WRCA Minutes

April 9, 2013

President Rick VonLangen called the meeting to order at 7:30 PM. Also present were Vice President Jim Cwierley, Treasurer Ed Goetz, and Board members Connie Holovics and Carol Zaffram. Board members Tom Amodeo, Mark Hammer and Bill VanSplunder were absent.

Community members in attendance were Lynn Mancuso, along with Sandy and John Radens.

Secretary Minutes: A motion was made by Ed Goetz, seconded by Carol Zaffram to approve the minutes from the March meeting. The resolution passed unanimously.

Treasurer's Report: Ed Goetz went through the monthly expenditure report, saying there was \$10,846 in reserves at the end of March. Ed Goetz made the motion to approve, seconded by Carol Zaffram, and was approved by a 5-0 vote.

President's Report: Rick VonLangen read a letter from the Ellicott Creek Volunteer Fire Department, detailing a recruitment open house on April 27 from 1 to 4 pm at the Ellicott Creek Fire House.

Old Business: Ed Goetz reported that directory sales were done for the year, and that we may still get some calls for ads in the *Wind-in-the-Willows*. A discussion was held about the sales coordinator and directory assembly position, and how to go about filling them.

Rick VonLangen made a suggestion to possibly combine the positions, and there was general discussion about where to find candidates.

Rick VonLangen also gave an update from Tom Amodeo about the proposed movie night. The proposed vendor agreed to lower the rate for one trial movie to \$900, with an option to host more if it is successful. Discussion also was had about recruiting volunteers, and a meeting of the movie subcommittee was discussed. Jim Cwierley reported having little success in getting the town recreation department to return calls.

New Business: Discussions were held about filling a vacant board seat. Current board members will continue to look for volunteers to fill the roll.

Connie Holovics reported on the success of the Easter party in March, citing the earlier start time and the helpfulness of new volunteers. A good time was had by all.

Open Forum: Community concern: Resident Lynn Mancuso approached the board about starting a small community lending library. It would consist of a small shed, where books could be borrowed. Shed designs and costs were discussed, as well as possible locations for the shed. Ms. Mancuso also volunteered to help on the project. Further discussion was tabled until the May meeting.

With no further business to discuss, a motion was made by Ed Goetz, seconded by Carol Zaffram, to adjourn the meeting. The next meeting will be held at 7:30 pm on Tuesday, May 14, at the Ellicott Creek Fire Hall. All residents are encouraged to attend.

Bits & Bytes

Every so often I get the call from a family member, friend, friend of a family member, etc... and hear the same thing, "I hate to bother you, but my...insert title here...got a virus and was wondering what he should do about it." My response is always the same. "Get to the hospital or call a doctor!" After they awkwardly laugh at my awful joke, I then actually ask how they got it and what makes you think they have a virus? This tends to be the same answer over and over again. I clicked on a website, attachment and so on.

However, getting a virus has become much easier to get in recent years. From malware to spyware and now ransomware, it is increasingly difficult to track and protect against these exploits. So, I will ask the "tech"-age old question: How do I protect myself against these viruses?

In many ways, computers are like life. If you take care of yourself, then you tend to get less sickness in your life. However, just as in life, that doesn't mean you don't get sick or diseases. Prevention is the key in all of this. The information on how to prevent these has been done a million times before, but just in case you are new to the computer world here they are:

1. Don't open attachments or links from anyone unless you are expecting it.
2. Stop using file sharing programs. They contain more viruses than music or video. Where you save in purchasing music, you will pay with your identity or personal information stolen. Use Pandora or Spotify, they are great music sources.

3. Stay away from unsavory or unknown sites. It is as simple as that. Keep to known path or websites.

4. My Golden Rule: Unless you are technical, pay for a widely known anti-virus software program like Norton Anti-Virus that updates itself. This will help you in preventing any exploits in software already on your pc.

5. Keep your computer up to date with the manufacturer's operating system updates.

If you do get a virus, my favorite tool is Malware Bytes. It is Free! Simply download (if you can) and install the software. Boot into Safe Mode (Google Search "How to boot into safe mode") and run the software. I have found this fixes 60%-70% of all viruses. If you still have a virus, get it to a trusted source for removal. Best Buy, a nephew or a local PC shop are all examples.

It is so very easy to pass off. Much like getting an oil change or a physical. Owning a computer is a necessary evil. Protect your investment. You will get what you pay for.


