## Make calendar events smart: Add location and have your iPhone tell you when to leave

of the time? By adding locations to your events, your phone can give you travel estimates, directions, and even traffic updates, making sure you're never late again. Sounds good, right?!

#### **Problem statement:**

We've all done it—set up back-to-back meetings or appointments and assumed we'd have enough time to get from point A to point B, only to realize halfway there that we didn't factor in the traffic. Or worse, you're sitting in a meeting when your phone dings to tell you about your next appointment—

#### **Before we get started:**

Make sure you're set up to get the most out of these tips. First, check that your iPhone is running the latest version of iOS. To do that, go to \*\*Settings > General > Software Update\*\*. If an update is available, install it to make sure you have access to the latest features I'll be covering. Once that's done, grab your iPhone and open your Settings app so you can follow along

### Here's How:

Open the Calendar app on your iPhone. Tap the '+' icon to create a new event or open an existing one. Find the 'Location' field and tap it. Type in the address of your meeting, appointment, or lunch spot. You can also select from suggested locations nearby. Your event now has a location! Your phone will calculate travel time, adjust for traffic, and even remind you when it's time to leave.
