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#### From the Pastor – Pastor Kearstin (she/her)

Each year around Easter, I hear at least one person pushing the narrative that, "The Jews killed Jesus!" Now, this is not true, and, in a time of rising anti-Jewish sentiment, I want to talk through why that is. In our Gospels during the passion narrative, there is a scene where a crowd (that includes Jewish leaders) calls for the Roman governor to crucify Jesus. The thing is — the crowd doesn't have the power to make that decision. Pilot, the governor, does; he could choose to let Jesus go, especially since he thinks that Jesus is innocent. But we know that Pilot doesn't let Jesus go, and that's because he's afraid that the people are going to rally around Jesus and cause a riot, which would then bring Pilot's Roman bosses down hard on him. Pastor Sarah TevisTownes teaches that, due to political pressure, Pilot chooses violence and control over integrity and justice.

Now you may be wondering, "Okay sure, but don't we hear in the Gospel stories about Jewish leaders who wanted Jesus gone?" Yes, absolutely, and some of them did want Jesus gone! But some of those leaders were actually installed by Rome to keep order in Jerusalem as a way to keep watch (and control) over the Jewish community. Here again, their main worry was that Jesus' message of radical love and welcome would stir up the Jewish community enough to draw the notice of Roman authorities, who would then respond with violence. Many ordinary Jewish folks, teachers in the temple, and Jewish leaders (including some Pharisees) were on Jesus' side and agreed with his message of inclusion and justice.

It's also important to remember that all the stories we have in our Bibles were written by authors with their own biases and agendas. For example, the Gospel of John is explicitly hostile to the Jewish community, using "the Jews" as a literary shorthand to talk about "the anthesis of Jesus' message," which creates an us vs. them binary in the text. Many scholars think this was important to the author of John because the Gospel was written in a time when early Jesus-followers were distancing themselves from other faiths (like Judaism), and so this us vs. them back and forth helped the community draw boundaries for themselves as they worked to become a separate religion.

In modern times, the hostile rhetoric from John has been used to promote anti-semitism and anti-Jewish Christian movements.

So, did the Jews kill Jesus? No, the Roman Empire killed Jesus. Our scriptures tell their stories from a particular perspective, with a particular bias, but ultimately it didn't matter what Jewish leaders said; the only one with the power in the Passion narrative to kill or save Jesus was Pilot, the Roman governor...and he chose to kill Jesus.

In this Easter season of resurrection, let us leave behind the stories and hostilities that harm our siblings in faith. We can talk about the injustice of Jesus' death without attacking Jesus' fellow Jews. Because remember, Jesus was a Jewish man, steeped in his faith, deeply committed to his God, and influenced by all his Jewish ancestors before him — and we give thanks for that!

#### First Congregational Church Goals for 2025

As part of our yearly visioning, the church council came up with nine goals for 2025. Some of them are large-scale projects, while others are quick to-do's that will help us embody being a vibrant and diverse community with a forward-thinking and inclusive approach to Christianity. Each month at our council meetings we review these goals and make any updates or plans to work toward completing them. Below are those goals and where we are so far this year.

### 1. Get comprehensive quotes for upgrades to the sound system and A/V system

- a) We are utilizing two new wireless microphones during worship to help with the sound on the livestream.
- Pastor Kearstin met with an A/V person (and friend of Michael Moyseenko) regarding upgrades to our sound system.

# 2. Implement "5 Minutes of Kindness" on a monthly basis and use it in our communications on Sunday morning and in social media

 Each Sunday we are joyfully sharing the many kindnesses we have seen and experienced each week and Pastor Kearstin will be working toward sharing those on our social media.

### 3. Have an active QR code for online giving

a) Completed and being utilized for giving and paying for special events.

## 4. Bring a practical lens to continued bible study opportunities

- a) Pastor Kearstin hosted a bible study on love in February and held a deathcare discussion after worship in March.
- b) Have an idea for a bible study? Let Pastor Kearstin know!

## 5. Host four creative worship experiences (guest speakers, all songs, other ideas)

- a) Beth Dornan will speak on climate justice in May (she recently attended a student ecology summit in California).
- b) The UCC's Global Relations Minister, East Asia and the Pacific, will hold a workshop in July.
- c) Pastor Kearstin is working with Global Ministries on setting up another speaker possibly in June.

#### Have an in-person presence at four community events (setting up a church booth at a festival, etc.)

- a) Participating in North Ridgeville's Discover the Ridge event with our Junk in the Trunk on May 17.
- b) Participating in North Ridgeville's Holiday on the Ridge event with our Craft Show on December 6.
- Mercy McCloskey is organizing a fall flea market and antique appraisal event in October.
- d) Corn Festival in August-possibly a booth or a float in the parade
- e) Considering hosting a health fair and organizing a Church World Service Crop Walk.

## 7. Create and implement a communication strategy and social media policy

 a) Matt Karlovec is heading up the social media committee; they are going to be working on setting up our branding guidelines and a social media policy.

Host a new non-profit in our space during the week

a) A new non-profit called Three C Club (whose mission is to support children whose lives have been affected by a loved one's addiction) will be holding their weekly meetings at the church beginning in September.

#### 9. Recruit folks to our music ministry

- a) We are blessed by Nicole Brooks sharing her talent with us in the choir.
- b) Barb and the members of the handbell and chancel choirs would happily welcome any new members! (Practices are on Wednesdays at 6:30 & 7:30 pm & Sundays at 10 am from September through May.)

Nine goals. Twelve months. Over a hundred members. There's no doubt we can accomplish these things if we work together as a church community. Is the Spirit calling you to use your gifts to help us complete these goals?? No matter what skills you have, we want to help you light up the world with your gifts. We are a chosen family of faith, a hodgepodge group of incredible folks who come together to praise God and work for love and justice in the world — and it's time that we boldly share this good news far and wide with the world.


You have just read about some members who have donated time and talents in ways that benefit the entire congregation. I want to mention that these are only some of the members who have donated time, talent and
