

FROM THE PASTOR: What Is the Church? Part II...

One of my favorite prayers invites people to focus on their body, appreciating each part or system and offering thanks for it. This prayer reminds us that our physical bodies are an amazing gift from God. Through our bodies, we engage the world in work, play, relationships, service, and rest. Our bodies are also our mechanism for growth — we learn and grow as we engage the world, our senses and experiences providing new information daily. Our bodies provide a home for our souls as we journey toward God in this life. And, amazingly, our bodies are each unique. We have different strengths and challenges. We grow and learn in a variety of ways. Our different skills and abilities contribute to our communities. We are each uniquely created for life on earth.

The human body – specifically the body of Christ – offers a metaphor to help us better understand the church. The body of Christ, the church, is Jesus' way of engaging the world. As the church, we carry Jesus into our communities to accomplish life-giving activities and to connect with people in need of hope and healing. And like the human body, the church, the body of Christ, cannot survive without many unique, different parts.

In 1 Corinthians 12, Paul emphasizes that we are each a vital part of the body of Christ. "You can easily enough see how this kind of thing works by looking no further than your own body. Your body has many parts – limbs, organs, cells – but no matter how many parts you can name, you're still one body. It's exactly the same with Christ...Each person is given something to do that shows who God is: Everyone gets in on it, everyone benefits.

Even as Paul celebrates the different gifts that we each bring to the church's mission, he also addresses the tension that our differences create. People may be tempted to see their gifts, their beliefs, or their spiritual traditions as the most important. Paul reminds the church to think bigger than individuals – embrace our differences and the gifts we each bring, but not just for our own sake. As we enter into the body of Christ, instead of asking how the church can serve us, ask how we, the church, can serve Jesus.

As for how the church serves Jesus, Paul hints that he will address this in the next section of 1 Corinthians: "I will show you a still more excellent way." To be continued...

It's apple pie season! Here is an easy recipe for Swedish Apple Pie

5-6 apples (peeled and sliced)

- 2 Tablespoons brown sugar
- 1 Tablespoon cinnamon
- 1 ½ stick butter or margarine
- 1 cup flour
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 egg

½ cup walnuts (chopped) pinch of salt

Place apples in pie pan. Sprinkle with the brown sugar and cinnamon. In a small saucepan melt butter. Remove from the heat and add flour, sugar, egg, walnuts and salt. Mix well and pour over sliced apples. Bake at 350 for 40-45 min.

Simplified Board Highlights

The Church Board members began their monthly meeting with a telephone meeting requested by Karen Munson, our District Superintendent to discuss the steps of a 213 Study. Karen recommended we use this study as an assessment tool to help Green Street members determine the potential pathways for the future of our church. Information is being gathered from the church's files, conversations with leaders and members, and Mission Insite. This is an extensive study of the past, present and potential ministry of a church.

The findings will be published and shared with the congregation with recommendations as to how best fulfill the church's call to ministry and to optimize stewardship of the ministry resources available.

Conversations will be held and will be open to all people of the church on: **September 29, October 13 and November 10 following worship.**

Finance: Connie and Sue have created a new cash flow chart and updated figures for further review by Rev. Dr. Pat McHugh who is chair of the Equitable Compensation Fund. The ECF committee granted Green Street \$7500 in additional funds for July, August and Sept and had asked for this updated information so they could they could consider any additional monies for the remainder of the year. In reviewing, they project we may be short as much as \$30,000 (Including mission shares) by year's end.

Sharing God's Abundance

For the past four years it has been my privilege and pleasure on Monday mornings to sit with Lynn Kennard, and sometimes others, on the sidewalk in front of the church with tables of garden produce. Signs announce that the vegetables are free. It has taken a while for people to fully understand that they are given with no strings attached, but we've felt that acceptance come over time.

I have taken the liberty of speaking to people on porches, standing in driveways, walking or biking past us, or walking to their cars in the parking lot up above us, inviting them to come see what we have and to help themselves. Isaiah 55:1, "Come, all you who are thirsty, come to the waters; and you who have no money, come, buy and eat!

Those who come are often looking for the human touch – not just free food. We've heard many brief stories of ill or aging relatives, of gardens that have a special place in people's memories, and sometimes how what someone has received from us has helped them get through the week just past.

We start each Monday morning with a prayer: "God, we have veggies. Please send us people." During the inevitable lulls, it changes to: "God, we *still* have veggies. Please send more people." And every week, it happens. Most of what we've had to offer has come from the gardens of Johnnie Beane and Tricia Webb; but there have been others each year as well. To those not specifically named who have brought things, please know that you are all appreciated.

This ministry is the brain child of Shasta Beane. Lynn has been part of it since the beginning. They are no longer able to be part of the crew on Mondays. There will need to be changes if the Garden Giveaway is to happen next year. It has become greatly appreciated in the neighborhood. We ask your prayers that new leadership will emerge. And if God nudges you to be part of it, know that I'm willing to help, but am not able to do it alone.
