a message from our pastor

ALL SAINTS DAY

This festival has a long and storied history. As is usually the case, multiple strands have come together to form the Holy Day we now know as All Saints' Day (and All Saints' Sunday - the first Sunday after November 1). All Saints', All Hallows', Halloween blend and blur to form what we now commemorate.

All Saints Day used to be a much more prominent day on the Church calendar which is why Brother Martin chose October 31 to do his church door nailing. He wanted the largest possible audience for the 95 Theses and people streaming in on All Saints would provide it! In the sixteenth century, they were coming to view relics, but still they came.

Originally a day set aside to commemorate martyrs (those who die for their faith), All Saints day expanded to encompass all the baptized who have left the Church Militant (the Church on Earth) and joined the Church Triumphant (the Church at rest in the presence of God). Here is what the Oxford Dictionary of Saints has to say:

"All Saints (All Hallows) is the feast of all the redeemed, known and unknown, who are now believed to be in Heaven. It has an Eastern origin, first commemorating the 'martyrs of the whole world', as witnessed by Ephrem of Syria and John Chrysostom. In the West, Maximus of Turin preached on the same feast on the same day, the first Sunday after Pentecost.

At Rome the Pantheon was dedicated to St. Mary and the Martyrs on 13 May 610. Many see this as the origin of the feast in the West, but the reality seems more complex. The 7th century lectionary called the *Comes of Wurzburg* described the feast as one of all the saints, not only the martyrs. In the reign of Pope Gregory III (731-41) a chapel in St.

Peter's, Rome was dedicated to all the saints; Egbert of York brought the feast to England, where it is found as a marginal addition to the Martyrology of Bede under 1 November. In 799 Alcuin of York, then abbot of Tours, commended Arno of Salzburg for observing this feast on this day. Gregory IV (d. 844) encouraged Louis the Pious to extend the observance of All Saints day all through his dominions.

Meanwhile Ireland too had been celebrating November 1 as All Saints day, according to some manuscripts of Oengus' Martyrology, together with feasts of All Saints of Europe on April 20 and All Saints of Africa on December 23. A Northern English 9th century calendar ranked it as a principal feast, such it has always remained. Devotional writers see in it the fulfilment of Pentecost and indeed of Christ's redemptive sacrifice and resurrection. Ancient English church dedications number 1,255, a number surpassed only those dedicated to the Virgin Mary.

All Souls. Although prayers for the dead are inscribed in some Roman catacombs from early Christian centuries, the Church was slow to dedicate a liturgical day to offering prayers and masses to help them attain the Beatific Vision through purification later described as Purgatory. The first example of this commemoration seems to be in the time of Isidore of Seville (d. 636): the day assigned was the Monday after Pentecost.

Dead monks were commemorated in this way: the extension to 'all the dead who have existed from the beginning of the world to the end of time' was the work of Odilo, abbot of

Cluny (d. 1049). He also appropriately decreed that the day immediately following the feast of All Saints, November 2, should be set aside for this purpose.

There was also widespread popular belief that souls in purgatory could appear on earth on this day to haunt, in the form of ghosts, witches, or toads, those who had wronged them in life. It was also believed that they could be helped by almsgiving in case or in kind, such as 'soul-cakes' or fruit requested in a plaintive English folksong which survives to this day. Some of those beliefs seem to be subsumed in popular customs now associated Hallowe'en, or the Eve of All Saints (October 31)."

Within the Church, setting aside trick or treating for the moment, we remember all those people who have died within the covenant of their Baptism. There is a special emphasis upon those in our congregation who have died since the last All Saints Day, but we remember all those people who have gone before us.

The bottom line for this feast day is not a spooky collection of ghost stories, but the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ and our baptism into it. This feast day celebrates the covenant God makes in Holy Baptism with each and with all.

Oh, blest communion, fellowship divine,
we feebly struggle [Church Militant],
they in glory shine [Church Triumphant];
yet all are one in thee, for all are thine.
Alleluia! Alleluia!

The golden evening brightens in the west;
soon, soon to faithful servants cometh rest;
sweet is the calm of paradise the blest.

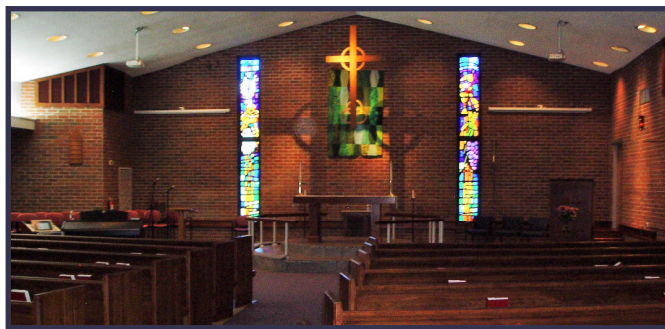

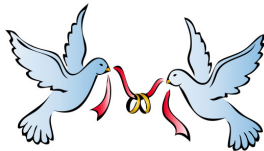
