From the Pastor—An Unfamiliar Advent

Being displaced from our familiar and beloved church home during Advent is painful, but also appropriate. The Advent/Christmas story is one of uncertainty and surprise, of journey and displacement.

John the Baptist preaches Jesus' arrival, not in pulpits, synagogues, or city squares, but in the wilderness. People leave the safety of homes and towns to hear him preach in the wild places. Mary and Joseph give birth to Jesus, not in their home or surrounded by family, but in a stranger's stable in an unfamiliar town. The wise men begin an arduous journey, uncertain of its outcome, in order to worship Jesus. For weeks, or even months, their journey takes them far from home, familiar lands and comfortable cultures. The Christmas story concludes with Mary and Joseph fleeing from Israel to Egypt in order to protect Jesus from Herod's decision to kill all of Israel's young children.

Perhaps the greatest displacement, however, comes through the incarnation itself. In The Message, John 14 says, "The Word became flesh and blood, and moved into the neighborhood." In the birth of Jesus, God chose displacement from heaven to human in order to be fully in the world with us.

We love the Christmas season, in part because of its familiarity, longheld traditions, and comfort. Christmas speaks to us of home and church and being centered in our faith. But the Christmas story is one of discomfort, displacement and the unfamiliar. I invite us into an Advent spiritual practice of displacement this year:

Whenever you find yourself missing the familiar traditions of the season, the concerts, the visits with friends and neighbors, worship in the sanctuary, pause to imagine one of the Christmas story characters with you in that moment of displacement. Imagine the wise men with you in unfamiliar experiences. Imagine Mary or Joseph beside you when you can't celebrate in a beloved place. Imagine John the Baptist encouraging you on wilderness days. Most of all, imagine God with you in the person of Jesus, stepping outside the stronghold of heaven to be in these vulnerable days of displacement with us. May the uncertainty and unfamiliarity of this year's Advent/Christmas season become our opportunity to deeply encounter the incarnation of Christ.

Simplified Board Highlights

November 10, 2020

Kathleen opened the meeting by playing part of a YouTube video called "The Keep Going Song" by the Bengsongs. It is an upbeat improvisational song by a young couple sharing some reflections and experiences of this year, making it up as they go along, and hoping that their song makes us feel less alone. You can search for this video on the internet.

The Board discussed the presentation and congregational meeting planned for Nov. 15. The focus will be on communicating the recent work of the Budget Sustainability Task Force and the Church Board, by first presenting some basic financial and budget information, then describing three initiatives that could create new funding streams. The proposed initiatives are a clothes closet ministry, a subscription box ministry for contemplative spiritual practices, and the Upper Room task force to find suitable tenants to rent the second floor space of the Wesley Center. The goal is to get responses from congregation members about their interest, energy, and commitment to these possible new programs. Engaging with the community outside the church is a new direction for Green Street that could sustain the budget, but would depend on support from the congregation. The Randolph clothes closet ministry has given us a good deal of information and guidance already about what might be possible.

Sue Pattershall, Current Expense Treasurer, gave a year-to-date finance update. Giving is slightly ahead of expectations and expenses are about on track for 2020. We are still awaiting news from the bank about whether the PPP loan we received earlier this year will be forgiven automatically, or whether there will be paperwork to file. The Board approved an end-of-year giving appeal emphasizing gratitude for the faithfulness of the congregation.

The Board discussed and decided several administrative issues that will be brought to the Church Conference on December 5, or submitted soon to the Many Waters District office. We will apply to the Conference for reduced mission shares for 2021, in consideration of our projected budget shortfall. The pastor's salary and compensation recommendation from SPRC, which is at the minimum levels set by the New England Conference for an ordained elder with Pastor Kristin's experience, was approved. The 2019 annual church audit was completed; there were only a few recommendations that were referred to the treasurers for review. The 2021 current expense budget was approved, and will be presented to the congregation as part of the Church Conference information. This year's budget is significantly different from those of previous years in that it leads us in a new direction toward gradually reducing our reliance on external support. It does not rely on spending beguest money or one-time funds. It includes a 10% total reduction in staff salaries, to be referred to the SPRC for implementation. In-house ministries will be supported by donations as needed rather than by budgeted amounts. Even expecting continued significant financial support from the Conference, the budget has a deficit of just over \$13,000. After open and thoughtful deliberation, the Board decided to step out in faith that a direction would emerge from one or more of the new ministries of community engagement. These were presented as "possible sources" of income to cover the deficit. It will be up to the congregation to work together to find a way forward in mission and ministry.

Christmas Blessings from the Welcome Table Ministry Team!

So, the coronavirus is going to be with us during the winter months. For some, holiday meals may not be in person. When I was a small child, we lived far away from our grandparents. They lived in South Dakota and we lived in Wisconsin. There was no Zoom or internet and long-distance phone calls were expensive. My maternal grandparents had 40+ grandchildren and so the typical Christmas gifts were not feasible. However, my grandmother knew how to be present with us during the holidays. Every year for many years, she would send us a Christmas box. Our eyes would light up and our hearts would quicken with excitement when my mother said, "We received Grandma's box today!" Inside the box were sugar cookies, chocolate chip cookies, popcorn balls and caramel corn, all homemade of course, and three silver dollars or two 50-cent pieces - one dollar's worth for each of us.

Here is an easy recipe for a Christmas candy that can be mailed out tucked inside a box of homemade kettle corn (use canola oil or light-tasting olive oil to pop the corn in a heavy bottomed cooking pot, and add up to ¼ cup white granulated sugar per ½ cup un-popped popcorn when adding the unpopped corn to the cooking oil). Welcome Table Chocolate Christmas Bark

(Free of the top 8 allergens, gluten free and vegan)

2 Cups - Enjoy Life Chocolate Chips (dark or semi-sweet, I like a blend) *3/4 to 1 cup - pepitas, (check for gluten free – I have found mine at the Food Co-Op in Gardiner)

3/4 cup craisins— (I have had no trouble with Ocean Spray but always read labels for allergens)

Line a cookie sheet or jelly roll pan with parchment paper. In a large glass bowl, melt the chocolate chips in microwave, stir well. Add the pepitas and craisins and stir well. Spread on the cookie sheet or jelly roll pan. Let cool. Cut into small pieces and store in air tight container in the fridge.

*Pepitas are seeds harvested from specific, hull-less pumpkin varieties. Flavor variations: You can try adding flavorings to the melted chocolate that are designed for chocolate (not water-based as this can cause your chocolate to "seize" – harden into an unmanageable mess). Some ideas are mint or orange. Ocean Spray also makes orange-flavored craisins (check label for allergens).

To crisp up stale popcorn, spread it in a single layer on a baking sheet and place in the oven at 250 degrees for 5 minutes or until heated through. Watch it carefully so it doesn't burn.



NOTES FROM THE SPRC

Beloved Green Streeters:

During November and December, the Committee will be conducting ministry assessments of our Pastor, our Staff, and ourselves as a Committee.

The purpose of these assessments is twofold. First, we evaluate our Pastor and Staff because that is our charge as a Committee: "To provide evaluation at least annually for their use in an ongoing, effective ministry and for identifying their continuing educational needs and plans." (¶258.2g(5)) Second, we evaluate our Pastor, our Staff, and ourselves to be supportive and accountable: "support without accountability promotes moral weakness; accountability without support is a form of cruelty." (¶102) In this way, we "watch over one another in love." (¶104)

Self-evaluation is an important aspect of this process: did we live up to our own expectations of ourselves? For instance, in our self-evaluation, we will ask:

- 1. What commitments did the Committee make with the Pastor and Staff?
- 2. What progress has the Committee made toward these goals?
- 3. Are there areas where the Committee has not met expectations?
- 4. What are the possible reasons for not meeting expectations?
- 5. What steps should be taken to change this?
- 6. What new learning will contribute to the Committee's effectiveness?


