From the

Always giving thanks to God the Father for everything, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ. – Eph. 5:20

One winter I sat in army fatigues somewhere near Anniston, Alabama, eating my supper out of a mess kit. The infantry training battalion that I had been assigned to was on bivouac. There was a cold drizzle of rain, and everything was mud. The sun had gone down.

I was still hungry when I finished and noticed that a man nearby had left something that he was not going to eat. It was a turnip. When I asked him if I could have it, he tossed it over to me. I missed the catch, and the turnip fell to the ground, but I wanted it so badly that I picked it up and started eating it, mud and all.

Time deepened and slowed down. With a lurch of the heart, I saw suddenly that not only was the turnip good, but the mud was good too, even the drizzle and cold were good, even the Army that I had dreaded for months was good.

Sitting there in the Alabama winter with my mouth full of cold turnip and mud, I could see at least for a moment how if you ever took truly to heart the ultimate goodness and joy of things, even at their bleakest, the need to praise someone or something for it would be so great that you might even have to go out and speak of it to the birds of the air. — Frederick Buechner, The Sacred Journey (HarperOne, 1991)

St. Paul had reminded us that we should always be giving thanks to God for everything (Eph. 5:20). Including this COVID-19 pandemic? If we understand the word "everything," it means everything. Yes, absolutely even it's hard to swallow or accept this pandemic. It is like eating "cold turnip and mud" at the middle of cold drizzling rain in an open field and the surrounding is also enveloped with darkness. This is the reflection of Frederick Buechner when he's hungry, tired, and situated in an uncomfortable place, activity, and company. In his deeper thoughts, he could still see the 'ultimate goodness and joy of things even at their bleakest."

This pandemic has forced all of us to have our own bivouac (a temporary camp without tent or cover). It has exposed our way of life and our obsession to always be in control. The hard truth is that we are not, but God is. Some people are now hungry not only of food, but they hunger for touch, fellowship, company, healing and salvation from this viral disease. I implore you that we need to seek more of God's grace and presence so that nothing will separate us from God's love.

During this pandemic, we also learned how to adjust in our expectations. We celebrated our birthdays, anniversaries, and reunions in our own (little) ways. It doesn't need to always be big in order to have a meaningful and joyous celebration. But we can still go big in giving thanks to the Lord instead. On Thanksgiving Day, we might not have all the usual people sitting around our table. We might not have all the food that we have last year. But there is no justification to not give thanks to the Lord for his faithfulness and to not be grateful to the people who made our lives bearable to live (the frontliners/essential people, the known and unknown people). Even those who threw or have been throwing a cold turnip with mud to us.

May you have a blessed celebration, and Happy Thanksgiving to all of you!

BRIEF HISTORY OF THE FIRST METHODIST CHURCH OF SPOONER by Lon LaBumbard

In 1879 the Chicago, St. Paul, Minneapolis and Omaha railroad completed construction of tracks to the railhead. A small community formed there named Chandler. In 1882-1883 the railhead and population was move south two miles to become the settlement of Spooner, named for John Coit Spooner, an attorney who was instrumental in the merger which formed the railroad company.

According to information from the program for the dedication of the current church building, by Pastor Myron E Taylor, Methodist work in Spooner was begun in June, 1886, when Rev. L.A. Willsey,

then pastor at Shell Lake, began holding services at Spooner. The first meetings were held in a little frame schoolhouse "located near the place now occupied by the residence of Theo. LaFond". The early ministers were guaranteed \$1.50 per service, which was raised from free will offerings. The ministers drove up from Shell Lake with a horse and buggy. The population of Spooner at that time was 150.

Mrs. George Scribner was one of the first Sunday School Superintendents and was president of the Ladies Aid, the dues being ten cents for each meeting. The ladies sewed carpet rags, made quilts and had rummage sails to raise money. By 1888 the population of Spooner had risen to 400 people.......to be continued

For I am longing to see you so that I may share with you some spiritual gift to strengthen you— or rather so that we may be mutually encouraged by each other's

faith, both yours and mine. (Romans 1:11-12)

After long months of preparation and hundreds of hours of planning and coordination, we experienced our first-ever virtual Annual Conference, hosted on Zoom by GNTV. It was a learning opportunity for us all and I celebrate all the things that went well – and so much went well – and I confess that there is much we can improve. But I am deeply impressed and grateful for the way we worked together through this pandemic time to make our Annual Conference a success. With very few glitches – a momentary loss of electricity at the Conference Center gave us a moment of concern, but God is good! – we were able to conduct our business, celebrate our ministries, and offer worship and praise.

I will not list all the people who worked hard to make Annual Conference a success, because I do not want to leave anyone out, but I do want to acknowledge so much hard work on the part of so many people – Program and Arrangements, Conference staff, cabinet, elected laity and clergy leadership – I cannot thank everyone enough. Members of our Annual Conference have no idea how much is required to make this massive event happen. As I reflect on this year's Conference, there are a few significant insights that emerge from my heart.

First, there is an impressive and sacred energy that occurs when we gather together in person. Certainly we can get our work done, we can share presentations, and we can celebrate pre-recorded worship experiences – and these are very meaningful and important – but there is a completely different spirit when we are not face-to-face and side-by-side. Second, communication is very different and difficult when we are separated in space and time. We used a "Q&A" feature of Zoom, and this allowed us to work through our Action Items, but in "real time" it caused some frustration and some confusion. It reminds me just how much communication comes from seeing one another – words are often inadequate to fully

convey meaning and intention. Seeing raised hands, watching faces and body language, and engaging in person-to-person dialogue is a much richer form of communication than text messages. We were challenged to recognize and respond immediately to messages as they were received.

But third, and most important, my reflection is that God is good, and God's people working together in the power of God's Holy Spirit can accomplish great things. Beyond any limitations and deficiencies, what we accomplished together was amazing for this year's Annual Conference. The worship experiences and our ordination were not as we might have hoped, but they were wonderful and memorable in their own way. I found myself deeply touched by the memorial service. I had a wonderful, holy, grace-overflowing experience with our ordinands and provisional members. I loved and celebrated our diversity, our rich ethnic and cultural community. I am excited by all the new ministries and revitalized ministries reaching new people. I commend the dedicated and committed leadership, especially my partnership with Deanna Shimko and our Conference Board of Laity. I am so hopeful and inspired by our vision and priority to become truly radically inclusive and racially just. I know that we will work together to honor and glorify God in our thoughts, our words, and our actions as we create together – by God's grace and Spirit – a bright and beautiful future with hope.

For I am longing to see you so that I may share with you some spiritual gift to strengthen you— or rather so that we may be mutually encouraged by each other's faith, both yours and mine. These words of Paul are my words. Paul's hope and desire is my hope and desire. I cannot wait to be with you all again, but until that time, I am grateful to God for the technology and community that connects us and keeps us united in our holy work.
