THE PASTOR'S PEN

Do you remember me preaching about Job a few weeks ago? What a pathetic character to look at during these strange and interesting times. Well, here's another pathetic character to consider, Jonah. What is it with you and these miserable creatures we have to think about while we're miserable, Pastor John?!? I have a reason.

Jonah was given a time-out (Jonah 1:17-2:9) He was an unruly child and like a parent God placed him in a corner, so to speak, to help him reconsider his actions. Jonah languished in the belly of a large fish. For three days he imagined himself in the belly of Sheol, the Grave, the Place of the Dead, and he thought he was lost forever. The deep waters enveloped him, life was draining from his body, and the temple of God, God's holy presence, was light-years away. He cried out to God for help, and God answered. God put him in the belly of a large fish, and so at the right time God would pull him from that gastronomic prison, and Jonah would be exactly where he was supposed to be. "Salvation belongs to the Lord," Jonah would proclaim. It is in God's power to save us, even from intolerable situations in which we may be encased.

I mention Jonah because all this "social distancing" has become a sort of prison to us. Staying at home isn't all it is cracked up to be. It isn't the belly of a large fish, but over the weeks it feels as though we have been placed in a time-out. We have lived in a sort of confinement that is not natural to the way we are used to living. We feel we have languished for too long. We are tired of all the limitations, and we wonder if God has been far away all this time.

At some point we are going to be "spat out." The restrictions will be lifted, and we will find ourselves on new dry ground. When the time comes, can we say that our time of "social distancing" was a productive time? In our languishing have we only stayed bored and miserable - did we think we were lost forever - or can we say we maintained hope and learned much about ourselves and God? Even in the belly of a large fish Jonah used the time for reflection and worship. We should do no less.

In this belly of isolation, we may have learned what true trust and faith in God are, clinging to God for dear life and wholeheartedly believing God gets us through. We may have learned how to worship God in different ways, realizing that even in our quiet spaces God is adored. We may have found ways to connect with others, that even as we stand apart we may still reach out to others and let them know we love them. We may have discovered that we don't have to sink under the cool, deep waters of bad news or be throttled by the strong, copious weeds of disinformation. In the belly of isolation, we may be able to say that we became different people, who feel closer to our God. We feel the pull to be better children who will obey and submit our will to our Father's will unconditionally.

Hopefully our time has been a time of growth. Hopefully our time will continue to be a time of expanding faith and love and hope. When it is all said and done, let us not forget what God did with us in March and April. Let us not forget how God transformed us even in the belly of something we hope never to encounter again. With God's help we will be exactly where we are supposed to be, different people than when it all first began.


HIGH SCHOOL
