Town Council Election Date Set

The Leona Valley Town Council had plenty of people volunteer to be candidates for the Board election this year. Unfortunately, many of them did not meet the eligibility requirements set out in the Bylaws. Two people lived outside of the CSD boundaries and one did not meet the two-year residency requirement.

The Town Council Board considered waiving the bylaws requirements in order to allow these excellent candidates to run, but finally determined that it would be best to adhere to the Bylaws. After two years of work the Bylaws were just updated and approved this past June after ample opportunity for review and input. Careful thought and consideration was put into them, so it was decided that it would be best to continue following those rules.

We still have three excellent candidates running, Marie Davis, Marian Wright, and Judy Anaya. The election will be held on Tuesday, Nov. 2 from 4 p.m. to 8 p.m. at the Leona Valley Community Building. Absentee ballots are available at Rancher's Market on the counter next to the Post Office. They must be turned in by 8 p.m. on Nov. 2.

Everyone helped to support the Town Council by buying raffle tickets and bidding on auction items. The revenue from the night will help the Town Council in its continued representation of our residents.







The LWC holds many fun events during the vear.








Great Weather Set the Stage for a Great Gymkhana Season Ending






