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a message from our pastor

Alleluia! He is risen. He is risen, indeed! Alleluia!

It just doesn't get old, does it? The thunderous proclamation of Good News trumpeted forth on Easter Sunday reverberates through the Church. Thanks be to God that Easter is not simply a singular event. The paschal candle so prominent at Zoe Miriam's baptism now stands beside the Altar. This graphically calls our attention to the Easter Proclamation and baptism into that proclamation.

For seven weeks we glory in the wonder of Eastertide. These are the weeks of Easter as we focus our attention upon the resurrection experiences of the Early Church with the living Jesus. Like good detectives, we read about the Who, What, Where, When and Why! This did not come in one fell swoop. The power and promise the resurrection takes time to sink into confused and confounded minds. This is a lot to take it.

And even when we finish the seven weeks of Easter, we find a new reality in place. Every Sunday is a "little Easter." Every Sunday is a celebration of the Resurrection and our baptism into the Resurrection. It is feast and celebration. Hence, Sundays (with)in Lent rather than of (belonging to) Lent. Sundays are feast days. We do not fast on those days and they do not "count" when figuring the 40 days of Lent. The only way the math works is to "skip" the Sundays in Lent. Then you get forty days.

We also do not worship on Sunday in order to meet legal requirements. Depending on how you number the commandments, it is either the third or fourth. "Remember the Sabbath Day to keep it holy." The Sabbath is from Sundown Friday to Sundown Saturday. We do not create a new type of Christian Sabbath where we check off a box to meet a requirement. We worship on Sunday because it is the day of Resurrection. Every Sunday is a commemoration of Easter!

Alleluia! He is risen. He is risen, indeed! Alleluia!

May our proclamation ever be as joyous and profound and simple. Jesus lives. And because he lives, we shall live also. And maybe even more amazing..... it is not simple future directed. The Good News is lived here. There is nothing which can or will separate us from the love of Jesus Christ, resurrected and living, here and now. "For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord. (Rm 8:38-39)".

A Summary of the Fairfield Glade Council of Churches

From its beginning after 1980, the Council of Churches was established to strengthen our community across denominational lines as well as to offer care to the members of the individual churches and to be a positive presence within the community of Fairfield Glade. Representatives from each congregation, along with the clergy of each church make up the Council.

We began by holding ecumenical worship services twice a year: Easter Sunrise and the Wednesday evening before Thanksgiving Day. A rotation of responsibilities for hosting, preaching and clergy participation of these events was established. At first Easter services were held at St. George Marina. However, weather issues became a problem and we began meeting in churches. For a time, we attempted to hold services at the Conference Center in an effort to bring more people from the community to the service. That did not bring in the hoped-for additional people and so we returned to being hosted at our churches. During this time, we moved the Thanksgiving service to Tuesday of Thanksgiving week instead of Wednesday.

The Council of Churches became a support to one another and the community at large. Around 2012 the Peavine Care Center Food Pantry to serve residents along the Peavine corridor who need food. We began by having a devotional given by one of the clergy or laity of the Council churches and distributing food to folks who came to the Center. Since COVID, the food distribution process had to change, however, the Center is still a vital source of outreach and support to many in our community.

Recognizing the growing needs of our community, the Council of Churches in 2012-2013 helped to establish what is now Resident Services. Because so many in our community have come from somewhere else, churches become the "family" who cares for folks during life transitions. Resident Services was born out of realizing that not everyone in our community is affiliated with a church.

After 2014, we began hosting the National Day of Prayer, held the first Thursday in May. This service began at Mirror Lake and in time moved to St. George Marina. There are specific guidelines that help frame the prayers of the clergy as we move through praying for governmental leaders, businesses, schools, homes, and communities.

When Good Samaritan Society began, there were members from each of the churches on the steering committee that helped to establish it. As such, each church donated funds toward the chapel and each church was given specific responsibilities for worship services. It was mandatory for staff to attend worship each day. Some services were lay led and others were clergy led. For instance: the Methodist church had clergy led worship every Thursday morning at 9:30 a.m. Then every fourth Saturday, the laity led worship. Laity from other churches divided up the worship services on other Saturdays. This was a schedule that was created by Good Samaritan Society that ran until everything shut down with COVID. Worship services resumed recently and Pastor Groce leads a Worship service on the third Wednesday of each month at 10:00 a.m.

In 2019 the Upper Cumberland Diversity Advocates (UCDA) formed to celebrate and educate our community about diversity of culture, religion, and race within our country. In 2022 the Council of Churches joined with the UCDA on there Day of Diversity, held the fourth Saturday of August. The purpose of the Council being a part of this day is to show our unity as well as our diversity within our denominations.

The most recent new event we collaborated on is the Autumn Choral Festival of 2023. The respective choirs and choral leaders worked together on selected pieces as well as showcasing the individual choirs. A part of this also included a "sing-along" of favorite hymns with the congregation. This is an event meant to offer fellowship to the community and the congregations of the Council.
