HARLEM RENAISSANCE (1918-1937)

- THE MOST INFLUENTIAL PERIOD IN AFRICAN AMERICAN LITERARY HISTORY
- CLOSE RELATIONSHIP TO CIVIL RIGHTS (USHER IN)
- FLOURISHED IN THE 1920'S AND HAD A "HOME" IN HARLEM

A theme is the central idea in a work of literature. It's the message the author is trying to convey to the reader about LIFE. It is NOT a summary. An easy way to remember the definition of theme is

To find the theme, you need to know...

Protagonist- the main characterAntagonist- the person, people or thing that causes problems for the protagonist.Conflict- the main problem in the storyResolution-Outcome of the conflict- how does the story resolve?

Theme is **NOT** one word.... Theme is the subject plus what the author wants to tell you about the subject. For instance, a theme cannot be "revenge" A theme has to be something like "revenge never wins." A theme is universal.
