went to listen to the story of a missioner's wife. Less than six months later, they had raised enough money to send, not just one, but two professionals, a doctor and an educator, to India as missionaries. **This is a faith story!**

Standing Rules, policies, and by-laws and even a name for this emerging organization were not their priorities that night. They were more interested in **taking action** on behalf of marginalized women and children across the ocean.



Recently I saw this picture on a Facebook post. Of course, the quote, from the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., caught my attention right away as the theme for both the Spiritual Enrichment Retreat and the Conference Annual Celebration this year is "Moving Forward in Faith." The quote also made me think of these foremothers who took the leap of faith and decided they will work to remediate the systemic societal injustice toward other women even when they did not know how they will get the financial resources or how

Social Action Opportunity

"I thought that was illegal!" "In which states is it legal?" "Is it legal in Florida?"

These were a few of the responses heard at Mission u to our Social Action opportunity to support Protecting our Students in Schools Act (POSSA) of 2021.

The topic is corporal punishment in public schools. The response to the topic was more energized than for any other social action opportunity at our Florida Conference Mission u 2022.

Almost 70,000 students were subject to corporal punishment in the school year 2017, according to the most recent reliable statistics available. However, some suggest that this is an undercount. Fact is, Corporal punishment is still legal in 19 states, of which, unfortunately, Florida is one.

No matter how you feel about corporal punishment such as spanking, paddling, beating, and stress positioning, consider it in light of racial justice and the current United Women in Faith campaign Ending the School to Prison Pipeline, which we all know ends in mass incarceration with the majority of the population being BIPOC (Black, Indian, People of Color). Data shows that Black students are far more likely to be subjected to corporal punishment than white (and to some degree Native students). Specifically, Black students are 15.1% of enrollment, but 37.3% of students subjected to corporal punishment.

Join with me in supporting this legislation, Protecting our Students in Schools Act of 2021. This is a bill which would cost the government nothing to enact but would make a significant difference in the lives of children and youth, and in correcting racial disparity, and in ending the School to Prison Pipeline. The Southeastern Jurisdiction Team from last quadrennium was honored with the Leadership Award at the first-ever Legacy Banquet at Assembly. As you know, the gathering for SEJ had to be canceled in 2020 due to COVID. Under the leadership of Betty Helms, immediate past President, the Team decided that any budgeted monies left after all expenses were paid would be given to the Legacy Fund of United Women in Faith (United Methodist Women at that time). When all the numbers were in, \$90,000 was given to the Legacy Fund.

Because of the generosity of these women, National and International Mission Institutions will be able to continue their valuable work on into the future.

Sue Owens, President of SEJ this quadrennium, could not promise a repeat performance as the

The 2022 Haitian Convocation was another big success with 209 people, including 47 youth and children, gathered for a day of worship, fellowship and learning. We were honored to have two district superintendents among the participants: the Rev. Dr. Cynthia D. Weems from the South East District, and the Rev. Dionne Chandler Hammond from the Atlantic Central District. This year nine Haitian churches attended the event. We hope and pray next year, God willing, all the Haitian churches in the conference will participate.

Our Guest speaker, Jeannie Jacques, developed exceptionally well our theme "Knitted Together in God's Love". She reminded us to remain united and to refrain from judging others. The Florida Conference United Women in Faith President, Deaconess Dr. Judith Pierre-Okerson, provided information about the new name of the organization, explained this is the same organization with the same aim to be in mission on behalf of women children and youth. She encouraged participants to register for the Turn It Up Assembly in Orlando.



She also shared Bishop Carter's letter in response to the misguided information those who are leaving the church are spreading about The United Methodist Church. Bishop Carter appealed to the churches in Florida to

Celebrating the Life of Dr. Mary McLeod Bethune!

During our Mission u event on July 11, we celebrated Mary McLeod Bethune day as a foremother Methodist Woman! On that day a statue of Mary McLeod Bethune was unveiled in statuary hall at the U.S. Capitol in Washington, D.C. This is the first black woman to be in Statuary Hall and to our continuing joy she represents Florida. McLeod Bethune's statue depicts the Black educator, civil rights activist and suffragette in an academic cap and gown.

"Today we are rewriting history. We want to share with our future generations, with a symbol of hope and inspiration," said Rep. Frederica Wilson.

The statue was created by Fort Lauderdale artist Nilda Comas who won a national competition. Her artistic process is to research her subject's personality and history "so I learned that she is quite an interesting person, coming from a humble background," noting that Bethune's

parents were slaves. "She pretty much taught herself to read

and write after a little white girl told her Blacks couldn't do that. She was a very good friend of Eleanor Roosevelt.

When Blacks were denied education, she built a school; denied medical care, she built a hospital. When the world was grappling with authoritarianism, she helped establish the foundational commitment to human rights through the United Nations."

At the foot of her statue is McLeod Bethune's famous quote:

"Invest in the human soul. Who knows, it may be a diamond in the rough."
