


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The History of Veterans Day

Veterans Day is a federal holiday. It was initially known as <u>Armistice Day</u> and celebrated the end of World War I (WWI) on Nov. II, 1918. It honored WWI veterans and recognized the armistice, or call for peace, by the Germans on the "eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month."

After World War II and the Korean War, veterans service organizations urged the U.S. Congress to amend the holiday to be more inclusive of all veterans. Thus, Veterans Day was officially born in 1954 to honor all American veterans, past and present.

President Dwight D. Eisenhower was responsible for changing the name officially. Despite a similar history, Veterans Day in other countries is recognized but may have a different name. In Canada, Nov. I I is known as Remembrance Day (or Poppy Day). While it also acknowledges veterans, the day's emphasis is on remembrance and paying tribute to those who made the ultimate sacrifice. Remembrance poppies are often worn to honor those who died in war.


"What's the difference between Veterans Day and Memorial Day?"

Although they both involve honoring the military community, they serve different purposes. Memorial Day honors and remembers those who gave their lives in service to their country. While deceased veterans are also remembered on Veterans Day, the day specifically celebrates all living veterans who served in war and peace.

Another critical difference is when they are observed: Memorial Day is in May, and Veterans Day is in November.

2024 Corvette Car Caravan Trip

Most know but some may not know that every 5 years since the Corvette Museum opened in 1994 there is a Corvette Car Caravan where Corvettes from all over make a trip to Bowling Green, Kentucky.

Nancy and I made the trip this summer and had a great time. From Oregon and Washington there were 240 Corvettes. When we got to Bowling Green there was an estimated 5000 Corvettes.

We were the only ones from our club to go so we were adopted by the Corvette Club out of Grants Pass area. They had 12 cars going on the caravan. Great group of people (hope we have a good showing at their car show next summer) they had about 12 cars at our car show this summer.

The northwest leaders of this trip spent the last two years getting hotels blocked, places to eat and finding side things to see along the way.

We started trip at the Chevrolet dealership in Sandy. From there it was on to Richland where we hooked up with the Washington group. Then nights in Spokane, Butte, Cody, Cheyenne, Lincoln, Columbia, Mo. and then four nights in Bowling Green. Along the way we had some lunches provided by some Chevrolet dealers.

Montana was fun on the freeway as their speed limit was 80 MPH. Nancy took a photo of nothing but Corvettes in both lanes on a curve and we were doing 90 MPH.

We had been told not to speed as the police knew we were coming. Got a text message that spread thru our group. "A thousand Corvettes go by, the only car getting a ticket was a Kia"

Saw some great country along the way and some boring pedal to the metal corn fields. One side trip we did was in southern Montana just north of Yellowstone Park. Side road of about 70 miles where you start at 5000 feet and top out at 10,500 feet before starting down the other side. It is called Beartooth Highway. Makes the McKenzie Pass look tame. Some places were along ridges with very little shoulders and thousand foot drop on either side. If you have done it, please smile, if not put it on your bucket list with your Corvette.

In Bowling Green of course, the Museum is the draw, and it was just as good as the hype. We spent one day out of the three at the Museum. Twin-Turbo Corvette E-Ray Does 0-60 In Neck-Snapping 2.0 Seconds

Vehicle performance specs are absolutely ridiculous these days, and the C8 corvette lineup is certainly no exception. In stock guise, models like the Corvette E-Ray can dole out some seriously insane speed. However, take a foray into the aftermarket, and the numbers get even crazier, as evidenced by this twin-turbo E-Ray snapping off a 0-60 mph run in two seconds. After coming to a stop and activating the Performance Timer, the driver builds the revs to 3500 rpm before letting it rip. The twin-turbo Corvette E-Ray races past the 60 mph mark in two seconds as indicated by the timer. This particular model, a 2LZ trim with 2,300 miles on it, made 629 HP at the rear wheels combines with the 160 HP up front electric motor.

The 2025 Corvette ZR1's Official Top Speed is 233 MPH

Chevrolet has released the 2025 Corvette ZRI's top at 233 MPH. Driving the all new 2025 Corvette ZRI was GM President Mark Reuss who said he had confidence in the car's ability thanks to the people who helped prep the car for the run, but also the engineering that is behind it as well. Mark says he left it in Sport Mode and we also see from the data telemetry that the car was in 6th gear with the RPM pegged at the 8,000 red line. Chevrolet says that the 233 MPH top speed run is unrivalled by any current production car priced under \$1 million, and it wasn't something that was achieved in a specially prepped Corvette.

Is The Corvette C8 An Exotic?

There are arguments on both sides. The mid-engine layout, the high-revving 5.5l V8 LT6, the flat-plane crank are indications that perhaps the C8 Corvette is indeed an exotic.

As well there arguments saying that it is not an exotic. Some say the Bow Tie Brand and that Corvette has always been a relatively accessible sports car disqualifies it from the exotic classification. The price is another point that might exclude it form the exotic classification but with the ZRI price expected to be between \$175,000.00 and \$200,000.00, the price might not be an issue.

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Corvette Will Never Be Taken Out Of Chevrolet

Rumors have swirled for years about Corvette becoming a brand separate from <u>Chevrolet</u> and could expand beyond the flagship sports car. As recently as 2022, <u>we reported</u> that such a brand could include an electric sedan and crossover in addition to an electric successor to the C8. However, according to GM's top brass, it sounds like any vehicle bearing this iconic name will be part of the Chevrolet brand for the foreseeable future.

In a <u>recent video</u> on the 'Jay Leno's Garage' YouTube channel, GM President <u>Mark Reuss</u> confirmed that there is no intention to spin off Corvette into its own brand. "We'd never take [Corvette] out of Chevrolet because the core of Chevrolet is offering people more than they thought for the money and doing it with fantastic design and performance," Reuss told Leno while admiring a <u>C8 ZRI</u>. "That's what Corvette is."

Indeed, the Chevy sports car has represented one of the best values in premium sports cars for over 70 years. The current C8 generation continues that legacy, with pricing well below its rivals delivering similar performance from luxury brands like Porsche, Mercedes-Benz, and Lexus. Of note, the rivals to America's sports car have been dropping like flies with the Chevy holding a dominant market share in premium sports cars. The laguar F-Type, Audi R8, and Nissan GT-R have all been discontinued within the last year.

Reuss' comments echo what recently retired Corvette chief engineer <u>Tadge Juechter</u> said in an <u>interview last month</u>. "I mean, Corvette's at the heart of Chevrolet," Juechter told *CNBC*. "It's a pure business play. If you've got this brand equity, you can just keep it at home or you can choose to try to monetize it and put it outside." He added that GM typically hasn't done the latter and instead "[embraces] our important franchises, and [Corvette] is a really important franchise."

The Vette will remain in the Chevy portfolio, but a 2019 <u>analysis</u> by Morgan Stanley said a standalone brand could eventually have a cash value of as much as \$7 to \$12 billion. The same analysis estimated that the Corvette brand under the Chevy umbrella at the time had a value of about \$2 billion. I wonder how Morgan Stanley made that calculation. Probably used the "WAG" method. If they took Corvette out of Chevrolet which would result of 7-12 billion gain, would that be an unrealized capital gain?
