





Those of you that know me can attest that I really love the C-I Corvettes. I purchased my first C-I Corvette 1961 while serving in the Army and stationed in Germany.

This Corvette was special since it was my first of 9 Corvettes I have owned. It was a 1958 "fuelie" and had been equipped with numerous racing options. I raced it many times at the renowned "Nürburgring" racetrack in 1961. I can assure you that this was one very fast sports car, I was competing against Porsches and Mercedes 300 L Gullwings.

High speeds can be a double -edged sward, great while on a racetrack, but not necessarily great on the street. As you can see from the before and after photos what can happen to a beautiful Vette when excessive speed is involved. My dream car was totaled as you can see in the photos.

Believe it or not, I found a 1961 Corvette frame in a German junk yard, which is interchangeable with the 1958 frame. I had to order numerous parts, including a complete front fiberglass clip from Los Angeles to rebuild the car. It me almost a year to make the car road worthy again.

I brought the car back to the Good Ole' USA when I returned home in 1963. It was unpainted, but running just like a "fuelie" should, FAST.

My First Corvette

When I was in high school a friend's father bought him a used 1956 Red Corvette. Talk about envy, I had a bad case but knew that wasn't in my future still having college and later the Army to traverse so stuck with my 1954 Ford two door.

When I came back from Vietnam, I had save some money and purchased a new 1969 Pontiac GTO. The Corvette was still lingering in the back of my mind but still not the resources yet, (Money), After discharge from the Army I had a good job in the Portland area so once again looked into buying a Corvette. I found one at AB Smith Chevrolet on the west side of Portland. The dealership was closing, and this was the last car they had. Apparently, a father had ordered it as a graduation present for his son but thought better of the idea and did not accept the car. It was a Riverside Gold 1969 4 speed. I still have the window sticker; it was priced at \$5,958,00. I put about 30 thousand miles on the car in a little over a year. I had met Sande and she was 200 miles away round trip so you see how the miles added up. After we were married, I decided that for a young married couple to have a toy like a Corvette was inappropriate. That mind set lasted about 5 months and I succumbed to the Corvette magic again and bought a 1971 Steel City Gray LT1 coupe. Anyway, nine Corvettes later, the thrill is still there. It is my belief that with the C5 General Motors started putting some effort in the design and quality of the Corvette. I have liked all nine Corvettes we have had, some better than others, but as I said, the thrill never goes away.





Entombed 1954 Corvette Goes to Bowling Green

The story starts, as you might expect, in 1954. Richard Sampson of Brunswick, Maine, decided to purchase a brand new Corvette. The car, which bore the serial number E54S001147, was one of just 3,640 Corvettes produced that year. Excited to have the car, Richard drove it regularly for almost five years.

In 1959, feeling the continual disappointment of driving a car that his wife did not enjoy, **Richard decided** he no longer wanted to drive it either. However, he wasn't ready to part with the beautiful Corvette that had so completely caught his attention a half-decade earlier. Instead, Richard Sampson elected to do something immensely unconventional with his Corvette. Mr. Sampson was in the process of erecting a new building to expand his chain of local grocery stores. During a meeting with his construction company, he expressed his desire to have his Corvette entombed in the new store. The construction team obliged and Sampson's car was carefully encased, brick-by-brick, within the new grocery store. Richard Sampson stated in his will that his Corvette was not to be removed from his man made 'time capsule' until the year 2000. A small viewport was built into the tomb. Shortly before Sampson's death in 1969, he rescinded the stipulation that the car should remain entombed. The grocery store was purchased by new owners in 1982. When the new owners purchased the building, it was with the understanding that the car must be removed from the premises. This 1954 Corvette has changed hands a few times since then and even crossed the Barrett Jackson auction block in 2016. However, the car has accumulated only 2,344 miles since new.

Today, this unique Corvette was donated to and resides at the National Corvette Museum. The donors, who wished to remain anonymous, felt that the Museum could properly preserve the car for future generations to experience and enjoy. The Corvette Museum has since had the Corvette's body decomposition stabilized and sealed to prevent further damage to the car. The car is now on permanent display at the National Corvette Museum


Judy McClean's Life History In Cars
