
The Lemong'o Project is dedicated to providing support to the Maasai Village of Lemong'o in rural Kenya in the areas of health, nutrition, education and employment. We are committed to helping the beautiful people of Lemong'o not only thrive, but also prosper.

BUILDING SUSTAINABILITY THROUGH EMPLOYMENT

The Maasai women (Mamas) of Lemong'o, located in the remote corner of S.E Kenya, live much as their ancestors did - raising children, gathering firewood for heat and cooking and managing their households. Other than livestock, their only source of income is from the creation of intricate bead-work, a craft many generations-old. The Lemong'o Project partners with the Mamas by hosting markets where their jewelry and baskets are purchased at a fair trade price. Their work is then sold throughout the U.S. with ALL proceeds going back to Lemong'o to support Education, Health, Nutrition and Employment. Your purchase makes a BIG difference in the lives of people who have very little.


MAMA NANU

NEWS FROM LEMONGO

Carolyn and Emily, The Lemong'o Project President and Vice-President visited Lemong'o this summer. They were thrilled to reunite with their Maasai family and spend time catching up on village events of the past year. Their visit was active, fulfilling and encouraging. Two medical clinics were held, serving a total of 470 children and adults. Medication was given to those who needed it, lab tests were provided and over 25 medical referrals were made. Because of YOUR support, Carolyn and Emily successfully delivered over 40 pounds of donated medical supplies! A productive meeting was held with the village school principal, PTA chairman and Manyatta Chairman to review best practices and yearly progress. We're pleased and proud to share that Belgrove Primary continues to make progress in their yearly assessment scores. Because of YOUR generosity, 25 "Days for Girls" hygiene kits (a global movement that prepares and distributes sustainable menstrual health solutions to girls who would otherwise miss school during their monthly periods) were distributed. Fifty pounds of school supplies were also delivered. Carolyn and Emily met with the three Project-sponsored teachers and held a luncheon for all Belgrove Primary staff. The Mamas of Lemong'o, as always, were energetic and eager to make and sell their beadwork at a market convened by Carolyn and Emily. This year a record number of women, over 80, participated in the market! Bead workshops were held in March and April led by two talented, experienced and creative women from the community. These workshops proved very successful and resulted in an expanded variety of new merchandise. Carolyn and Emily purchased items to sell in Anchorage and Portland with 100 percent of the proceeds going back to The Project. Twenty-five pounds of seed beads were generously donated and delivered to the Mamas for their use in future projects. Several sales of the beadwork have already been held in the U.S. resulting in revenue that will be of great benefit to The Project. Such encouraging sales give hope that there will be a continuing market for the beadwork in in the U.S. This could translate into an empowering, continuing source of income for the women of the village as well as The Lemongo Project overall.
