LINCS Programs by the Numbers



Warrior Bag Program

Provides supplemental food for district students experiencing food insecurity. Students take the bags home on Fridays to ensure they have enough food for the weekend.

5,000

OVERALL IMPACT

Thousands of Warrior Bags helped to address hunger in hundreds of district families since the founding of LINCS in 2012.

FUNDING NEEDS

The Warrior Bag program is funded solely through financial and in-kind donations, without which it would cost \$35,000 a year to operate.



Food Pantry

More families than ever rely on this vital resource which is open every Monday from 10:00 to 12:00 PM to meet the growing need. The pantry is operated entirely by a faithful group of volunteers.

OVERALL IMPACT

Thousands of adults, children, and seniors throughout Northampton County, became more food secure as a result of visiting the LINCS pantry in the last 13 years.

FUNDING NEEDS

This program is subsidized by state and federal grants through Second Harvest Food Bank.

Summer Playground Program

The playground provides a safe, welcoming space where children can stay active, build friend-ships, engage in meaningful play, and have access to summer nutrition.



80 STUDENTS

benefited from attending the program in 2024

OVERALL IMPACT

Hundreds of children had the opportunity to experience summer programming that is not provided in the more urban areas of the district over the last several years.

FUNDING NEEDS

The program was previously funded by grants. We hope to bring the program back in 2026.

Linking Families to Services

A dedicated social worker leads a vital referral program, empowering individuals and families with the critical support they need. By connecting them to essential community and county resources, this program helps build stability, hope, and a path toward a better future.

OVERALL IMPACT

Since 2022, hundreds of Wilson Area residents have been connected to job opportunities, provided with access to healthcare, legal, mental health, and other services.

FUNDING NEEDS

The LINCS Family Navigator is funded through a Community Development Block Grant from Northampton County.



Teaching Garden

Students explore plant science and the importance of nutrition by planting a garden before the school year ends. Their harvest directly supports the LINCS Food Pantry, providing fresh produce for families experiencing food insecurity.

OVERALL IMPACT

Approximately 350 students have been involved in garden programming since 2022.

FUNDING NEEDS

The Kellyn Foundation Program at the LINCS garden is funded in the 2025/2026 school year by funding from the Two Rivers Health and Wellness Foundation.

The Communities That Care model focuses on promoting positive youth development and preventing problem behaviors by assessing predictors both of problem behaviors and of positive youth outcomes. In order to continue building the programming, events, community spirit, and enhance the services of LINCS, the coalition requires operational funds for staffing and expenses.

According to the Federal Census Bureau, there has been a 59% increase in poverty in the Wilson Area School District Since 2019.

Having a dedicated staff person is essential to maintaining and growing these programs. Without a staff member to coordinate efforts, apply for grants, and manage day-to-day operations, LINCS and CTC will be forced to return to a volunteer-run model. While volunteers are invaluable, sustaining the scope of these programs on a volunteer-only basis is not feasible. The sheer volume of services provided, the level of coordination required, and the need for continuous funding demand a full-time staff person.

Communities That Care

OVERALL IMPACT

Approximately

2,000 individuals

Served through LINCS and coalition programming under the direction of the current mobilizer



FUNDING NEEDS

The Coalition Mobilizer and LINCS Director as well as the general operation of the CTC and LINCS programs was previously covered by grants. The amount needed to continue to operate all of these programs for one year is \$100,000 and the current funding expires on June 30th, 2025.

Coalition Programs

Community Walk, Mixers, and Family Fun Nights

The coalition launched mixers as family events, engaging parents, local residents, and high school students. In 2025, they became Family Fun Nights, designed to bring parents, children, and the local community closer together.

FUNDING NEEDS

Family fun nights are completely free events based on creating opportunities for families to bond in a third place outside of home or work, and cost approximately \$5,000 per school year.



Coalition Programming and Support of District Educational Programming

The coalition is actively recommending evidence-based programs designed to reduce risk factors and increase protection for students in the district. In addition, grant funding allowed the coalition to provide enhancements to the academic summer program at the intermediate school, including The Shanthi Project and the Kellyn Foundation.
