I've been thinking a lot about words over the last month. Which probably isn't surprising since I'm a pastor and I spend a lot of time reading, writing, and trying to get the phrasing of things juuuust right. There's a lot of research out there about how the words that we use have an enormous impact on the realities that we live in. And so, as we head into April and prepare for the Easter season of resurrection, I wonder what things we've maybe written off with our words when what they really need is space to resurrect?

For example, many white mainline Protestant churches loudly bemoan the fact that "the church is dying." But what if instead of dying, the church of today is trying to transform and resurrect into something new, and we keep killing it off with our set narrative and words of decline. After all, the church universal is not dying — churches in South America and Africa are growing at astounding rates. Churches here in the US that lean more evangelical and pentecostal are gaining new members all the time.

I wonder if the church is trying to tell us something and we're just too set in our own stories and language to really notice what's happening. Folks say "the church is dying" and yet we welcomed six incredible new members into our folds just last month. "The church is dying" but when we have bible studies, 30% of the folks who come are community members outside of FCC who are just interested in what we're talking about. "The church is dying" but when we put on events that are open to the community (like the Easter Egg Hunt or Trunk-or-Treat), people show up in droves and we're amazed at the numbers!

So as we edge closer to Easter and the joyful news of the resurrection, I encourage you to think about the stories we tell about the church and the language that we use to tell them, whether that's "The church is dying" or something else. Are those stories even true, or have we just been telling them for so long that it's become second nature to us? Maybe it's time to let go of the language that's holding us back and make space for what Spirit is calling us to in this season of our life together.

After all, we are resurrection people:)

You can drop it off in the container in my office until April 1. We also need **volunteers** to help on the day of the event from 2:30-4:30. Clangy change for March supported the **birthday bags** for Community Care. I was able to build 12 bags with the clangy change; and through many people's generous support, many more have been delivered to my office. If you are building a birthday bag or two, they need to

be delivered to my office by April 1. Again, a **HUGE THANK YOU** for supporting this outreach project.

Our April **clangy change** collection will support purchasing supplies for our shut-ins Easter bags. The bags will be ready by

Just a reminder that there is no Sunday School on Easter Sunday but materials will be available for children to work on in worship. The nursery will be available for our "littles."
