The Pastor's Pen



My Uncle Bill and Aunt Vivian live in the country outside Meadville, PA. During one of my visits, we were driving to a pottery store – my uncle is a potter – and we passed a small, gray, dilapidated church. My aunt asked, "John, do you know the story of that church?" and I said no. She said that my uncle wanted to purchase it in the mid-1960s, when the members put it up for sale. They wanted \$1200, building and acreage included. My uncle found the money, but the people in the surrounding area got involved. Why? They didn't want a hippie living nearby, and my uncle was "the hippie" because of his long '60s hair. The members bowed to the people's demands and sold everything to another man, someone the people knew well and apparently endorsed.

Over the years, that man, a so-called upright non-hippie, turned the building and property into an ugly junkyard. He didn't care to keep the building nice, which my uncle would have done because he is an artist who enjoys beauty. He had no respect for what the property once symbolized, which my uncle would have done because he is a Christian. The owner turned something beautiful into an eyesore. When we passed the former church, it was rundown and unlivable. Rusted cars and dented refrigerators littered the front lawn with wild grass and weeds growing around. Long ago, the people of the surrounding area got what they wanted, but at what cost?

Sadly, we do it all the time: judge people by their outward appearance and not by their inward appearance. We see the way a teenager dresses and make snap judgments. We look at the color of someone's skin and immediately feel uneasy. We listen to how people talk and decide if we should associate with them or not. If we do this, we fail to view people as God does, not looking at the outside but viewing what's inside.

One of the classic passages in the Bible about judging others can be found in 1 Samuel 16. God called Samuel to find a king for Israel, and the prophet wanted to find the perfect man. Yet God said to him, "Do not look on his appearance or on the height of his stature, because I have rejected him; for the LORD sees not as man sees; man looks on the outward appearance, but the LORD looks on the heart" (16:7). With that, David was chosen to be king, despite being short and the youngest of several strapping brothers.

God looks into our hearts and minds and examines them to find what is right or wrong. When God does, he imparts his love and grace in order to clean out what is wrong and to replace it with what is righteous (see Psalm 139:23-24). His hope is to find a home within us. That's how God wants us to view others. Given that we might not act or think the same way, we ought to view people by their intentions and the fruit they bear. When we do, we should then find ways to get to know them better. We should discover their likes and dislikes (realizing that we may disagree), and love and support them in times of need, just as God does. By seeing what is inside someone's heart, we may find new friends, partners in ministry, people just like us who need the love of God.

If those shortsighted people near that small, gray, dilapidated church would have looked beyond my uncle's "hippie-ness," they would have discovered a man who would have beautified his home and property with colorful and striking art. Years later, they would have met my uncle's son who paints and sculpts wonderful works of art to the glory of God. They would have had more than what they have today.

Women's Retreat, September 27 10 a.m. - 2 p.m.


Who's Behind the Mask? All women are invited to the annual women's retreat. This year the retreat will be here at the church with Marie Tuttle leading.

October 5. The first Sunday in October is designated as World Communion Sunday, which celebrates our oneness in Christ with all our brothers and sisters around the world.




