#### Leona Valley Town Council is Busy

At our August meeting, we had a speaker from TreePeople give a talk on the pest that is killing oak trees. It started in Green Valley but has spread to Bouquet Canyon. Please use only local fireword, not from infested areas, to keep it out of Leona Valley. They are currently doing restoration work in San Francisquito Canyon and can use volunteers.

There was a hearing on the Ritter Ranch case in July to add more records to what the judge can consider. We won some points and lost some, but overall, were pleased with the results. The trial date is still set for October 20 and our brief has been filed.

#### A Rock Star is Born!

Happy birthday to Leona Valley's Painted Rock Snake!

Many LV residents turned out for the August 5<sup>th</sup> rock-painting fundraising event at the Lakes and Valleys Art Guild. Kids and adults alike brought their own rocks, or selected from rocks that were donated to the cause by the Guild and other individuals. Armed with paint brushes and a wide variety of paint supplied by the Guild, crafters adorned their rocks with a large swath of colors, patterns and images.

The snake's head was a larger, triangular shaped rock, and was auctioned off to the highest bidder. With Jeff Wright acting as the event auctioneer, a spirited back-and-forth bidding between David Clayton, Mill Winfrey, and Marian Wright energized the crowd. Finally, David got the last bid in, donating a generous \$200 for the honor to paint the "business end" of our LV Serpent. Not to be outdone, Mill won the highest bid honors for the tail/rattle, donating another generous sum of \$100 from the Winfrey family.

Painting participants donated \$10 per rock to the "Save Leona Valley" Town Council fund. In total, 44 rocks were painted on Day 1. Including the auctioned-off head and tail, the event brought in almost \$1000.00. A percentage of proceeds from the Kona Ice truck sales was also realized.

The LV Rock Snake is now in growth mode on the west side of the Arts and Guild building. Stop by and see the beautiful and creatively painted rocks. The snake can now continue to grow as additional rocks are painted and donated in the weeks and months to come. For those that couldn't make the August 5<sup>th</sup> event, or just want to have a nice craft to do at home, please bring in your painted rock and help us move the head forward. The rocks and painting supplies will continue to be available on the front porch of the Art Guild Thursday through Sunday. #### More LVIA Events



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#### Where Did That Come From?

#### **Well-Known Phrase Origins**

#### "Bury the Hatchet"

**Today's use:** To forgive one another and make amends. To make peace. To end a feud between people, groups, or companies and put differences behind them.

**Origin:** Beginning in the 1700s, indigenous people of North America, particularly America's northeast and Canada, would bury their weapons/hatchets outside of a village they were entering, prior to a peace meeting with a neighboring tribe. Later in the century, the Iroquois Confederacy made it customary to bury weapons (eg. hatchets) once peace was declared with other tribes, or the English.

#### "Paint the Town Red"

**Today's use**: To go out with friends for a night of partying (drinking alcohol, dancing, laughing, etc).

**Origin:** The most repeated origin comes from the 1830s in England. A notorious nobleman, the Marquis of Waterford (The Mad Marquis), would often times get drunk and unruly with friends in the town of Mowbray, and in addition to vandalizing the town, was documented as painting the town's toll-bar and several buildings red.

#### Giving someone "The Third Degree"

**Today's use:** Verbally interrogating or significantly questioning someone for something done or perceived to have been done

**Origin:** The third degree is the highest level (degree) in Freemasonry—a master mason. Masons are subject to intensive testing (questioning) to qualify for the third degree. This led to the phrase's use in the late 1800s.

#### "Don't beat around the Bush, get to the Point"

**Today's use:** Evade an issue, approach it indirectly.

**Origin:** Beating around the bush goes back many centuries and comes from the language of the huntsman. It was once the custom to hire beaters to beat bushes in order to arouse game birds for the hunter to shoot at. So the beater stirred up the action and then the hunter got to the point.

#### Labor Day History


Labor Day was created as a federal holiday in 1894, after most states had already adopted laws celebrating it for several years. The purpose was to to recognize the many contributions workers have made to America's strength, prosperity, and well-being.

The first celebration occurred in New York City in 1882 with a large parade that started with just a few marchers. Then they were joined by 200 marchers from the Jewelers Union and their band. That got the parade going and eventually they ended up with 10,000 to 20,000 participants.

The parade was followed by a big party in a park with picnics, speakers, and plenty of beer. Happy Labor Day!
