MISSION

EqualMed aims to improve access to healthcare in under-served communities around the world and make a difference to the lives of many one-step-at-a-time.

VISION

A world in which every human has equitable access to quality healthcare.

HISTORY

The foundation of EqualMed began in 2013 and in 2016 was officially registered as a 501(c)(3) tax exempt public charity with the IRS and as a corporation in the State of Georgia. Its genesis was Nivita D. Sharma who was a high school student at the time. The call to establish a nonprofit to help the medically under-served and economically disadvantaged was motivated by the passing away in 2013 of her beloved grandmother at 69 who did not have access to quality healthcare in the Fiji Islands. Turning her own sorrow of losing her young grandmother, Nivita aims to make a difference to the lives of the medically under-served and those less fortunate to afford basic healthcare. However, Nivita's pledge to bring healthcare to those in need in Fiji was a tremendous struggle when she embarked on her mission as an individual in 2013 and 2014. She used her personal savings to achieve the medical missions in 2013 and 2014 because organizations would not support an individual's cause. Learning the hard way, Nivita established her charity EqualMed as a tax exempt 501(c)(3) non-profit to pursue her passion of significantly reducing the medical care disparity throughout the world. Fiji is her first country to work with as it is close to her heart and the fact that large charities do not usually assist the medical system of nations in the South Pacific.

ABOUT US

EqualMed's Inaugural and Continuing Efforts

The foundation of EqualMed began with two medical missions to Fiji by its founder and chief executive officer, Nivita D. Sharma. Using her personal savings, Project Fiji was successfully executed in summer of 2013, and medical needs evaluation resulted in the second project that was successfully executed in summer of 2014. The desperate medical needs of health facilities in Fiji evaluated in the 2013 and 2014 missions led to the formal genesis of EqualMed that was incorporated as a tax exempt 501(c)(3) non-profit in 2016. Since then, *Nivita traveled to Fiji using personal savings to ensure the medical supply container shipments were deployed directly to targeted healthcare facilities*. Simultaneously, Nivita conducted needs assessments to prepare for subsequent missions. When Covid-19 struck, EqualMed, through the generosity of its donors, came to the rescue of Fiji's healthcare system by shipping three 40-foot containers of medical supplies in 2020, 2021, and 2022.

Why Fiji?

To many, Fiji is paradise and indeed it is for hundreds of thousands of tourists enjoying the clear blue skies, sunshine, and unspoiled beaches engulfing the crystal-clear waters. But for the people of this friendly nation, paradise is elusive. This archipelago of about 300 islands suffered multiple military coups that resulted in the exodus of medical professionals that has left the nation with a relatively neglected health system due to withdrawal of foreign aid since 1987. Yet, patients from neighboring pacific nations come to Fiji for medical treatment because Fiji has the most advanced medical facilities among the 16 countries in the South Pacific. Fiji has a School of Medicine and is the hub of the University of the South Pacific.

Ironically, medical facilities throughout Fiji lack very basic medical supplies. Necessary medical supplies such as micropore tape, thermometers, dressings, stethoscopes and otoscopes, skin prep wipes, crutches, scissors, insulin syringes, diabetes monitoring equipment (blood glucose monitors and test strips), catheters, and even basic medications are lacking and urgently needed. These supplies are available abundantly in the USA. Each year millions of tons of unexpired medical supplies in the USA are discarded in landfills that unnecessarily burden our lovely planet. By redirecting such supplies, EqualMed makes a small yet valuable stride in sustainability efforts.

Patients in Fiji often must bring their own medical supplies. For example, during previous medical missions, Nivita witnessed a 10-year old boy with a suspected broken arm waiting for hours to be seen at a major city hospital only to be told to purchase plaster from a private pharmacy in town as the hospital did not have any. Admitted children were asked to bring their own bedding (pillows, sheets, and blankets). Medical staff use commercial adhesive (sticky tape) tape instead of medical micropore tape on wounds and seconds later the tape falls off (try it on yourself). The list goes on. The take home idea is that basic medical supplies are lacking in paradise – a paradox! Together we can take one-step-at-a-time and make a difference to the lives of many.

Founder & Chief Executive Officer: Nivita D. Sharma, MD.

Nivita Sharma is a first-year internal medicine resident at the Duke Internal Medicine Residency Program. She completed her M.D. at Weill Cornell Medicine (WCM) in New York City in 2022. Nivita is an inductee of the prestigious Gold Humanism Honor Society in medicine, Phi Beta Kappa, Phi Kappa Phi, and Palladia Women's Society. At WCM she served as a senior clinician at the community clinic, internal medicine clerkship peer to peer mentor, and tutor for medical students. She also volunteered on numerous bodies such as the WCM Center for Human Rights, WCM Admissions, WCM Telehealth Taskforce, and New York State COVID-19 Vaccination Program.

She graduated Summa Cum Laude and Highest Honors with a Bachelor of Science in Biology and a minor in Global Health in May of 2018 from The University of Georgia (UGA). At UGA, Nivita held the office of Vice President (2017-2018) of The American Red Cross Chapter, served on the Student Health Advisory Committee (2016 – 2018), and volunteered at Piedmont Athens Regional Medical Center from 2015 to 2017. Through her role in MEDLIFE, she travelled to Lima, Peru to set up mobile clinics and provide medical care to less fortunate and medically under-served families in rural communities. While in high school, Nivita engaged in various charitable events to help the economically disadvantaged and those with medical disabilities. Nivita is also a certified Red Cross first aid responder.

As an active medical researcher, Nivita Sharma has published/presented more than 25 medical research studies. While at WCM, Nivita received the Gloria Friedman Teaching Award and Clinical and Translational Science Center summer research fellowship. She is tri-lingual – English, Hindi, and Spanish, and can utter a few Fijian words and phrases.

Chairman of the Board: Divesh S. Sharma, PhD.

Dr. Divesh Sharma is a Distinguished Professor of Accounting at Kennesaw State University, Georgia, USA. He grew up in the Fiji Islands and obtained his undergraduate and graduate degrees from the University of Canterbury in New Zealand and Griffith University in Australia. Dr. Sharma is a Fellow of the Institute of Chartered Accountants (Australia) and worked as an auditor with KPMG prior to his academic career.

Corporate Secretary: Vineeta D. Sharma, PhD.

Dr. Vineeta Sharma is a Professor of Accounting at Kennesaw State University, Georgia, USA. She grew up in the Fiji Islands and obtained her undergraduate and graduate qualifications from the University of the South Pacific in Fiji and Griffith University in Australia.

Director of Health Operations in Fiji: Selvin Prasad, MCom.

Mr. Selvin Prasad was born and raised in Fiji and has personally witnessed the dilapidated healthcare system of Fiji. He began his journey with EqualMed in 2017 serving as a volunteer unloading the container of medical supplies. His volunteering transitioned into serving as the communication channel between EqualMed, the Ministry of Health, and healthcare facilities throughout Fiji when the pandemic struck. Selvin manages the ground logistics and deployment. Selvin's love for his country and faith drive his passion to help those in need. He is an assistant lecturer at The University of the South Pacific and is currently pursuing a Doctor of Philosophy in Accounting. Mr. Prasad is the recipient of two academic gold medals for the best master's dissertation in his college and the entirety of the University of the South Pacific.

Director of Education Operations: Ranjani Lata, MSc.

Ms. Ranjani Lata is the Director of Education Operations for EqualMed in Fiji. Her volunteering expanded to serving as the communication channel between EqualMed and the education sector in Fiji since 2019. Ranjani graciously worked during weekends and her vacation to manage the unloading, sorting, labelling, and distribution of medical supplies and equipment during the pandemic years 2020, 2021, and 2022. She spearheaded EqualMed's initiative to equip high school science labs enabling students to engage in science experiments. EqualMed is encouraging science students to consider a career in healthcare as a sustainable strategy to address healthcare needs in Fiji. Ranjani heads the science department at Waidina College. She holds a Master of Science by research in Biology and is currently pursuing a Doctor of Philosophy in Biology.

CEO'S REPORT

Dear Generous Donors, Supporters, Partners, and Future Contributors,

It is with great gratitude and a full heart that I share with you the successes and impacts of EqualMed in 2020, 2021, and 2022. We have been living through tumultuous and unpredictable times, and every corner of the world has been affected. EqualMed's responses to the pandemic in Fiji made rippling positive impacts throughout her healthcare system. This report is our special pandemic edition outlining our work during the Covid-19 pandemic. You can click the links to our webpages for detailed information.

As soon as Covid-19 rapidly spread in early 2020, Fiji, along with many other countries, closed her borders to foreign travelers. At the time, I was a third year medical student on my clinical rotations at one of the largest hospitals in New York City. I was part of a medical team that encountered the first Covid-19 patient at our hospital. I recall the panic and uncertainty in how to deal with this unprecedented case. I remember running down the hallway after receiving a page from a nurse that our patient's oxygen level was dropping rapidly. I remember doctors and nurses telling me that we were only allowed to keep one N95 mask. I remember looking around for personal protective equipment (PPE) (masks, gloves, shields, gowns, etc) to enter patient rooms, but there were none available – this was the beginning of the dire shortage of items in our New York City hospital and it felt unimaginably eerie!

I am sure you felt something similar. How can a pandemic strike and even begin to rapidly unfold at this scale within our lifetime? The stories we have heard and tragedies we have seen, are unparalleled. While we were cocooned in our homes and hearing of the strains on our local healthcare systems, we felt isolated. As isolated as we felt, every corner of the world was collectively suffering.

In 2020, 2021, and 2022, EqualMed raised emergency funds to ship three 40-foot containers filled with urgently needed medical supplies and equipment. While the list of items is long, I outline in this special Covid-19 report how your generosity helped the Fiji healthcare system during the pandemic.

2020

In 2020, our donors helped ship a 40-foot container of medical supplies to care for patients with Covid-19, protect healthcare providers, and treat patients suffering from diseases that do not pause during a pandemic. **PPE** were donated hospitals throughout Fiji. overwhelming response from Fiji was one of incredible appreciation and Vinaka Vaka for **YOUR** generosity Levu healthcare workers, recipients, and the Minister for Health. 2021

As the pandemic continued to take its toll around the world, our donors again came together to send another 40-foot container of mostly medical supplies and equipment to fight Covid-19. This year, EqualMed went deeper into the Fiji Islands as we learned of very remote villages suffering from the pandemic and not having access proper medical care and PPE. EqualMed also reached out to vulnerable yet marginalized organizations that care for the elderly and orphaned children. 2022

This was a challenging year as inflation was rising rapidly and people were becoming frustrated with the ongoing pandemic and restrictions. **Our donation drive was well below budget** and it seemed our 2022 mission was impossible! Unexpectedly yet fortunately, an anonymous donor to our inventory supplier, Hospital Sisters Mission Outreach, helped ship the 40-foot container of essential medical supplies to deal with the Covid-19 pandemic. These supplies reached the corners of Fiji including **extremely remote villages accessible only by river boat or through dusty unsealed winding tracks through the mountainous terrain**. EqualMed equipped not only hospitals, emergency rooms, and maternity facilities, but expanded its reach to the school for special needs children, whilst continuing to equip homes for orphaned children, the elderly, and schools for a safe re-opening. Our work in Fiji over the course of the pandemic unveiled significant challenges small poor nations face. I experienced and witnessed dire circumstances in New York City, the epicenter of the pandemic in the USA. The exponential increase in Covid-19 cases strained the healthcare system and caused significant shortages of PPE, ventilators, and hospital beds. We all know of the make-shift medical facilities to treat Covid-19 patients. We all know of hospitals throughout the United States turning away patients seeking non-Covid-19 care, many of whom subsequently passed away due to lack of access to medical care.

Now imagine how unprepared Fiji was in combating the Covid-19 pandemic. Imagine the normal daily predicament of the people of Fiji who lack access to basic medical care. Imagine the less fortunate and medically under-served, imagine those living in remote areas who cannot afford to travel to a medical facility, and imagine the quandary of special needs and orphaned children, those suffering from diabetes, and the elderly - the most vulnerable and challenged parts of the population seeking medical attention. YOUR assistance to meet the continuous needs of the medically under-served and less fortunate is paramount, as this shocking pandemic has revealed vulnerabilities and huge ruptures in the already dilapidated healthcare system of Fiji.

I would like to emphasize that EqualMed is a rare IRS registered charity that operates purely on a <u>volunteer</u> basis, such that 100% of *YOUR* contributions are exclusively used to acquire and ship medical supplies and equipment to Fiji. *All of YOUR generous contributions went directly to beneficiaries* as you will see from the graphs of funding sources and financial summaries later in this report. I am extremely thankful to all of YOU, and to the partners, supporters, and volunteers. Without YOUR support, EqualMed would not be able to execute its mission of providing access to healthcare to the medically under-served and economically disadvantaged. TOGETHER, we can take one-step-at-a-time and make a HUGE difference to their lives. Indeed, the world feels smaller when we work together!






The nearest hospital is **TWO** hours away in a small town and the **major hospital** in the <u>Capital City of Suva</u> is about **FIVE hours** away!

EqualMed Hands Over the Hygienic Items for Primary & Secondary Schools to PS Education

EqualMed, a registered charitable organization in United States, handed over essential PPE and other hygienic items to the Permanent Secretary for Education, Heritage & Arts, Dr. Anjeela Jokhan, for distribution to primary and secondary schools around Fiji. Whilst receiving the items, Dr. Jokhan mentioned that all these items were important in ensuring that students, teachers, parents and others who entered the schools were well protected. "As we get ready to welcome all students back to school from 11 April for 2022 academic year, the Ministry with its partners such as EqualMed would like to ensure them that schools are supported to have the necessary resources to keep the environment safe for the students and teachers," said Dr. Jokhan.

The Ministry received KN95 masks, wipes, gloves, patient gown, pillow cases, eye shields, girls' hygiene packs and many other essential items which will be deployed to schools to support them have a safe and hygienic environment for students and teachers.

A recorded message from the CEO and the founder of EqualMed, Ms. Nivita Sharma reflected that EqualMed has been donating medical supplies to hospitals and health clinics since 2013 and recently, Ranjani Lata, EqualMed's Director of Education Operations identified this need in primary and secondary schools as well. Consequently, EqualMed expanded their assistance to schools since 2017. In her message, Ms. Sharma, also stated that as we still live in the era of the pandemic, our collective responsibility as a society is to ensure that the next generation of students continue to receive education. She also said that "teachers and students deserve the credit for adhering to the COVID-Safety Protocol instituted in schools which have worked out very well."



EqualMed reports key performance metrics and its governance practices to GuideStar (now operating under Candid), which is the largest worldwide provider of information about non-profits. FINANCIAL SUMMARY


All our transactions are on a cash basis. For each year in our history, the total cost has exceeded donor gifts received. Donor funds are used to acquire, ship, and transport medical supplies and equipment to Fiji. As depicted in the bar graph below, a significant portion of the sourcing and transportation costs to Fiji are met personally by the board members including the CEO. All other major costs such as packaging and transportation of supplies in Fiji to health facilities, customs clearance fees, website hosting, registration fees, and travel costs are also met personally. The 2020 pandemic year was the most successful as donor support has been the highest, while donor support was the lowest in 2022. An anonymous donor to our inventory supply partner, Hospital Sisters Mission Outreach, enabled the 2022 medical mission.

A common performance yardstick of a non-profit is the program expense ratio. This ratio measures the percentage of expenses used to fund the core missions of a non-profit. EqualMed is proud to report that its program expense ratio is 100%. This means that all donor funds including personal contributions go directly toward providing healthcare to the medically under-served and less fortunate.





NEAR TERM OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The pandemic significantly strained and drained medical supplies and equipment in Fiji such that many hospitals are "borrowing" supplies from other facilities. When people in Fiji borrow ("kere-kere"), know that you will not see a replacement! This cultural tendency has left many health facilities and especially those in remote and rural areas without essential supplies.

We know that medical supplies and equipment for children as young as three years and village elders suffering from diabetes are forever lacking in Fiji. The Diabetes Hub in Fiji has again reached out to us for support.

One of the senior medical officers we have worked with since 2013, Dr. Dasi, has been transferred to oversee the Central-Eastern Division. Dr. Dasi reached out to us for rudimentary medical supplies and equipment for numerous under-funded and under-equipped healthcare facilities throughout the region she oversees.
