Pastor's Message:

There is a wonderful story in Hebrew Scripture, the earliest recorded parable actually, told by a man named Jotham.

The trees once went out to anoint a king over themselves. So they said to the olive tree, "Reign over us."

*The* olive tree answered them, "Shall I stop producing my rich oil by which gods and mortals are honoured, and go to sway over the trees?"

Then the trees said to the fig tree, "You come and reign over us." But the fig tree answered them, "Shall I stop producing my sweetness and my delicious fruit,

and go to sway over the trees?" Then the trees said to the vine," You come and reign over us." But the vine said to them, "Shall I stop producing my wine that cheers gods and mortals, and go to sway over the trees?" So all the trees said to the bramble, "You come and reign over us." And the bramble said to the trees, "If in good faith you are anointing me king over you, then come and take refuge in my shade; but if not, let fire come out of the bramble and devour the cedars of Lebanon."-Judges 9:8-15

The "trees" are determined to find someone to be responsible for them. What I love about this story is the clarity with which each plant they approach answers their plea (or demand). The olive, fig, and grapevine are differentiated from the genus. They have specificity. Each is aware of, and committed to, their gift and their purpose for the good of creation. Only the bramble is willing to go out on a limb (!) with a conditional yes.

In Christ's church we seek to recognize gifts God has given each of us, inviting one another to share spiritual gifts for the community's wellbeing. It's been my experience that we share those gifts in two ways. Sometimes our responsibility for, or participation in, a form of ministry is sacrificial. There is a need that no one else is filling and so we "mind the gap." Other times our gifts find a place that brings us joy. Both ways can bring satisfaction and deepened discipleship if we are doing it for love of God and God's people. But the first is holding a place until the person meant to fill it recognizes that call.

In Jotham's situation, the teller of this tale, he is warning the people to pay attention to God's intention rather than their own inclination. May we be a community of God seekers who are able to help each other listen to God's call for each of us in such a time as this.

# **Simplified Board Highlights**

#### An excerpt of the \*unapproved minutes from the Simplified Board Meeting on September 13th at 6pm

#### **Green Street United Methodist Church**

Members in attendance via Zoom: Sue Pattershall, Kathleen Dunford, Sharon Beaver, Gary Alexander, Tammy Roberts, Lilla Atwater, Pastor Karen Munson, and Lori Webber Visitor: Sally Joy from the Worship Committee

The meeting began at 6:12pm with Sue providing a devotion. Minutes from the August 9, 2022 board meeting were amended to read "hot water baseboards".

Gary made a motion to accept the minutes as amended and seconded by Kathleen. The motion passed.

#### **Initial business**

Sally Joy brought before the Board the future of the Jesse Lee Cluster, whether to revive it or to disband it. Karen made a motion to authorize Sally and a person to be named later to act on behalf of Green Street at a meeting to be held in October. If disbanding, those representatives will help decide what to do with \$2000 in left over funds. The motion was seconded by Gary. **The motion passed.** 

#### Pastor's update/report

The board meeting schedule for the rest of the year will be to focus on the path forward, task force updates, nominations, and safe sanctuaries policy. October 13<sup>th</sup> is the annual Church conference (Thursday) 7-8:30pm with the Herb Taylor report to be presented. Karen would like to see regular "mission moments" in church from different people of the Board as part of communication to members. The Board will have a few tasks before them as Green Street emerges from COVID and starts on the revitalization pathway. The first task will be the development of 2 teams: a forecasting team and a review/listening team. Each team will have responsibilities and work in conjunction with one another.

TASK 2: Property Stewardship Pathway – what is to be done with the property owned by Green Street? TASK 3: Project Ministry Vision – What is the future of ministry at Green Street?

**The Gathering Task force** report was in the Board packet. They do not see themselves as permission givers but as consultants to provide information regarding worship/communion and gathering in regards to COVID protocols.

The Welcoming Task Force worked on a statement, which was passed by the Board regarding members and visitors who deem themselves part of the LGBTQ+ community. This will be brought before the congregation for a vote at Church Conference next month. A personal letter with Karen's stance and another letter from Karen, the lay leader and Board chair will go out to the congregation by the end of the week

Discussion took place regarding the **Safe Sanctuaries policy**. There was a recommendation that Green Street adopt the New England Conference UMC sample policy and use of technology (emerging areas), with the idea the policy can always be amended at a later date. This may be addressed in a half hour call before Church Conference. There was a motion in the agenda to present the safe sanctuaries policy with the addition of the inclusion of LGBTQ youth at the church conference. **Finance** - The Board had previously approved up to \$3000 for tree trimming, but had not designated which funds were to be used. Tammy made a motion, seconded by Kathleen to pay Pinnacle Tree Trimming from the Building fund. **The motion passed.** 

**Other items discussed**: rental income from parsonage – \$2000/month going into budget; \$1000 bill for door, one for heat, one for a new toilet and other little items. Use funds for capital expenses as it does have its own line in the budget

Sue made the following motion: That the Leadership Board recommend integration of the Missions account into the Operations bookkeeping effective January 1, 2023. It was seconded by Gary. **The motion passed.** 

A motion was put forth by Sue that the Leadership Board authorize Rev. Karen Munson to organize a policy development task force for the use of Hal Roberts funds in service of senior transportation. Gary seconded the motion. **The motion passed.** 

There will be no Oct 11 board meeting so that the Board can concentrate on the "Path Forward" tasks. Pastor Karen closed the meeting with prayer.
