

Community Awareness—

Take Measures to Protect the Fish in our Area

Please be aware we have an unwanted large Heron or American Bittern that is frequently having breakfast and dinner in our small backyard ponds in Willow Ridge. Our fish are all gone; the bird was in the pond this morning and took our last two. A family on Sweetwood just had 6 fantails, nine years old, taken the other day. I saw this bird; he is very large, over 3 feet tall and a wing span the same.

If you have a pond, you might want to protect it by stringing fish line over it. Because this bird is territorial, placing a plastic heron out may keep it away. We had an owl and a large plastic snake, but it did not stop the bird. The SPCA wildlife spokesperson says the bird only eats fish and maybe small rodents, but I would not leave small pets unattended. The SPCA cannot remove this bird, so our awareness is the best deterrent for now...good luck. Debbie Speicher

Wind-in-the-Willows

CRIME PREVENTION TIPS FROM THE AMHERST POLICE DEPARTMENT LOCKS, DOORS, WINDOWS

* Install good dead bolt locks in your doors, *and use them*. About 50% of burglars enter homes through unlocked doors and windows. Avoid door locks that can be unlocked by breaking glass or door panels to reach inside.

* Secure sliding glass doors with commercial locks and sturdy wooden dowel in the track, or a nail inserted through a hole drilled in the sliding glass door frame projecting into the fixed frame.

* Lock double hung windows by sliding a bolt or nail through a hole drilled at a downward angle in each top corner of the inside sash and part way through the outside sash.

* Keep valuables in a secure place in your home, preferably in a locked security safe.

OUTSIDE

* Trim shrubbery that hides doors and windows, and cut back tree limbs that could help a burglar reach a second story window.

* Make sure porches, entrances and yards are well lit.

* Report broken street lights to the utility company.

* Do not hide house keys in mailboxes or under doormats. Instead, give a duplicate key to a trusted friend or neighbor in case you are locked out.

* Change locks as soon as you move into a new home. Before you move into an apartment, make sure the landlord changes the locks from the previous tenant.

WHILE AWAY

* Leave lights and a radio on to give your home an occupied look. Use timing devices to turn lights and radios on and off a varying times. Keep your garage door closed and locked.

* If going away for longer than a few days, arrange to have someone pick up your mail and newspapers. Have regularly scheduled deliveries stopped or sent elsewhere.

* Don't announce plans for a party or vacation prior to leaving.

* Use unpredictable hiding places for valuables, like among cleaning supplies under your sink or beneath logs in a wood box. Keep valuable, but rarely used items in a safe deposit box.

* One of the best ways to prevent crime is to get to know your neighbors, and watch each other's homes. Exchange work and vacation schedules with a neighbor you trust so you can keep an eye on each other's homes.

* *Most important of all...* be sure to report any suspicious activity in your neighborhood to the police immediately. Make sure you stay on the line to give the operator all the details, including license plate numbers and vehicle identification, if possible.


