

WRCA Minutes

WRCA MINUTES FOR TUESDAY, MARCH 13, 2018

The March WRCA meeting was called to order at 7:43 pm by President Erich Krueger.

In attendance were President

Sieman.

Alissa Shields spoke about TED Part F Article-E A9508/ S7508 "Small Wireless Facilities Deployment". Encouraged residents to write to oppose/reject this Article to NYS Governor Coumo. NYS Lt. Governor Kathy Holchul's Deputy Chief of Staff, Melissa Bochenski, State Senator Ranzenhofer and State Assembly Member Ray Walter. Both WRCA President, Erich Krueger and Alissa Shields encouraged residents to attend town meetings. Editorials encouraged for the WITW on this issue. A lengthy discussion was held among residents at tonight's meeting.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

Motion was made to approve the February meeting minutes by Marijean Nichols and seconded by Ann Nichols.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Donna Mosteller submitted a treasurer's report. Income for the month of February was \$2,710.00. Expenses for the month of February was \$1,550.34. The balance for the end of February was \$10,560.80. Income for March as of today's date is \$3,429.00 and expenses is \$1,387.93 with a balance of \$12,601.87. Insurance payment has been made. Motion made to accept treasurer's report by Cassandra Schwab and seconded by Marijean Nichols.

DISCUSSION

Membership Drive- Jane Sieman reported. Membership is currently at 476. A increase over last year. Memberships still coming in.

Directory - Jane Sieman reported. 39 ads have been received for this year's directory. Proofreading was done the week of February 26th, 2018 and submitted in it's entirety today. Proof should be ready by the end of the week and all directories are expected to be complete for pick up by March 23rd. Asking for volunteers to help bag books w/solicitors stickers. John & Sandy Radens volunteered. Solicitor Stickers were received and reviewed. Stickers will be inserted in all books behind the cover page. Directories will be delivered the weekend of April 7th by Willow Ridge Boy Scout Troop 173.

Movie Night - Contact has been made with Town of Amherst Youth and Rec. Date moved to July 27th. Location will most likely be at Willow Ridge Elementary. Movie is yet to be determined at this date. Jim Cwierley is contact for this event.



Dear Neighborhood Stakeholder:

Amherst's neighborhoods are the building blocks of our community. It is important to reach out to our residents and understand the valued characteristics and opportunities facing these areas; it is essential for effective community planning. In 1998, the Town conducted a series of meetings in many neighborhoods. An outcome of these meetings was a "to do" list for the Town, County, and State agencies. These meetings also became the impetus for re-envisioning the Town's Comprehensive Plan, a plan that was a guide for our community through its Bicentennial in 2018.

Over the last 20 years, the Town has matured and developed, our housing market has evolved, the way we shop for goods and services has changed, our community services have become more important and the costs to deliver these services has increased, and quality of life issues have come to the forefront. The Town faces the next decade as a mostly built out community that needs to invigorate and reinvent its commercial centers and business parks and build on its recreational and open space assets, while recognizing the importance of preserving and protecting community character.

Planning for our future is a dynamic process that never stops. As the new Town Board begins its journey in governance, it is a good time to return to our neighborhoods and our residents to understand where we are now and the direction we should be heading into the future. The Town also needs to recommit to the neighborhoods to ensure that it is keeping pace with changing community needs, as a whole, and making the best decisions for the Town. But, we cannot do this alone.

To help the Town identify important issues and opportunities in the neighborhoods, a series of ten (10) *Neighborhood Forums* have been scheduled. These forums provide a chance for Town representatives to meet with residents and property owners to discuss existing conditions, examine local issues and concerns, and to recognize opportunities for improvement. It is hoped that by conducting these forums, the Town can establish the foundational "civic infrastructure" for continuing conversations into the future and gathering the public input necessary to keep the neighborhoods in the Town strong, quality places to live. Additional information on these Neighborhood Forums can be found on the Town's website at www.amherst.ny.us.

We are calling on active organizations and stakeholders in your neighborhood to help us make these meetings a useful and worthwhile endeavor. We are asking you to help us spread the word by posting this information in a newsletter and online and bringing people out to provide their input. Without local input, land use planning efforts and decisions are, for the most part, left up to the Town. We want you to help us plan for your future.

A Neighborhood Forum has been scheduled for the Ellicott Creek community at 6:30pm on Monday, May 14 2018 at the Ellicott Creek Fire Hall upstairs in the Banquet Hall (45 South **Ellicott Creek Road**). We hope you will attend and find this event a valuable way for the Town to establish a stronger connection with your neighborhood and a better means for identifying local concerns. We are excited to have the opportunity to meet with residents and others, so we hope that you can assist us with our outreach to make these Neighborhood Forums a successful endeavor.

Oon't let your spring fever derail your summer

ith the snow finally melting, Buffalo runners are ready to lace up. But, before you hit the pavement, Jeanmo0r neighbor, Matt Clemens, Cert MDT, a physical therapist at Kenmore Mercy Hospital's AthletiCare, reminds us to avoid overdoing it early on.

Before you start with the first run, hike or extended walk of the spring season, follow these tips to avoid painful injuries and get the most out of your springtime workouts.

Stretch warm up and cool downTry a mix of static stretches and dynamic stretches helps warm up and loosen your muscles, tendons and ligaments so you can avoid common injuries like plantar fasciitis and shin splints.

Wear the right shoes

Old shoes can be uncomfortable or show signs of serious wear. Slowly break in those new shoes too.

Oon't do too much too soon

If you haven't jogged in a couple of months, start slowly. Consider walking first, then increase your running intervals. Don't run two days in a row when you're just starting out.

Watch out for puddles mud and ice

Be on the lookout for unexpected patches of ice in shadowy areas and slippery puddles of mud, both of which can lead to scary slips, trips and falls that cause bruises, sprains, bone fractures and other painful symptoms.

Listen to your body
If you feel pain, your body is telling you to stop. Don't push through the discomfort or ignore it.

Clemens notes that, "ankle sprains, patellar tendonitis, hamstring strains and low back pain that result from doing too much too soon will only get worse if they go untreated."

Whether you jog a few miles, tee up for a round of golf, shoot hoops with your kids, or tackle yard work, too abrupt of a transition to full-throttle activity after a more or less sedentary winter can increase the risk of getting hurt.
