
President's Ponderings cont.

# The New Cars Thieves Can't Stop Stealing (And the Ones They Won't Touch)

For a <u>car thief</u>, stealing someone's vehicle means a potentially juicy payout. For the person whose car is being stolen, it means you're suddenly faced with a major inconvenience and can look forward to hours of painful communication with an insurance company — not to mention the loss of anything that was in the car at the time of the theft.

When you're shopping for a new vehicle, the frequency with which it gets stolen should be something you research before seriously considering any model. The Highway Loss Data Institute recently shared <u>data</u> highlighting the most and least frequently stolen new cars, with theft rates based on insurance claim data for car models released from 2022 to 2024. Here's a look at those rankings and what the data tells us about how thieves select vehicles to steal.

A series of electric cars topped the list of least stolen vehicles, which makes sense. Because electric vehicles need to be charged, they're more frequently stored in garages, making them much harder and more inconvenient for thieves to target. Ultimately, convenience is one of the main motivating factors for car thieves, making *in*convenience one of the more powerful deterrents.

#### 10 Fun Facts About The Chevrolet Corvette

- I. The original Sting Ray designs were partly taken from an actual Mako Shark caught by designer Bill Mitchell while deep-sea fishing.
- 2. In 1960, GM gave all three Mercury 7 astronauts—Alan Shepard, Gus Grissom, and Chuck Yeager—brand new Corvettes as a publicity stunt.
- 3. The 1953 Corvette came in only one color option: Polo White with a red interior. The last year the Polo White color was used was 1957.
- 14. V8 engines were available as an option until 1955. And in that year, 90% of all customers selected the option. Since then, all Corvettes have offered nothing but V8 engines.
- 5. Only one 1983 model Corvette is still known to exist, and it's on display at the National Corvette Museum in Bowling Green, Kentucky. This is due to quality issues that caused GM to stop production until the problems could be solved. By the time the issues were straightened out, it was so late that the fixed Corvette was introduced as the 1984 model.
- 6. The Corvette boasts a family that's 2 million strong and continues to grow year after year. In fact, in 2012, Corvettes accounted for nearly 1/3 of all sports car sales in America!
- 7. The 2009 ZRI was the first Corvette to be pushed over the 200 mph mark.
- 8. The 1963 Corvette Sting Ray Split-Window Coupe is widely regarded as the most beautiful and influential Corvette ever made.
- 9. The 1978 Corvette Indy 500 Pace Car was painted black and silver because it photographed better. Back then, most publications and ads were black and white.
- 10. Due to federal mandates, the 1980 Corvette had an 85 mph speedometer.

# Some C7 Corvette Owners Are Still Waiting For Their Cracked Wheel Reimbursement

Some <u>C7 Corvette</u> owners are entitled to <u>reimbursement</u> for defective wheel sets that could crack or warp over time, leading to all sorts of issues, including tire pressure loss. Per a report published in August of 2024, affected Corvette owners should have <u>received a letter</u> notifying them how they can be reimbursed for the issue. GM reportedly stated that the matter is now in the hands of the third-party administrator and out of GM's direct control. If all else fails you can pray to the Corvette Wheel God.

#### Corvette Fuel Filler Recall: Here's How Dealers Will Fix It

The recall impacts units of the C8 Corvette Z06 produced between the 2023 and 2026 model years, as well as units of the C8 Corvette ZRI produced between the 2025 and 2026 model years. GM found that if excess fuel spills into the fuel-filler pocket during refueling, it can leak onto the Corvette's left-side radiator or fan assembly, where it could vaporize and travel toward the engine bay and meet an ignition source, increasing the risk of a fire. To fix the issue, dealers will install a new filler neck seal panel (part number 86371991), which acts as a shield to divert any spilled fuel away from ignition sources.

### You Ain't Getting A C8 Corvette ZR1 For Less Than \$100K Markup

Multiple dealerships across the U.S. are listing the <u>C8 Corvette</u> ZR1 well above sticker. For instance, a 2026 Corvette ZR1 Convertible 3LZ listed at <u>Tom Bell Chevrolet</u> carries an MSRP of \$220,000 and is posted for \$340,000, a \$120,000 markup. Similarly, <u>Evergreen Chevrolet</u> has a ZR1 listed for \$322,000, despite an MSRP of \$222,000, while <u>Peltier Chevrolet Tyler</u> shows a \$226,000 ZR1 priced at \$326,000.

Even private sellers and flippers are joining the frenzy, with asking prices averaging \$100,000 over MSRP, according to *GM Authority*'s own findings. And the trend isn't limited to retail showrooms, either, with a 2026 Corvette ZR1 recently appeared on Bring a Trailer, where bidding reached \$333,000 before failing to meet reserve. Remember folks, it's just money or what the hell!!!!!!!
