privilege of, and responsibility for spotting the sled for each attempt. Sled operator must be notified of where the competitor wishes the sled be placed.
4. **On first attempt**, no matter where the vehicle stops, as long as competitor lets off the throttle prior to 100 foot marker, no matter the circumstance causing (out of bounds, kill switch pulled, lost weight, roll over, etc.), competitor will get a second attempt. Even if the vehicle travels beyond the 100 foot marker, the competitor will be allowed a second attempt as long as competitor let off the throttle prior to 100 foot marker. **If no attempt is made to let off the throttle prior to 100 foot marker, no second attempt will be granted. (See test puller exception)**

5. **Second attempt** - All competitors eligible for a second attempt will have the option to immediately make a second attempt, or drop 6 positions after the first attempt.
6. **Test Puller** – The competitor pulling first position in each class as determined by draw at the time of entry is considered the test puller, as well as any competitor pulling immediately after any sled weight or transfer box adjustments. The test puller may:
 - a) Keep his/her first pull, provided the weight transfer is deemed right, or
 - b) Immediately take his second pull, or
 - c) Drop and pull in the sixth position, or
 - d) May drop and pull in the last position.**Only the test Puller**, and only on his/her first attempt will he/she not be disqualified or measured for running out of bounds or losing ballast after the 100 foot marker.
7. **Class restart** – Any disqualification on the first attempt bars a second attempt unless the class is restarted.

Disqualifications

1. Lost weight - If any ballast or weights are lost, or touch the ground while hooked to the sled.
Exception: See 100 foot first attempt rule, and test puller first attempt rule.
2. Out of bounds - Pulling vehicle fails to remain fully within chalkline boundaries of contest course during pull. Exception: See 100 foot first attempt rule, and test puller first attempt rule.
3. Failure to comply with all competition rules, including vehicle specifications.
4. Leaving the starting line while under the red flag or failing to cease pull while under the red flag.
5. Missing safety equipment or failure of it to function.
6. Unsafe operation of competition vehicle. This includes operating vehicle while intoxicated.
7. Any unfair or unsportsmanlike conduct.

5. no added equipment designed to increase horsepower , RPM's, torque, wheel speed, transmission function or traction. No dual wheel studed tires, chains or any tire not specifically intended for street use are permitted. Tires must carry a DOT number on the sidewall. No tire cutting is permitted.
6. Engine must be stock for the make and model of the truck entered. No visual modifications such as twin carbs or double pumpers, tunnel rams, blowers, turbos and the like are permitted.
7. Must have Reese style hitch.
8. Must be stock from bumper to bumper.
9. Maximum 10 spring ply combinations.
10. Pump gas only, NO form of racing fuel.
11. Must be driven in, not hauled in.

Open Diesel 8000 lbs

1. Must have a turbo exhaust wheel containment device in accordance with NTPA design specifications.
2. Regular or duals any DOT tire up to 35X12.50.
3. Hanging weight allowed
4. No turbo limit
5. Draw bar or Reese type hitches acceptable.
6. hook point to the center line of rear axle should be no less than 27% of wheel base.
7. Hitch height to be 26 inches
8. 1 Ton driveline or less

STREET LEGAL 4X4

1. Tires must carry a D.O.T number on the side wall. No cut tires allowed.
2. Max Tire size 35x12.5. No Dual wheels.
3. No Weights or ballast in the cab of the truck.
4. No visible hanging weights
5. Reese hitch only - Must be most reward part of truck
6. No Aluminum engine blocks permitted. No open headers or aftermarket heads.
7. Factory suspension must be in place. May be blocked solid
8. Truck must have a stock appearance. Wheelbase must be proper for the cab being used. Vehicle must have a full factory unaltered bed in place. All beds must be able to safely contain weights or ballast and cover rear wheels and driveline.

HIGH OUTPUT 4 X 4 RULES:

1. Tires must carry a D.O.T number on the side wall. Cut tires are allowed.
2. Max Tire size 35x12.5. No Dual wheels.

FACTORY FARM STOCK RULES

1. All tractors equipped with 3 point hitch must have arms on and must work.
2. All tractors must have a working PTO.
3. All tractors with turbos, must use the factory stock turbo.
4. All diesel tractors must have the factory fuel pump, lines, and injectors.
5. All gas tractors must have the stock carb and ignition system.
6. There will be NO cut tires.
7. The stock draw bar is what you will be pulling from, NOT altered in any way.
8. Tractors with dual wheels are not permitted.
9. Four wheel drive tractors must have front axle in neutral while pulling.
10. All tractors in this class must look like a farm tractor - No wheelie bars, scatter blankets, aluminum wheels, non factory dish wheels, or altered tin work.
11. 18 inch minimum hook point setback from center of rear axle.
12. 20 inch maximum hook point height.
13. Drawbar must be stationary in all directions.
14. 5500# class max tire size is 15.5 7500# class max tire size is 16.9
15. All tractors must be checked by a track crew member to make sure it meets the rules BEFORE it can be entered in this class.
16. Any discrepancy with factory farm stock rules will default to www.tractordata.com
17. Exceeding class speed limit will result in disqualification.

STOCK AND WESTMORELAND RULES

1. Engine block to be factory with no visual modifications
2. Tractor must have all original shields and guards in place.
3. All turbos must be under the hood
4. Tractors with other than factory stock turbo or tractors over 3,000 RPM must have a turbo exhaust wheel containment device in accordance with NTPA design specifications.
5. 18 inch minimum hook point setback from center of rear axle.
6. 20 inch maximum hook point height.
7. Drawbar must be stationary in all directions.
8. Wheelie bars with 4"x4"(or larger) skid pads are permitted.
9. Tractors with dual wheels are not permitted.
10. Four wheel drive tractors must have front axle in neutral while pulling.
11. Front weights must not extend more then 24" beyond the grille.
12. Tractor nor weights can be altered in any way while on the track.
13. Loss of any part from a tractor will result in disqualification.
14. Exceeding class speed limit will result in disqualification.

HOT STOCK TRACTOR RULES

WEIGHT CLASSES 8,500 - 10,500 LBS.

1. All tractors must be equipped with the original style hood and grille.
2. Maximum tire width is to be 24.5" Full cut tires allowed.
3. Tractor identification will be confirmed by transmission, rear end, and chassis size; not by decal or sheet metal.
4. Engine block must be same as manufacturer of the tractor, 540 cu in max.
5. OEM head and manifold
6. 3 inch maximum turbo inlet bore size at the compressor wheel.
7. Exhaust must discharge vertically upward above the highest point of the tractor with the exception of roll bars and be securely attached. Exhaust must be at least 18" above the hood and no curved pipes or rain caps can be used.
8. Must have a turbo exhaust wheel containment device in accordance with NTPA design specifications.
9. 18 inch minimum hook point setback from center of rear axle.
10. 20 inch maximum hook point height.
11. Drawbar must be stationary in all directions.
12. Must have factory engine fan shield or .060" thick steel shield.
13. Must have 1/8" thick steel or 1/4" thick aluminum side shields.
14. Diesel Fuel only. Intercoolers and water injection allowed.
15. Injection pumps to be "A" or "P". Sigma & Billet pumps are not permitted
16. ABC rated fire extinguisher required 2.5 Lbs minimum capacity.
17. Flywheel protection in the form of either a scatter blanket or 4"x 3/8" steel surrounding the flywheel is required.
18. Engines must be equipped with an emergency shutdown air shut off at the air intake that can be activated from the drivers seat, and by a 2 inch steel ring at back of tractor for activation by sled.
19. Wheelie bars must support the weight of the tractor. Skid pads 4"x4" Min, Maximum of 10 inches from the ground.
20. Roll Cages and seat belts are mandatory.
21. Tie bars/Ladder bars are required.
22. Drivers must wear a DOT rated helmet and fire resistant rated clothing.
