As a member of Jarvis Memorial United Methodist Church, he served on the Administrative Board and was secretary to the Board of Trust ees. He is a former member of the Greenville Elks Lodge, the Greenville Rotary Club, served as a member of the Board of the Pitt County Mental Health Chairman of the Pitt County United Way. He was appointed to the Pitt County Board of Elections in 1977, serving as chairman from 1977 through 1985. Governor Jim Hunt ap-pointed him to the North Carolina Historical Commission in 1982, and he was a member for five years. An avid golfer for 50 years, he enjoyed the game at

Reid as Superior Court Judge, On December 16, 1994, he took the oath of office as Resident Supe rior Court Judge of the 3A Judicial District which compris Pitt County In his 18 years of service, he presided over both the criminal and civil courts as far east as Dare County to Watauga and Caldwell Counties in the west. As a member of the Conference of North Carolina Superior Court Judges, he at-tended meetings held each year where he developed close friendships with the judges across the state. He retired in December 2012 After frue days of retirement, he was apnted by Governor Beverley Perdue as an Emergency Superior Court Judge and sworn by Superior Court Judge Mar-vin Blount III. Judge Everett was presented with the Order of the Long Leaf Pine, a certificate presented to outstanding North Carolinians who have a proven record of service to the state. During his years of service, the Pitt County Court house symbolized his passion for the law, and his wish always was to preserve the memories

of the legal community.
