- Bible Study Randolph members are eager to participate in the great Bible study ministries offered by Green Street.

Building Entry Rules

The Church is not a building; it is a community of faith. Our building is closed, but our Church is always open! Having a building key *doesn't* mean you're allowed inside.

Only the following people may enter our building: the Pastor, Admin. Assistant, and other paid staff; Church Treasurers, Financial Secretaries, and Counters; contractors and other maintenance staff; and participants in approved* service & worship activities.

Everyone who enters MUST, without exception: wear a face covering that covers both the nose and the mouth the whole time they are in the building: clean their hands with soap (scrubbing for 20 seconds before rinsing) or with the sanitizer provided: Sign in on the clip board by the elevator; stay 6 feet away from the person nearest them; and clean and sanitize the areas and surfaces used according to the criteria set by the Gathering Task Force.

Anyone who suspects, or confirms, they have symptoms of Coronavirus (fever greater than 100.4°, dry cough, new loss of taste or smell), must stop entering the building and immediately notify the Office to slow further spread.

These sacrifices are how we, as the Body of Christ, take care of one another.

Simplified Board Highlights

September 2020

As Board Chair, Kathleen offered board members a reflection from Esther 4:14. She reminded us that we had all answered a call to serve on the board, and that perhaps, like Esther, it was for this time and place that each of us was chosen.

Financial reports were presented by the Current Expense Treasurer, Sue Pattershall, the Trustees Treasurer, Tammy Roberts, and the Missions Treasurer, Ardyce Robbin. The current expense income is slightly behind budget, but not of great concern. Invested funds have recovered nearly to their values at the beginning of the year despite a significant market downturn in the second quarter. Green Street has substantial amounts in the Bridge Family Memorial Fund and the Hal Roberts Fund available for use according to the the fund restrictions. The Missions accounts have been less active than normal due to scaled-back activities this year. Conference Mission Shares are being paid through the Current Expense budget.

The Board heard updates from Nominations, the Gathering Task Force, and Cooperative Parish Coordinating Team, much of which is being communicated to individuals and the congregation as the work proceeds. Nominations has several positions to fill for 2021 that they hope to bring to our annual Church Conference on December 5. The Administration Ministry Team circulated a list of Ministry Teams, along with a set of forms to be used in helping them keep track of Ministry Teams and their activities.

Two major initiatives were approved that came from the work of the Sustainable Budget Task Force. The first was the creation of a Subscription Box Ministry Team. A subscription box is something that is sent out to subscribers on a regular basis, generally once a month, for a fee. The proposal is that once the pricing is worked out this would be a fund-raiser for the church. The subscription boxes would be based on Christian contemplative practices, and might include various educational and instructional items to reach people not connected with a church community. In this way it would be a ministry as well as a fund-raiser. The board approved initial formation of the Ministry Team, with details to come.

The second major initiative was the creation of an Upper Room Task Force. Through the years there have been several ideas and attempts to utilize the vacant space on the second floor of the Wesley Center. The Sustainable Budget Task Force identified this space as a significant asset that we need to put to use to bring in revenue. As envisioned, the task force would make a concerted effort over the next several months to a year to work with city and church District leaders to expand the range of acceptable uses for the building, explore community partnerships with suitable tenants, hiring realtors or consultants if advisable, recommend to the Board improvements or modifications to the existing building that might be required, and do related research and outreach. The Board set aside \$50,000 from the Bragg bequest that could be used, if needed, to hire consultants and contractors, and to make recommended improvements to secure any tenant for the Upper Room in the Wesley Center. The Board would have to approve any expenditures. The congregation will be invited to participate in both of these major initiatives.



As we wait for decisions from General Conference regarding full inclusion of LGBTQ+ persons in the life of the church, we naturally turn to the Bible to discern God's Word. Yet some of the words in the Bible contribute to our dilemma about welcoming LGBTQ+ persons into the church. We are called to sort through those specific—and perhaps troubling—biblical references prayerfully, as we seek to discern God's living, healing, saving Word. We invite you to study the issues that are embedded in this current church dilemma. We study them, not as an academic exercise, but as a process of Christian dialogue and spiritual discernment that literally can save lives. We invite you to know, hear, and understand LGBTQ+ individuals and their families. As we study, may we continually be reminded that people who live and work and worship among us are personally affected by this current church dilemma and by our responses to God's promise. Come and explore how we, as individuals and as communities of Christians, might discern God's promise and claim it. Welcome to the journey!

This Bible study will help us:

- Identify assumptions about biblical authority and how we engage in biblical interpretation
- Examine alternate understandings of biblical references that people sometimes apply negatively to LGBTQ+ persons
- Explore the place of those biblical references within a comprehensive understanding of the Bible's liberating message of justice, love and freedom in Christ
- Claim the promise of being God's heirs apparent by identifying how we might live as welcoming, reconciling disciples of Christ.

Finally, this Bible study presents several points of view. Clearly Christians are not all of one mind about homosexuality and the church. Claiming the Promise has a point of view that we think offers us glimpses of God's Word in the midst of our troubling dilemma. We hope only that you will prayerfully participate and consider its point of view, whether it differs from yours or not.

Just Two Ingredient Banana Pancakes!

- 1 ripe banana
- 2 eggs

A pinch baking powder and a dash of vanilla (optional)

Mash the banana,, add eggs, baking powder, vanilla and beat well. Heat griddle and spay with non-stick cooking spray or lightly oil. Pour a small amount of the batter onto the griddle Cook 1 minute (until lightly brown) and gently turn.

Tasty Tidbits from the Welcome Table Ministry Team Submitted by Tammy Roberts

As fall is fast approaching and the temperatures begin to drop, I begin to think of comfort foods. This soup is one of my favorites and is very comforting on a cold day. Although I love to top it with seared mushrooms, it is also yummy topped with pumpkin seeds.

Pureed Butternut Squash Soup with Seared Mushrooms and Herbs

2 tablespoons olive oil

1 butternut squash, peeled, seeded and cut into 1-inch cubes

1 teaspoon dried thyme

3 ½ to 4 ½ teaspoons salt

½ cup nondairy Rice milk (See below to make your own)

8 ounces cremini mushrooms, stemmed and sliced

2 to 3 tablespoons chopped fresh parsley (OR 2 to 3 teaspoons dried parsley)

In a large pot, heat 1 tablespoon of the olive oil over medium heat. Add the squash, thyme and 1 ½ teaspoons of the salt, and sauté for about 10 minutes, until browned and fragrant. Add 2 ½ cups of water and bring to a boil. Cover and simmer for 10 to 12 minutes, until tender. Stir in the nondairy milk.

Transfer the squash with its liquid to a blender and puree for about 2 minutes, until smooth. (I have also used a Vitamix or an immersion blender)
In a large sauté pan, heat the remaining 1 tablespoon of olive oil over high heat. Once the oil is simmering, add the mushrooms in an even layer. Cook without stirring for about 4 minutes, until golden brown. Stir and cook for another 3 to 5 minutes. Sprinkle with the remaining 2 to 3 teaspoons of salt. Transfer to a plate lined with paper towel to soak up the excess oil.


Serve the soup topped with the seared mushrooms and sprinkled with parsley. Makes 3 servings.

Homemade Rice Milk

I prefer to make my own rice milk because it saves A LOT of money and is super easy. I usually make more than what is needed for the soup because it's just easier. No matter how much milk you want to make, use a 4:1 ratio of water to rice.

Combine ¼ cup of cooked rice (white or brown) with 1 cup of water in a blender. Blend until smooth, approximately 1 minute. You may need to blend again to achieve a very smooth consistency. The milk can be stored in the refrigerator. Be sure to shake before using.

Stewardship in Exile


