The Pastor's Pen



I once got an email with the title *Buzzards*, *Bats*, *and Bumblebees*. It said:

"If you put a buzzard in a pen that is 6 feet by 8 feet and is entirely open at the top, the bird, in spite of its ability to fly, will be an absolute prisoner. The reason is that a buzzard always begins a flight from the ground with a run of 10 to 12 feet. Without space to run, as is its habit, it will not even attempt to fly, but will remain a prisoner for life in a small jail with no top.

"The ordinary bat that flies around at night, a remarkably nimble creature in the air, cannot take off from a level place. If it is placed on the floor or flat ground, all it can do is shuffle about helplessly and, no doubt painfully, until it reaches some slight elevation from which it can throw itself into the air. Then, at once, it takes off like a flash.

"A bumblebee, if dropped into an open tumbler, will be there until it dies, unless it is taken out. It never sees the means of escape at the top but persists in trying to find some way out through the sides near the bottom. It will seek a way where none exists, until it completely destroys itself."

These "vertically challenged" animals become examples to us, especially when we deal with problems. A problem strikes, and we act like these animals who turn the world into two dimensions. We fail to see all the options, and so we become frantic in our search for the way out. We most likely cannot find it because we may be looking in the wrong direction. Even when an escape is presented, we might ignore it because it doesn't seem real or appropriate. We just add trouble upon trouble, and we end up as paralyzed people, scared to do anything.

The author of that email says this: "In many ways, there are lots of people like the buzzard, the bat, and the bumblebee. They are struggling about with all their problems and frustrations, not ever realizing that the answer is right there 'above' them. We can escape any prisons we find ourselves in, if only we start looking up to God." I remember reading a book by Brian McLaren, in which he said that there are three options to every problem. One of them is the "higher option," or God's option. What door has God opened to us? Which path does God reveal, so that we will not only escape but also grow stronger from the situation?

When faced with problems, we shouldn't start trying to break out under our own power. Much of the time we cannot. We start with prayer, asking God to reveal his will to us in any and every situation. As we talk together, God reveals to us the higher option, actually the only option we need, in order to be freed. With prayer a path will become clearer. A door will open wider. We will find the exit quicker than we would have without God. We find greener pastures, and then we can learn from God how to get out of the next situation when it strikes.

Do not be like a buzzard, a bat, or a bumblebee, turning our threedimensional world into a two-dimensional. We have a God above who knows what it best for us. Offer our prayers to the One who loves us, and the escape will be revealed.


