Not Before My Parents (NBMP) was established in 2012 by Raydell Lacey, 18 years after the brutal murder of her 21 year old daughter, Elonda D. Lacey also known as Ms. Buckey. In January 2016 Raydell's grandson, Erick L. Lacey Jr., aka E.J., was shot and killed.

NBMP offers support to parents and youth who have suffered a traumatic loss. **NBMP** offer coping skills. If needed parents, families and/or youth may be referred for additional resources.


Why We Do What We Do
