a message from our pastor

Advent - Christmas - Epiphany. The Church Year begins at a frenetic and frantic pace. It is not all that dissimilar from life in general. We close out one year and begin the next at a dead run of parties and gatherings and whatnots. Moving from one event to the next with precious little time to rest or reflect. One of the many things I have learned from leading the *GriefShare* program (which is starting up again in January) is this little nugget: **Take Time For Yourself**.

Doesn't sound all that earth shaking, but it can be a life-saver. Whether processing grief and loss or navigating the holiday (Holy Day) season, we encounter a high degree of expectation. Some of the expectation is thrust upon us and some we pile on ourselves, especially in the holiday season.

Our holiday tables should resemble a Norman Rockwell painting. All of the food must be cooked to perfection. We expect to ascend the pinnacle of joy and happiness and then stay perched there while we survey gatherings we encounter. Children and grandchildren are to be little angels - quiet, clean and well behaved - while we smile beatifically over the assembly.

The reality is probably much closer to what Mary and Joseph would have encountered at the first Christmas. No great meals... smelly animals.... a screaming child... a mind-numbing, bone-crushing fatigue. The picture in our heads slowly fades to black as reality takes over. When that happens, **Take**Time For Yourself (followed closely by make expectations more realistic).

I told you before that it doesn't seem fair that Mary gets all the attention in this season and the "Hail Mary" as well. So, for all of us who understand the experience of just being tired... for all of us who had experience fall far short of expectation... for all of us who know deep in the quietness of our heart of hearts what it feels like to fall far short of the Norman Rockwell/Hallmark Holiday experience. Enter St. Joseph. Joseph the long suffering one. Joseph the one who understands what it is to have expectations shattered. Joseph walks into a very difficult situation with his focus forward and his head held high. Joseph who does not attempt to achieve perfection, but does the best that he can with what he has where he is. Joseph, Guardian of Jesus.

"Hail Joseph, full of patience, the Lord is with thee. Blessed are thou among men and blessed is the child placed into your care and keeping. Holy Joseph, Guardian of Jesus, pray for us care givers now and in the hour of our complete exhaustion. Amen."

Take Time For Yourself as you move through these Holy Days. Give yourself the gift of expecting and accepting less than the Norman Rockwell picture of what is supposed to happen. Be present in the messiness and noise and chaos - because that is where God encounters each and all.


We are a very blessed congregation. We are in a solid financial position and expect that no one will deem that it should lead to complacency.

Notes from the Health and Safety Team

Winter weather is upon us and it never hurts to think about driving safety in the colder months. Below are a few helpful hints to make your drive time safer.

- If the weather is bad and it's not an emergency, wait until the day warms up. The snow will melt, ice will be
 gone, and the brighter daylight will improve visibility.
- Wet leaves can be as slick as black ice slow down when there are leaves in the roadway or whenever you see a slick shine.
- Stock your vehicle with some survival items a warm blanket, energy bars, bottles of water, etc. just in case
 you end up stuck on the road somewhere.
- Refill your gas anytime it falls below 1/2 tank. If you have to idle while waiting on a tow truck, you will want to stay warm.
- Consider storing a bag of kitty litter in your trunk. If you end up off the road, it could provide the needed traction to get you back on your way.
- If it has been more than a year since you have had your wiper blades replaced, consider doing that now. Worn | wiper blades will impact your visibility during rain and snow.


