FROM THE PASTOR: What Is the Church?

At the end of his letter to the Romans, Paul asks the church to welcome a deacon named Phoebe, coming from another church, and to greet Prisca, Aquila, and other members familiar to him. Paul closes with the words, "all the churches of Christ greet you." Paul ends most of his letters by sharing greetings from church to church. Paul portrays the early church not as isolated congregations, but rather as connected communities on the move. Church members are welcomed into each other's communities and hold each other's ministries in prayer. Missionaries from one congregation bring their gifts to other Christian gatherings.

What if today's churches modeled this type of connected, cooperative ministry? What new insights would arise if laity of various churches visited each other for worship? How might we transform our communities by sending and receiving each other's gifts and knowledge What if our churches weren't isolated buildings, but rather communities on the move, weaving our ministries together as the Spirit led us?

Although the River Churches are anchored by six buildings along the Kennebec River, ministry itself flows between and outside those walls. Shared Bible studies, retreats and worship move from church to church. Shared outreach has happened in local parks, parking lots and libraries. As the River Churches live in the image of the fluid, connected early Church, they also model what ministry could look like in mid-Maine in the 21st century.

One Step Lasagna

1 1/2 cups water

32 oz. sauce

1 box lasagna noodles (dry)

15 oz. ricotta cheese

8 oz. mozzarella cheese-shredded

1/2 cup parmesan cheese (divided)

Combine the water with the sauce. Cover the bottom of 13x9 pan with 1-1/2 cup water/sauce mixture. Arrange dry noodles on top the sauce mixture. Spread 1/2 of the ricotta and 1/2 mozzarella cheese and 2Tbl. parmesan cheese. Add sauce. Repeat the layers. Top with noodles, sauce and 1/4 c parmesan cheese. Cover with foil and place on jellyroll pan. Bake at 350 for 1 hour or until a knife goes easily through pasta. Let stand 1/2 hour covered.

Choose Love

Martin Luther King Jr., whose life and legacy we honor this month, spoke often about the power of love. In fact, he equated the practice of nonviolence with "absolute commitment to the way of love."

Love, declared the minister and activist, "is the only force capable of transforming an enemy into a friend." And, he said, anyone who's "devoid of the power to love" is "devoid of the power to forgive."

King distinguished between true love and "empty sentimentalism," however. He taught — and showed — that love is "the active outpouring of one's whole being into the being of another." Jesus' sacrifice on the cross is the ultimate "active outpouring" of love, and we can choose to follow his example daily. "Because of Calvary I'm free to choose," writes Max Lucado in When God Whispers Your Name. "No occasion justifies hatred; no injustice warrants bitterness. I choose love. Today I will love God and what God loves."



What is the spiritual meaning of a cardinal? A **cardinal** symbolizes the fire of life that burns within our souls, even in the darkest and coldest times. It reminds us we need to stay strong and positive throughout difficult periods in our life, just as this red bird endures the cold winter days.
