One for each day of September.






Fuel Day Challenge

FROM THE PASTOR: Standing on Holy Ground

Many of us have favorite memories of our church sanctuary. Perhaps it's the quiet candlelight on Christmas Eve; Ash Wednesday's contemplative start to Lent; gathering for a baptism, wedding or funeral; joining voices in a hymn or listening to the choir; or sitting silently with head bowed in prayer. Our church sanctuary is a special place. It is consecrated space, our holy ground.

The Exodus story helps shape my understanding of being the church during a pandemic. The Exodus story begins on holy ground. In Exodus 3, God appears to Moses in a burning bush, both calling Moses into relationship with God and sending him forth to do God's work. The Exodus story reminds me that holy ground is where ever God declares it to be. The consecrated space of Moses' is meeting with God was not a building, palace or temple. It was neither in Egypt, where God's people currently lived, nor in the Promised Land, which lay ahead. Holy ground was the wilderness, a place where Moses would live for 40 years.

For Christians today, our holy ground is not only the sanctuary where we have worshiped and hope to do so again. It is also in the wilderness, the ordinary and between places where we currently find ourselves. A place is holy ground not because of our beliefs, but because God declares it to be so. Holy ground is every place in the world that God meets us, calls us, and sends us.

While Moses stands in awe of God at the burning bush, holy ground is not just a place for worship. Holy ground is a place where God sends us into the world, where we are shepherded forth to be God's hands and feet and voice.

How does the Exodus story of holy ground help to reframe our story as a church in the wilderness? Even as we are separated from our sanctuary, we are still on holy ground. We are called to worship God wherever God finds us, in the wilderness as well as in the building. Church is both worshiping God and being sent by God. And our sanctuary, as holy ground, is the beginning. not the end, of our journey.

Simplified Board Highlights

August 2020

Kathleen Dunford, Board Chair, opened our meeting with a reflection about the Israelites who had to learn new ways of being together and supporting each other while in Exile, as we have been doing during our time away from the building. She encouraged us to be sustained by Psalm **46**:10, "Be still, and know that I am God!"

We had several informational updates. First, from the interim Current Expense Treasurer, Sue Pattershall, that our 2020 budget is on track, with the first half of the year completed at about \$2,000 under budget, and significant income from outside sources (Perry Rich grant and Equitable Compensation grant) received as expected in July. Paperwork for the PPP loan forgiveness process is not quite ready yet from the bank. We heard updates from the SPRC, who are reviewing and updating all the job descriptions for paid staff; from the Gathering Task Force, who have been meeting weekly to work on many issues related to the well-being of people in community (see article in this newsletter); and from the Cooperative Parish Coordinating Committee, who have been looking at the fall schedule of events and planning pastor Kristin's time to develop shared and cooperative relationships between the two congregations.

The Board approved spending up to \$1500 from the Bridge Family Memorial Fund to support participation of Green Street members in the Leadership Institute 2020, to be held online Sept. 24-25, hosted by Rev. Adam Hamilton and the Church of the Resurrection. This is an exciting opportunity for us. We hope many people from Green Street will attend for as much as they can. Attendees will be invited to report back on their experience.

We had a general discussion about the life cycle of ministry teams, and the way ministry teams begin, are organized, led, and let go. Some specific examples of ongoing needs were raised. One possibility would be to have two types of ministry teams: one type that rises and falls from within the congregation based on passions and interests, and another type that is created by the Board to serve a specific purpose and can only be dissolved by the Board. We agreed to return to the discussion when we have concrete examples. In some ways this will be easier when we are gathered in the building. Some of the difficulty in finding volunteers and maintaining ministry teams might be the need for a shared vision for the church.

To round out the meeting, Kathleen asked Board members what we would like to see or where we would like to be in six months. There was quite a range of responses from things we miss by not being together (singing, hugs, seeing everyone again), to carrying forward some things we have learned (Zoom worship, being creative, more remote activities, developing online presence), to pursuing new relationships (networking with the community, finding different ways to connect, minister, and worship). The need to consider our finances was raised as a necessary part of the conversation. Next month we will look at the recommendations of the 213 study that included specific avenues for change, including asset-based community development, utilizing the building to bring in revenue, and developing partnerships in the community.

The Gathering Task Force honors the importance of gathering for the emotional, spiritual and physical well-being of the congregation, while also seeking best ways to ensure the safety and well-being of our gatherings. The criteria below invite us into Christian community beyond just Sunday morning worship. These criteria invite us to care for the physical, emotional and spiritual well-being of the whole congregation and our community. We invite you to experience these criteria not as rules, but as a covenant of love and respect for one another.

We celebrate that Green Street continues to be God's church outside the walls of the building – through worship services on Zoom and Facebook, worship at home packets, Care Team calls, and Zoom gatherings including study groups, games nights, yoga classes, video series, VBS, poetry nights, regular church meetings, prayer gatherings, choir rehearsal, and one-on-one conversations with Pastor Kristin. Although minimal, in person gatherings have included Angel Food takeout meals on the side yard, outdoor cleanup days, and a drive-by birthday celebration for Gladys Schacht.

Both the State of Maine CDC and the New England UMC Annual Conference offer a range of recommendations and guidance for in-person gatherings. The Gathering Task Force has familiarized themselves with these general recommendations, and taken into consideration the unique needs of our members, community and building. As part of this, we are looking at a limited way to use the meeting space at the church. For the time being, worship will continue to meet on Zoom. While other churches have made other choices on how to gather, based on recommendations and the needs of our own congregation and community, we have decided to continue worship online for the time being.

Our discernment process includes looking at how both being in the building and being out of the building contribute to our physical and emotional well-being. Our lists are below and we would love to hear from you what you would add.

September Sermon Series

Our September worship series uses four scriptures from the Book of Exodus to explore our current circumstances and experiences of the world. Adapted from a study by the General Board of Discipleship, this series journeys with the Israelites as God leads them into a new life.

A tweet is floating around that simply says, "I miss precedent times." How often do you hear that these are unprecedented times? Of course, like all broad statements of that kind, this is both true and untrue. It is true that most of us haven't lived with a pandemic. The natural disasters and the political and racial unrest all roll together to create a miasma of despair unlike anything we've ever experienced. Except we have. Maybe not exactly this, but we know the experience. We've been here before. We call it wilderness. It is a regular occurrence in the lives of followers of Jesus. One might say it is standard operating procedure. But familiarity doesn't mean ease. Wandering through the wilderness is a difficult journey at the best of times. Other times, it can seem impossible. Our task in this series is to help us find our way through the wilderness of this time by allowing the first of God-wanderers in the book of Exodus to speak to us. The stories of the people of God, along with the hymns of the faith in the Psalms, become our guides through the wilderness today.

Tasty Tidbits from the Welcome Table Ministry Team Submitted by Valerie Gallagher

With September already here, I suspect some of you may have already enjoyed fresh corn and tomatoes from your gardens. Salsa with these fresh ingredients is the best! Below is a recipe that has been popular at our church activities as well as get-togethers with friends (pre-Covid19, of course!). The recipe uses canned tomatoes and frozen corn, however one can easily substitute fresh tomatoes and garden fresh corn cooked and chilled. Add some tortilla chips of your choice!

Black Bean and Corn Salsa

1 can (14.5 oz) Del Monte Petite Diced Tomatoes, no salt added variety, slightly drained

3/4 cup Bush's Black Beans, rinsed

3/4 cup Birds's Eye frozen corn, cooked, drained and cooled

3 tsp chopped cilantro

3/4 tsp minced jarred garlic

3/4 tsp ground cumin

Juice of 1 lime

3 very small pinches of salt

Mix all together. Makes about 3 cups. Serve with any type of chip that suits your fancy!

Fellow Green Streeters:

At our August meeting, we discussed our staff and their job descriptions. The *Guidelines* from the denomination put it quite nicely: staff are hired to do ministry *with* (rather than *for*) the congregation. But what is the job description for the *congregation*? It might be this:

Mission: To make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world.

Core roles:

- Give thanks for all that God has already given us.
- Participate faithfully in the ministries of the Church by our prayers, our presence, our gifts, our service, and our witness, that in everything God may be glorified through Jesus Christ.

Primary tasks:

- Reach out and receive with joy all who will respond.
- Encourage people in their relationship with God and invite them to commit to God's love in Jesus Christ
- Provide opportunities for people to seek strengthening and growth in spiritual formation.
- Support people to live lovingly and justly in the power of the Holy Spirit as faithful disciples.

It is in the primary tasks that we see our job as *leading* others into the church—the body of Christ. Jesus said "'The rulers of the Gentiles lord it over them, and their great ones are tyrants over them. It will not be so among you; but whoever wishes to be great among you must be your servant, and whoever wishes to be first among you must be your slave; just as the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life a ransom for many."

As we wait for decisions from General Conference regarding full inclusion of LGBTQ+ persons in the life of the church, we naturally turn to the Bible to discern God's Word. Yet some of the words in the Bible contribute to our dilemma about welcoming LGBTQ+ persons into the church. We are called to sort through those specific—and perhaps troubling—biblical references prayerfully, as we seek to discern God's living, healing, saving Word. We invite you to study the issues that are embedded in this current church dilemma. We study them, not as an academic exercise, but as a process of Christian dialogue and spiritual discernment that literally can save lives. We invite you to know, hear, and understand LGBTQ+ individuals and their families. As we study, may we continually be reminded that people who live and work and worship among us are personally affected by this current church dilemma and by our responses to God's promise. Come and explore how we, as individuals and as communities of Christians, might discern God's promise and claim it. Welcome to the journey!

This Bible study will help us:

- Identify assumptions about biblical authority and how we engage in biblical interpretation
- Examine alternate understandings of biblical references that people sometimes apply negatively to LGBTQ+ persons
- Explore the place of those biblical references within a comprehensive understanding of the Bible's liberating message of justice, love and freedom in Christ
- Claim the promise of being God's heirs apparent by identifying how we might live as welcoming, reconciling disciples of Christ.

Finally, this Bible study presents several points of view. Clearly Christians are not all of one mind about homosexuality and the church. Claiming the Promise has a point of view that we think offers us glimpses of God's Word in the midst of our troubling dilemma. We hope only that you will prayerfully participate and consider its point of view, whether it differs from yours or not.
