The Lemong'o Project is dedicated to providing support to the Maasai Village of Lemong'o in rural Kenya in the areas of: health, nutrition, education, and employment. We are committed to helping the beautiful people of Lemong'o not only thrive, but also prosper.

Medical Assistance in July 2017:

Medical clinic #1: 170 people (91 children, 79 adults) Cost: \$950 Medical clinic #2: 137 people (63 children, 74 adults) Cost: \$600 Hospital Assistance: 25 people (adults & children) Cost: \$1000

TOTALS: 332 people served

Many more needed financial support for follow-up treatment, but the committee had to prioritize who had the greatest medical need.

This is Catherine James Masengo. She had an eye injury nearly twenty years ago that through the years slowly worsened. Her family is poor and unable to pay for medical care, so the injury had been left untreated. When Catherine came to a The Lemong'o Project medical clinic a few years ago, she was unable to close her eye which left her in constant, excruciating pain. After examination our doctor recommended a referral to an eye specialist. After several visits she eventually had surgery, all which was paid for by The Project. The surgery was a huge success and now Catherine is healthy, pain free, able to work, and can enjoy time with her family. 
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VOLUNTEER CORNER:
